SUBJECT: VIOLATIONS OF DIPLOMATIC IMMUNITY

1. COMMENT BY RSD BECKETT: IN THE LAST-FIVE DAYS A SERIES OF INCIDENTS HAVE OCCURRED WHICH POSED A THREAT TO MEMBERS OF THE STAFF. GDA INITIATED IMMEDIATE ACTION TO PRECLUDE RECOGNITION OF THESE INCIDENTS.

2. ON MARCH 25, 1976 AT - 2000 HOURS COL. ENMETT A. NIBLACK, AIR ATTACHE, AND HIS WIFE WERE TRAVELING IN A U.S. GOVERNMENT VEHICLE EQUIPPED WITH DIPLOMATIC PLATES. THEIR CAR WAS STOPPED BY A GROUP OF SOLDIERS OPERATING A ROADBLOCK. COL. AND MRS. NIBLACK WERE ORDERED FROM THE AUTOMOBILE AND TOLD TO PLACE THEIR HANDS ON THE ROOF OF THE VEHICLE. COL. NIBLACK ORALLY IDENTIFIED HIMSELF AND HIS DIPLOMATIC STATUS. BOTH COL. AND MRS. NIBLACK WERE SUBJECT TO A BODY SEARCH (PAT DOWN). COL. NIBLACK INFORMED THE GDA THAT HE WANTED TO REACH INTO HIS POCKET FOR HIS DIPLOMATIC CERTIFICATE. THE GDO SHOWED THE .45 CAL. PISTOL HE WAS HOLDING INTO COL. NIBLACK'S BACK. THE AIR ATTACHE AGAIN ADVISED THE GDO HE WANTED TO REACH FOR HIS CERTIFICATE AND NOT A GUN. THE GDO CALLED A COMMISSIONED OFFICER.  
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THIS OFFICER EXAMINED THE CERTIFICATE AFTER WHICH HE PERMITTED NIBLACK AND HIS WIFE TO DEPART.

3. ON MARCH 26, 1976 AT 0015 MICHAEL F. O'BRIEN, PRESS OFFICER (USIS) AND HIS WIFE WERE TRAVELING IN THEIR PRIVATE AUTOMOBILE EQUIPPED WITH DIPLOMATIC PLATES. THEY ENCOUNTERED A ROADBLOCK AND WERE ORDERED TO STOP THE VEHICLE AND DISMOUNT. THEY WERE DIRECTED TO PLACE THEIR HANDS ON THE TOP OF THE CAR. O'BRIEN WAS SUBJECTED TO A BODY SEARCH. HIS WIFE WAS NOT PHYSICALLY SEARCHED BUT HER POCKETBOOK WAS EXAMINED. ON MARCH 26, 1976 AT 1000 AND 1700 HOURS THE O'BRIENS WERE AGAIN STOPPED BY ROADBLOCKS. THEIR CHILDREN WERE WITH THEM ON THESE TWO OCCASIONS. TWICE AGAIN THE SEARCH PROCEDURES WERE CARRIED OUT AS DESCRIBED WITH THE EXCEPTION THAT THE CHILDREN WERE NOT REQUIRED TO LEAVE THE AUTOMOBILE.

4. ON MARCH 26, 1976 AT 0015 CHARLES E. EDMOND,

CONSUL FOR ADMINISTRATION WAS TRAVELING  
IN A U.S. GOVERNMENT VEHICLE EQUIPPED WITH DIPLOMATIC  
PLATES. THE AUTOMOBILE WAS STOPPED AT A ROADBLOCK.  
WHILE MR. ENNERS WAS IDENTIFYING HIMSELF A WEAPON WAS  
APPARENTLY ACCIDENTALLY DISCHARGED BEHIND THE VEHICLE.  
NOTHING STRUCK THE VEHICLE AND THERE WAS NO INDICATION  
THE WEAPON HAD BEEN FIRED INTENTIONALLY.

