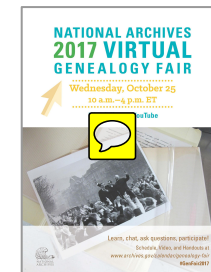

FROM THE CRADLE TO THE GRAVE: Birth, Childhood, and Death in the National Archives at St. Louis

Researchers familiar with the National Archives at St. Louis usually think of it as a place to investigate the working lives of adults, since it is attached to the National Personnel Records Center. In fact our records cover people “both coming and going” and can illuminate entire life spans. Genealogical information found in our personal data series may include biographical details such as dates of birth and death, parentage, next of kin, and heirs. No Personally Identifiable Information (PII) will be discussed.

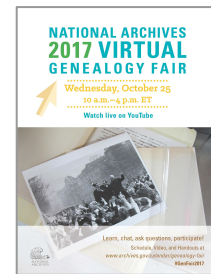
Daria Labinsky will discuss records series that contain information about pregnancy, birth, paternity, and children including: Project J Files, which may mention children who lived in Japanese internment camps in the Philippines; Chaplain Files, which record baptisms; Panama Canal personnel records and other civilian records series, which may contain information about pregnancies and children; and VA Claim Files, which can include information about paternity.

Cara Moore will focus on deaths incurred during civilian federal service as detailed in Record Group (RG) 146, Official Personnel Folders. These record series will range from Prohibition agents to Postal employees to Civilian Conservation Corps enrollees. Some records include information related to the individuals’ deaths, the witness statements around them, and how their services were handled. Through the records of death in service, genealogists can recover details surrounding the death -- from the circumstances of the event, to whom the next of kin was, to notification details.

