Our ancestors were mobile, and families moved, sometimes across an ocean but just as often via land routes to the western frontier. Where they went, how they got there, and why they moved adds flavor and depth to our research and family knowledge. This lecture outlines some of the Federal and local records that can be used for this research.

What Information is Useful

- Where did the family start from?
- Where did the family end up?
- Where was the family in 1880?
- Did they travel alone?
- Did they own land anywhere?
- Were any of them in the military; involved in wars?

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What Records Should We Use to Answer These Questions?

Family records - letters, diaries, genealogies, town and county histories
Local records - Deeds, probate files, city directories, cemetery records

Federal records – Census, Land File Claims, military service and pension files, naturalizations

Using the Census in Migration Studies

- The 1880-1930 census gives not only each person's place of birth but their parents' places of birth as well
- The 1870 census asks for number of male U.S. citizens in the household; the 1830 asks if there are any aliens in the household
- Even the pre-1850 census can provide useful information

What Types of Land Records are available?

• Deeds are held at the local level

 Federal land records include Homestead records and purchases of government lands as well as bounty lands given for military service

What do we want to know?

 We not only want to know where families went, but why did they move

- The migration routes they probably took can influence family relationships
- Migration studies can help us see how our lines are interrelated


Methodology

- Using family and local records, find out all you can about where the family started or ended
- Find the family on the census, that will give you other clues you can follow up
- Did the family own land?
- Did the father fight in a war?
- Don't forget about neighbors, collateral family members, etc., can help you find out what, where, when, and why

Tracing a family in the census

 Even for families that moved relatively short distances, from one neighboring state to another, the census can help us find out when and where

Take the example of Israel Goodman

Tracing a family on the census

- We see in 1860 that Israel had a child born in Ohio in 1846, 1849,1852 and 1854. He also had a child born in Iowa in 1857.
- We can therefore deduce that the family traveled to lowa from Ohio between 1854 and 1857.
- I located a court record involving Israel where he sued someone for payment; the suit wasn't settled until early in 1857 so that means the family remained in Delaware, OH until at least March of 1857 and probably Elizabeth was pregnant during the trip to Iowa.

Let's look a Little Closer at Israel

- According to the 1860 Census, he was born in Pennsylvania, not Ohio.
- Let's check some earlier census to see when he may have gone to Ohio.
- Remember that in general people did not migrate alone but in groups; often they were grouped by something such as location, religious, culture, or family relationship.

1850 Census

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Look at earlier census

- Israel did not migrate to Ohio as an adult he arrived with his parents as a child prior to 1840.
- The 1840 census shows Jacob Goodman and family but he isn't in the 1830 census in Ohio.
- How do we find out where in Pennsylvania the family came from?
- Collateral research will do the trick!

Steps to Find where Jacob and family came from in PA

- First we need to check the 1850 census for all the surnames of heads of household who were born in Pennsylvania.
- Next, check and see how many of those families were in Delaware, Ohio in 1840
- Then check Pennsylvania 1830 census looking for the names. This chart shows what I found.

Conclusion, not proof

- It would appear that the Goodman family started out in South Reading, Berks County, PA in 1830.
- However, further research is required to prove this assumption. Family stories tell me that John Franklin and Israel were born in Berks County. But research on Rosanna Sofia Troutman is pointing to her birth as Philadelphia.

A more complicated migration example

- Gideon Spencer Wells, born Vermont in 1809, married Eliza Gilbert from Forestville, NY in 1834 and ended up in Wheatland, Michigan for the 1840 census
- Why did he leave Vermont for Michigan? What route did he travel to get there? And why Michigan rather than some other midwest state?


Gidemon Spencer Wells, born at Peacham, Vt., Nov. 11, 1809, died at Wheatland, Mich. Jan 22, 1894. Married at Forestville, N. Y., Jan. 26, 1834, to Eliza Prapa Gilbert. She was born June 7, 1814, died Feb. 20, 1851, a little past 36 years old, leaving 4 boys.


Gideon Spencer was married a second time at Geneva, N. Y. to Rachael Hell June 9, 1852. She was born December 13, 1813, and died at Wheatland Apr. 2, 1899. She was past 85. G. S. Wells settled in Wheatland in 1836 or 1837. He bought 80 acres of land on which there was about 12 acres cleared, and afterwards built a fine log house from hewed poplar or white wood trees. The best nouse of the hair in the set of his shildren were born. Eliza, his wife, lived to see all the forest cleared away, except that reserved for woodland. Deacon Wells was one of the founders of the Congregational Church at Churches Corners, two miles away. and until his death was one of its deacons, a period of 51 years. From this Michigan home during the fall and winter about 1845 or 46 a visit was made to relatives in New York and Vermont, the trip being in an ordinary farm wagon drawn by a bay and white team. The writer, with his older brother Gilbert, was left at Knowlesville, N. Y. with their maternal grandmother and Aunt Maria Gilbert, while our parents made the balance of the trip to Vermont and return.