5. ON MARCH 29, 1976 AT 1640 HOURS GEORGE O. HUBY,  
CONSUL GENERAL, WAYNE S. SMITH, COUNSELOR FOR POLITICAL  
AFFAIRS, FRANK ZAMBITO, SECOND SECRETARY, POLITICAL  
SECTION, LT. COL. WILLIAM P. JIGMA, STAFF JA, USAF  
SOUTHERN AIR DIVISION WERE TRAVELING IN A U.S. GOVERNMENT  
VEHICLE WHICH WAS EQUIPPED WITH DIPLOMATIC PLATES AND  
DRIVEN BY AN EMBASSY CHAUFFEUR. THIS AUTOMOBILE WAS  
SELECTED BY AN ARMED MEMBER OF GDA MILITARY FROM THE  
STREAM OF MAIN TRAFFIC AND DIRECTED INTO A SERVICE LANE  
WHERE A ROADBLOCK HAD BEEN ESTABLISHED. THE AUTOMOBILE  
WAS SURROUNDED BY MEMBERS OF THE GDA MILITARY POINTING  
WEAPONS AT THE VEHICLE. ALL INDIVIDUALS WERE ORDERED  
TO DISMOUNT THE AUTOMOBILE, WALK TO THE WALL AND ASSUME  
A SPREAD EAGLE POSITION. EACH INDIVIDUAL WAS THEN SEARCHED.  
DIPLOMATIC PERSONNEL VERBALLY IDENTIFIED THEMSELVES TO THE

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MILITARY AS MEMBERS OF THE DIPLOMATIC CORPS. WHEN THE  
SEARCH WAS COMPLETED THE COUNSELOR FOR POLITICAL AFFAIRS  
ASKED FOR THE NAME OF THE FEDERAL POLICE SERGEANT WHO  
WAS PRESENT. THE CONSUL GENERAL ALSO ASKED FOR THE  
SERGEANT'S NAME. ONE OF THE GUARDS SHOVED A MACHINEGUN  
IN THE STOMACH OF THE CONSUL GENERAL. THE COUNSELOR  
FOR POLITICAL AFFAIRS INFORMED THE SERGEANT THAT HE WOULD  
NOT LEAVE THE PREMISES UNTIL HE HAD THE SERGEANT'S NAME.  
THE SERGEANT ELECTED HIS WEAPON POINTING IT AT THE  
COUNSELOR FOR POLITICAL AFFAIRS HEAD AND TELLING  
HIM THAT IF HE DID NOT DEPART THE SCENE HE WOULD BE  
SAVED. THE GROUP RETURNED TO THE AUTOMOBILE AND DEPARTED.

AT 1640 A SECOND EMBASSY AUTOMOBILE WAS IN THE SAME  
TRAFFIC STREAM AS THE ONE MENTIONED ABOVE. PASSENGERS  
IN THE CAR OBSERVED THE SEARCHING OF THE INDIVIDUALS IN  
THE FIRST VEHICLE. THE GDA MILITARY SELECTED THIS CAR  
AND DIRECTED IT INTO THE ROADBLOCK. THE FOLLOWING WERE  
OCCUPANTS OF THE CAR: CHARLES E. ENNERS, COUNSELOR  
FOR ADMINISTRATION, GEORGE S. BICKERT, ATTACHE (RSO)  
DAVID L. TANNER, ASSISTANT ATTACHE (ASSISTANT RSO)  
PETER LONDON, COMMERCIAL ATTACHE AND AN EMBASSY CHAUFFEUR.  
AS IN THE CASE OF THE FIRST VEHICLE, MEMBERS WERE ORDERED  
FROM THE CAR AND SEARCHED. FOLLOWING THE TERMINATION  
OF THE WALL SEARCH THE COUNSELOR FOR ADMINISTRATION AND  
THE RSO ASKED THE POLICE SERGEANT FOR HIS IDENTIFICATION.  
ALL MEMBERS OF THE VEHICLE HAD IDENTIFIED THEMSELVES AS  
DIPLOMATS AND THE COUNSELOR FOR ADMINISTRATION THOUGHT  
THE GUARD OF THE COUNTRY HELD HIS DIPLOMATIC CERTIFICATE IN HIS  
NAME. THE GUARD IMMEDIATELY CHALLENGED THE COUNSELOR FOR ADMINISTRATION  
THAT THE GUARD WAS A MILITARY MATTER NOT A FEDERAL POLICE  
MATTER, AND SHOULD HE HAVE ANY COMPLAINTS HE  
SHOULD TAKE THEM TO THE FOREIGN OFFICE.

6. FOLLOWING THIS STATEMENT THE FOUR U.S. DIPLOMATS WERE  
PERMITTED TO RETURN TO THEIR CAR AND DEPART.

IN FIVE OF THE SIX CASES DESCRIBED ABOVE THE VEHICLES  
CONCERNED WERE COMPLETELY SEARCHED WHILE THEIR OCCUPANTS  
WERE NOT ABOARD. IN ALL CASES DESCRIBED ABOVE THE  
GDA MILITARY MEMBERS WERE ADVISED BY U.S. PERSONNEL

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BEFORE THEY LEFT THEIR VEHICLES THAT THEY WERE MEMBERS  
OF THE DIPLOMATIC CORPS.

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