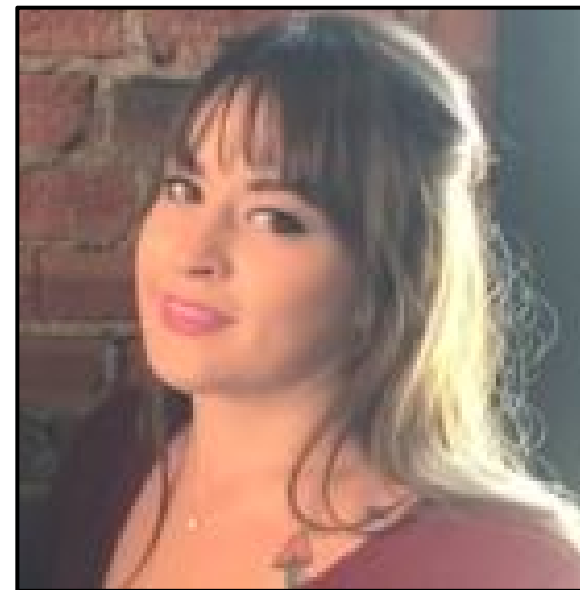

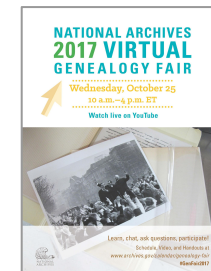
Presenter Biographies

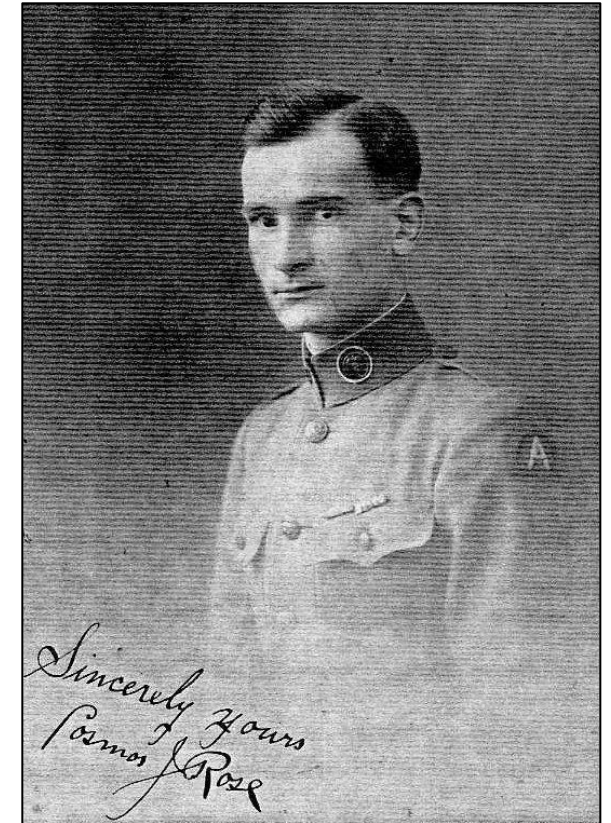

2. All concerned will be definitely informed that permission to marry is not dependent upon a state of pregnancy and that a state of pregnancy does not of itself establish the right of marriage. "

From this it will be seen that before the approval of the Commanding General was given for the marriage of soldiers, certain conditions must exist and until those conditions were complied with, the approval of such marriages was withheld. A soldier marrying without such approval, was denied certain privileges and in most cases he was returned to the United States. This is a very different thing from forbidding, in express terms, the marriage of these soldiers, and attempting to try them for a violation of such orders. The Commanding General was well within his rights in withholding his approval in such cases and denying certain privileges when a soldier married without that approval. His policy in that regard was beyond criticism and he has never ordered the trial of a soldier for marrying without permission.

CIVILIANS' DEATHS

- When thinking of death during service, military service people are often the first to come to mind
- Civilians' deaths in federal service are also detailed in their Official Personnel Folders (OPFs)
- Record Group (RG) 146
- Whether serving during war time, such as Telephone Operators or Women's Air Service Pilots (WASPS), or merely completing their everyday duty, such as delivering the mail or traveling from Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) camp to a night off, or in an actively dangerous position, such as Prohibition Agents, civil servants can die during service and the details of death become a part of their records

My dear Mr. Aldrich:

On July 13th, 1933, one of the employees at this office, a substitute clerk who was serving as substitute carrier on a rural route, was shot and killed while on duty.

At the time, he was supplied with a stamp kit, containing five dollars' worth of stamp stock issued to him while serving this route. This stamp kit, and two parcels, were taken from his automobile.

It was afterward established that the parcels were taken by the girl who killed him, and her twelve-year old sister, but ~~nothing has ever~~ been determined as to the disposition of the stamp kit and stock.

On September 19th, I wrote to the First Assistant Postmaster General, in reference to these matters, asking if this amount should be collected from estate of the carrier, or if the Department would allow this office credit for the amount involved.

No adjustment has been made, to date. The trial of the case occurred early in November, resulting in a conviction for manslaughter, but no action has been taken in the matter of the stolen packages, which theft was admitted by the two girls.

As the estate will probably be settled soon, I should like to have a ruling on the question of the stamp stock, as it is still unaccounted for, and charged against the office, pending adjustment.