Some years after the second marriage of G. S. Wells he added to his estate 40 acres of improved land adjoining him on the west, for which he paid \$800.00. After a life of liberal giving and considerable financial help to each of the older boys, the estate was left unemcumbered to the youngest son in trust for his mother Sessioning her life, and then to revert to him. 20 of 109

Gideon's Travels

- Gideon was born in Peacham, Caledonia County, Vermont
- His first wife was from Forestville, Chautauqua County, New York, by Lake Erie
- His mother-in-law lived in Knowlesville, Orleans County, NY, along with his sister-in-law, Marie Gilbert, near Lake Ontario so the 1845/6 trip was to visit his wife's in-laws as well as his family in Vermont
- His second wife was from Geneva, Ontario County, New York, on the Seneca Lake Canal
- He died in Wheatland, Hillsdale County, Michigan

Why leave Vermont?

- Between 1830 and 1840 Vermont lost quite a few people
- A large number of small-acreage farmers sold out to larger farmers due to the wool boom
- Newspapers were regaling the praises of "the west" as a place of cheap, fertile land and a healthier climate

Recurring Names

- In 1820 Peacham, Vermont there are 112 surnames including Wells, Shaw, Robbins, Johnson, Gregory, Eastman, Bailey, and Burbanks
- In 1840 Wheatland, Michigan there are 118 surnames including Wells, Shaw, Robins, Johnson, Gregory, Eastman, Bailey, and Burbanks
- <u>www.glorecords.blm.gov</u> shows land claims under all these names in Genessee/ Hillsdale counties, Michigan

What routes might he take?

- Many Vermonters went west on an allwater route; steamboats to Whitehall on Lake Champlain or packet boats to Troy, Buffalo, or even Detroit, Cleveland and Green Bay
- Railroads were springing up throughout Vermont, New York and points west
- Post roads network


Roswell Henry Wells' Reminiscences

"We came to Michigan through Detroit in 1854. From that city Uncle Rodney Seymour, who drove one of the first stagecoaches between the two cities, took us to Kalamazoo by stage.*

*Stage coaches continued to run for 23 years after the railroad reached Kalamazoo in 1846.

American Migration Sources

Finding your American ancestors can sometimes be difficult because they may have moved so frequently. You might begin your search by asking yourself why your ancestors migrated from one locality to another. Some possible reasons for migration may have included: opportunity to obtain land, crop failures, military bounty land, follow a religious leader, religious persecution, follow relatives or friends, economic reasons, change of climate, improve social and poverty conditions, political reasons, military transfer, wars, follow construction projects (such as canals and railroads), and other reasons.


Understanding migration trails in the localities where your ancestors resided may help to trace their migration to a previous place of residence. Travel in America was usually along existing trails and roads, such as the National Road that extended from Maryland to Illinois, or along rivers, lakes, and canals, such as the Erie Canal, Hudson River, Ohio River, or Mississippi River. Roads and river travel improved throughout the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. The Boston Post Road was used by many people and extended from the New England states to New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, and into the Southern states.


One of the most important routes to the west was New York's Erie Canal, the main artery opening the west. Opened in 1825, the Erie Canal extended from Albany to Buffalo, New York, linking the Hudson River with Lake Erie. It was the success of the Erie Canal that set off the canal building era in America. Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, and other states soon had their own canals. The arrival of the **Session 6**'s brought an end to the canal era from about 1860 to 1880.


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RAILROADS IN OPERATION, DECEMBER, 1840

Committee on Post Office and Post Roads, 1808-1946

History and Jurisdiction

16.2 A Select Committee on the Post Office and Post Roads was established in 1806 and made a standing committee in 1808. The early membership of the committee consisted of one Member from each state.

16.3 The jurisdiction of the committee extended to all proposed legislation relating to the carrying of the mails, both foreign and domestic. It included the determination of the location, construction, and maintenance of post offices and post roads; the acquisition, lease, or transfer of realty or facilities for postal purposes; and certain aspects of the employment and management of postal employees, such as the pay and leave of letter carriers, and the settlement of claims brought by employees or contractors. It included the regulation of the Postal Service, including postal rates, the franking privilege, and the printing of stamped envelopes. At Session 6 times the Railway Mail Service, ocean mail service, pneumatic tube service, postal 34 of 109 savings banks, postal telegraphy, the Air Mail Service, and Rural Free Delivery were included in its jurisdiction.

