- Understand the historical context in which these rolls were created
- Recognize that the rolls may include information about Freedmen and/or slaves

- Direct researchers to the appropriate NARA facility or affiliated archives where records are stored
- Arranged geographically by state and thereunder by tribe or band.
- Under each entry for a tribe or band is a list of the BIA offices which had a jurisdictional relationship with that tribe, and which NARA office holds records.
- Reflects who created and/or maintained the records

 - Name
 - Contact information (phone and email address)
 - Reference from the Online Catalog
- Be clear, be concise.
- Copy charges are assessed for reproductions
- Allow adequate time for staff to research and respond
- Note: some requests may need to be submitted in writing.