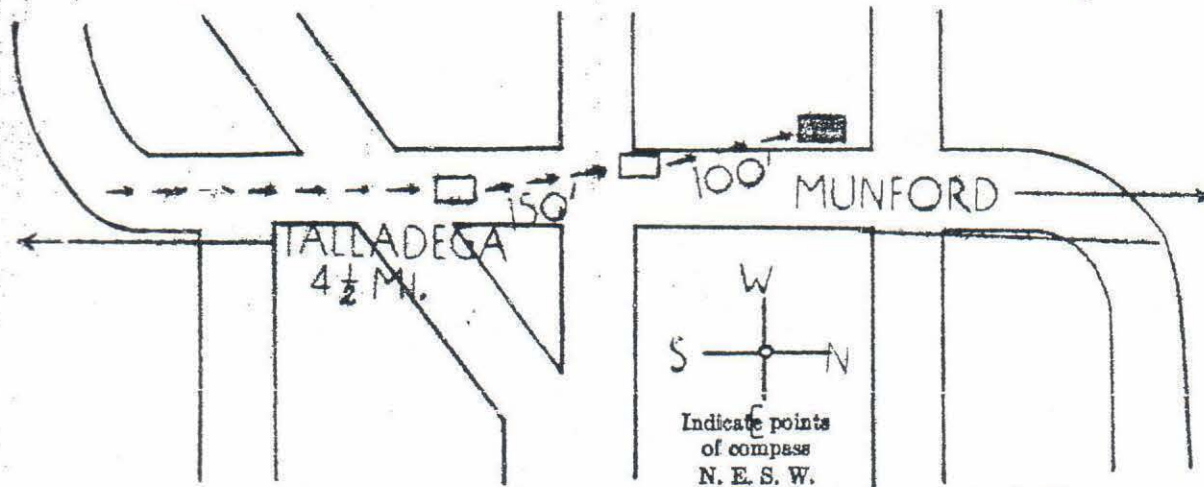

Alone in Lighthouse, William Taylor, After a Service of Twenty-six Years, Passes Peacefully Away—His Wife, at Sunset, Seeing No Beacon, Sets Out in a Launch, Battles With the Ice, Reaches Point, and Strikes Light While Body is Carried Away.

- - - - -

Snow Hill, Md., January 26.-- At sunset yesterday the light from Chincoteague Lighthouse did not shine across the waters of Sinepuxent Bay nor blink its salutation to its sister light at Assateague, that guards the treacherous channels and dangerous sandbars of the Atlantic eastward of Chincoteague Island. The inhabitants of the island looked and wondered. Never in the history of the lighthouse had such a thing occurred before. There was one woman on the island who knew there was something serious the matter. It was the keeper's wife, and she, in her sturdy little gasoline launch, had battled with the ice floes alone a few hours before and come to Chincoteague for much-needed supplies. She and her husband had been icebound since the extreme cold weather of the last few weeks and when she left he was seemingly in the best of health. The ice floes had not torn the lighthouse from its foundations for at sunset its white wall and red roof were plainly visible. The apparatus must not be in working order. But, in this event, the keeper would have rigged a substitute light. But there must be no delay. The light must shine or lives may be lost.

Mrs. Taylor, who is assistant keeper, readily found men to assist her in getting back to the lighthouse and the battle with the ice began. For a time the lighthouse could not be discerned, but at last it was sighted, but nowhere could a light be seen in the house. This forebode evil and as the party drew near and nearer and finally reached the little iron ladder that runs up from the water to the landing platform and were not greeted by the cheerful voice of William Taylor, the keeper, they were convinced that in the few short hours since the departure of the wife something serious had happened.

In a few moments their fears were realized, for they found Taylor kneeling at his bedside as if in the act of prayer. He was dead.

The light shown last night, guarded by Taylor's wife, who knew that, as she watched, the body of her husband was being carried across the

waters of the Bay, for burial by the friends who had assisted her in reaching her home, and they were being guided by the light which for 26 years he had attended.

William Taylor and his wife have been keeper and assistant keeper of Chincoteague Light since it was established 26 years ago. Never had the government received any complaint as to its management and the keeper and his wife, although negroes, were esteemed by all who knew them. William received his training under Captain Anderson, keeper of Assateague Light, and he was one of the first to notice that Chincoteague Light was not shining.

I am the wife of Ray Sutton, Prohibition Agent, who disappeared August 28th, 1930. Every thing goes to show that he met his death by whiskey racketeers while in the Government service, although his body has never been found.

Under the law I am entitled to thirty-five per cent of Mr. Sutton's salary. Is there some way whereby I may get this pension started? I have in my possession Government checks that were drawn in favor of Mr. Sutton prior to the time he disappeared. A salary check in the amount of \$92.95 for the last half of August, 1930, and an expense check in the amount of \$153.00. If there is some way whereby these checks may be cashed, I surely would appreciate it.

Whatever you can do for me at this time will be appreciated for I am much in need of this help.