Records of the Committee on the Post Office and Post Roads, 10th-79th Congresses (1808-1946)

16.6 The records of this committee provide a thorough coverage of the various activities that occupied its members during its 138-year existence. The **minute books** and **docket books** taken together cover much of the life of the committee. They record the petitions, memorials, bills, resolutions, and other documents that were referred to the committee and their disposition within the committee.

16.7 The bulk of the documents from the early years of the committee are **petitions and memorials**. Several topics dominate the files during each of the historical periods of the committee. The records from almost every Congress during the years before the Civil War, for example, contain requests for new or expanded post offices, post roads, or postal routes. Opposition to Sunday mail operations was the subject of a continuous stream of petitions and memorials during the early period. A variety of other issues, many of which involved the salaries of postmasters and other employees of the Post Office were considered by the committee during each Congress.

16.8 Claims petitions, usually submitted by Post Office employees or persons who contracted to carry the mails, appear in the records of every Congress before the Civil War. The claims often asked for reimbursement for unexpected expenses involved in the fulfillment of a contract, or for the performance of extraordinary duties. The situation described in the mid-century committee report below is typical of the claims before this committee:

From the length and difficulties of this contract route, the hostile feelings of the Indians, through part of whose country it passes, and the exposure to robberies, the contractor must always send with the mail a strong escort of well armed men, employed at high wages. There is no prospect that this expense can be discontinued during the existence of the present contract, unless a military escort be allowed the mail, and such an escort will Session 6 ost the government more than the entire sum proposed to be allowed to the contract (34A-D15.1, Claims, H.Rpt. 170 to accompany bill H.R. 385)

Why Michigan?

- Cheap land! First Federal land sales act passed April 24, 1820 (3 Stat. 566)
- <u>WWW.GLORECORDS.BLM.GOV</u> has searchable database of land grants

Definitions

- Public Land States: States formed from the public domain
- Land Entry Papers: Records of transactions whereby the US Government transferred land to individuals, by sale or grant
- Patent: Document that guarantees title to such land
- Right of Preemption: Some early settlers in the public domain exercised the right of preemption by which they occupied and made improvements on public land without permission and were allowed to purchase such land when the surrounding land was put up for public sale
- Private Land Claims: Claims based on grants, purchases or settlements of land that took place before the U.S. acquired sovereignty over the land, or those under special circumstances.

Land Claim Files

- Credit Entry Files: Nearly all the land sold by the US Government between 1800 and 6/1820, was sold on credit at no less than \$2/acre. Shows name and residence of entryman at time of purchase, date of purchase, number of acres, land description, summary of credit payments, and volume and page number of entry
- Cash Sale Act of 1820: Usually contains name of buyer; legal description of the land and date of sale; payment receipt maybe included
- Preemption Act of 1841: Name, legal description, date of sale, witnesses attesting to the fact that entryman has established legal residence on the land

Land claim files, cont.

 Homestead Act of 1862: If patented, should include some biographical information on entryman; documents include application for homestead, notice of intent to make proof, affidavit by homesteader re marital status and children, affidavits of entryman and witnesses testifying to compliance with the conditions of the Homestead Act and use to which the land has been put, receipts for fees paid, copy of final certificate; proof of citizenship if born outside US

Land file claims, cont.

• Timber Culture Act of 1873: Information limited to name, date of entry, date of final certificate and legal description of the land

 Desert Land Act of 1877: Again, information limited to name, date of entry, date final certificate issued, and legal description as well as proof of irrigation

New! Survey plats

Survey plats are a recent addition to this site. Survey plats were the official survey documentation used when land title was transferred (via a Land Patent) from the Federal government to individuals. The drawings were created to represent survey lines, boundaries, descriptions, parcels and subdivisions. They are critical historic documents that can be used to help researchers locate the land referenced in a land patent's legal land description (i.e. Meridian, Township, Range, and Section/Block).

Where Else Would We Look?

- M1164, Michigan Special Census, the agricultural schedules might give more information about Charles Senior as well as on Charles Junior and how well he did with his homestead
- Order his pension file for possible information on his background
- Use local CT records to find his roots

Review

- Find out where the family started or ended
- Find them on the census to confirm state of birth for both parents and children – check several census since we all know how accurate the census can not be!
- Find out what records are available for the state they came from as well as the state they went to – NARA, LDS, local historical societies, USGenWeb, etc.
- Look at military and pension files as well as land records, both at the federal and local levels
- READ local histories of the areas to give you information on WHY people left or moved to those areas and what means of travel they might have used
- Look at atlases, maps and gazetteers for both places to help you visual what was involved in the move – natural geographic features as well as population etc.
- Don't forget to look at cluster and collateral groups!

Conclusions

- It is possible to discover not only a general route our ancestors took but also why they took certain routes
- This information can give us clues to ancestral relationships
- Use not only Federal records such as census, military and land records, but make sure you use local records as well as published information
