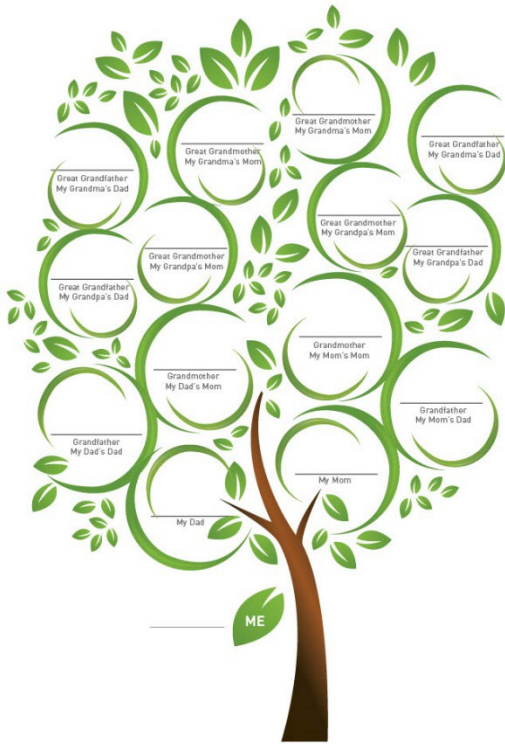



Civilian Conservation Corps Indian Division on the Reservation

Researchers may overlook the Civilian Conservation Corps Indian Division (CCC-ID) as it was largely overshadowed by the much larger regular CCC, but it was a landmark program during the 1930s. It employed thousands of Native Americans and brought material aid and conservation efforts to their reservations. The records of those Native American enrollees, what they worked on, and how they lived can be found in the holdings of the National Archives.

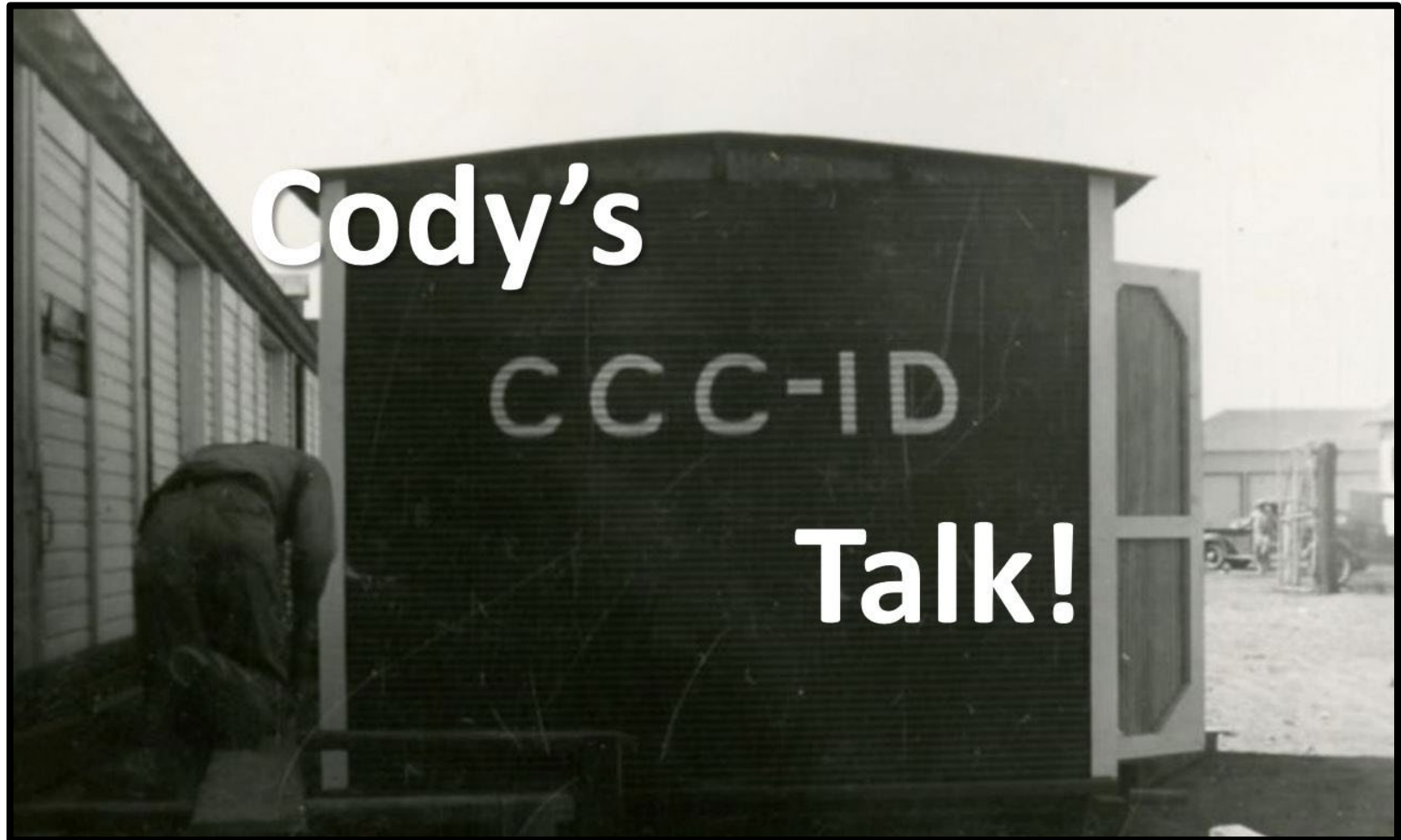

TO ALL EMPLOYEES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR.

