The Revolution to the 1940 Census: The Weather and Family History

When was the last time you analyzed how the weather influenced your family's history? If you are like most genealogists, probably not at all. Ms. Potter will discuss a medley of topics, including the Revolutionary War pension records of a veteran crossing the Delaware, the papers of the Continental Congress, and of how the weather affected the War. Leaping forward in time, she will then talk about the Dust Bowl, the Great Depression, and the 1940 Census. Ms Potter will explain the availability of records on microfilm and on-line, and their differences.

Connie Potter is a genealogy specialist at the National Archives in Washington, D.C. and is nationally recognized as one of the leading experts in its varied resources, especially as they pertain to genealogy and family history. She has lectured on a wide variety of topics at innumerable conferences throughout the country, and always gives a new and unusual perspective of her subject.
