FOREIGN NATIONAL CLINICAL RECORD FILES (FN 918-03, AR 340-18-9). Documents pertaining to foreign nationals, except NATO personnel and their dependents, treated in Army medical facilities. Included are clinical records and x-rays for each individual. NATO personnel records are excluded.

CONUS facilities with 5 year clinical record libraries: Destroy after 25 years. Withdraw and retire to National Personnel Records Center, 111 Winnebago Street, St. Louis, MO 63118, 5 years after the end of the year in which last inpatient treatment was given.

Other CONUS facilities: Destroy after 25 years. Withdraw and retire to National Personnel Records Center, 111 Winnebago Street, St. Louis, MO 63118, 1 year after end of year in which last inpatient treatment was given.

Request authority to establish disposition instructions, as stated above, for FN 918-03. Current disposition instructions present legal problems with the Federal Tort Claims Act and the civil rights of the patient. Discussions with legal counselors in the Office of the Judge Advocate General revealed that the US Government could be in violation of the Civil Rights Act by releasing these medical records to unauthorized individuals; and, should the Army be charged with malpractice under the Federal Tort Claims Act, records would not be available for preparation of a defense. Therefore, it is imperative that these medical records be retired to the National Personnel Records Center and retained for 25 years.
