

Online Access: Online Finds



In the Catalog (ARC): The debut of the much-anticipated new ARC Web is just around the corner! Starting this summer, visitors to the newly streamlined site will have access to such features as the familiar “Google-like” basic search box, user-friendly advanced search filters, a well-organized tabular display, and a graphical hierarchy display. The “My List” and email functions, highlighted search terms within record hits, and the ability to search within particular record groups, collections, series, and file units will also improve usability. In the Digital Vaults: Just launched in February, this new web version of the interactive Public Vaults exhibit at Archives I features images and descriptive labels for more than 1,200 National Archives records. Users can browse similar records linked together by a virtual “spider web,” create their own posters and movies with images, design “Pathway Challenge” puzzles, or search through the entire collection. Nominated for a Webby Award, this new National Archives experience is certainly worth a visit!



Online Access: New Resources and Technology

Footnote Search Tips: January marked the first anniversary of the National Archives-Footnote.com joint record digitization project, with more than 35 million historical record images added thus far. If you aren't familiar with the project, check out NARA's digitization partnerships page to learn about this ambitious venture.

Footnote's new search interface allows users to perform both basic keyword and advanced filtered searches. In the basic search format, hits that include all search terms in the same field are returned first, followed by results containing the keywords anywhere in the record. Matched terms are drawn from both officially indexed metadata and user supplied annotations. The advanced search options (name, place, and year) provide users with greater control over their queries. Users also have the option to search within specific titles or sections of titles.



While Footnote's new search clearly has the potential to be a valuable tool, it's important to keep in mind that this is still a Beta version and may need to be refined. Feel free to explore the site and leave comments -- feedback is encouraged. <http://www.footnote.com>

In the Catalog (ARC): The 4th annual ARC Points of Contact Conference was held April 8th and 9th at Archives 1 in downtown Washington, DC. 

Library of Congress Posts Images on Flickr: In the Library of Congress Flickr pilot, the nation's library has embraced Web 2.0 through the use of community tagging, or user-assigned metadata. This project has been undertaken using two sets of photographs for which very little official descriptive data exists. Users are encouraged to contribute their own insights and keyword suggestions through subject tagging, commenting, and annotating specific elements of the image. Judging by the lists of subject tags, identifications of photographed people and places, and user-provided links to outside resources, this first stage of the project has been a success! http://www.flickr.com/photos/library_of_congress/

Online Description in the International Archival Community

International Council of Archives Activities: The Committee of Best Practices and Standards of the International Council of Archives (ICA/CBPS) released the first edition of the International Standard for Describing Functions (ICA-ISDF) in April and will formally present it at the International Congress of Archives in Malaysia in July 2008. From the press release: "Separated but linked descriptions of functions can improve the understanding of that context and can be used in conjunction with ICA-ISAD(G) compliant descriptions and ICA-ISAAR(CPF) authority files as a tool for efficient retrieval of archives and creators descriptions in archival descriptive systems. This approach constitutes the basis of the new international standard which provides guidance for preparing descriptions of functions of corporate bodies associated with the creation and maintenance of archives." <http://www.ica.org/en/node/38665/>