The Hatch Act of August 2, 1939 included the following provisions:

"Sec. 9A. (1) It shall be unlawful for any person employed in any capacity by any agency of the Federal Government, whose compensation, or any part thereof, is paid from funds authorized or appropriated by any Act of Congress, to have membership in any political party or organization which advocates the overthrow of our constitutional form of government in the United States.

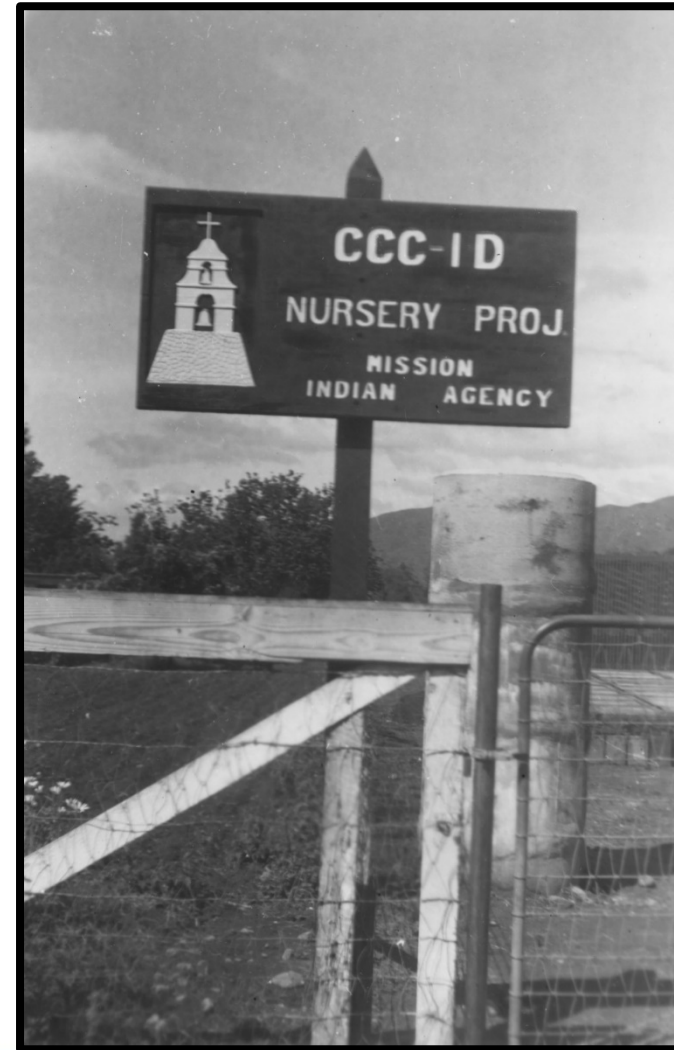

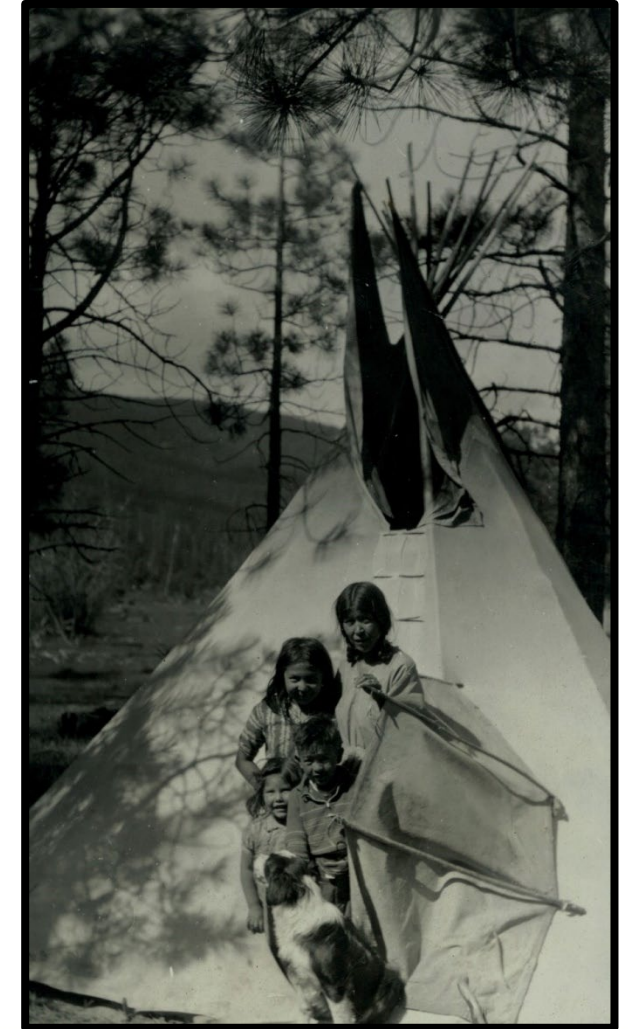

CCC-ID PLANTED MORE THAN 100,000 TREES

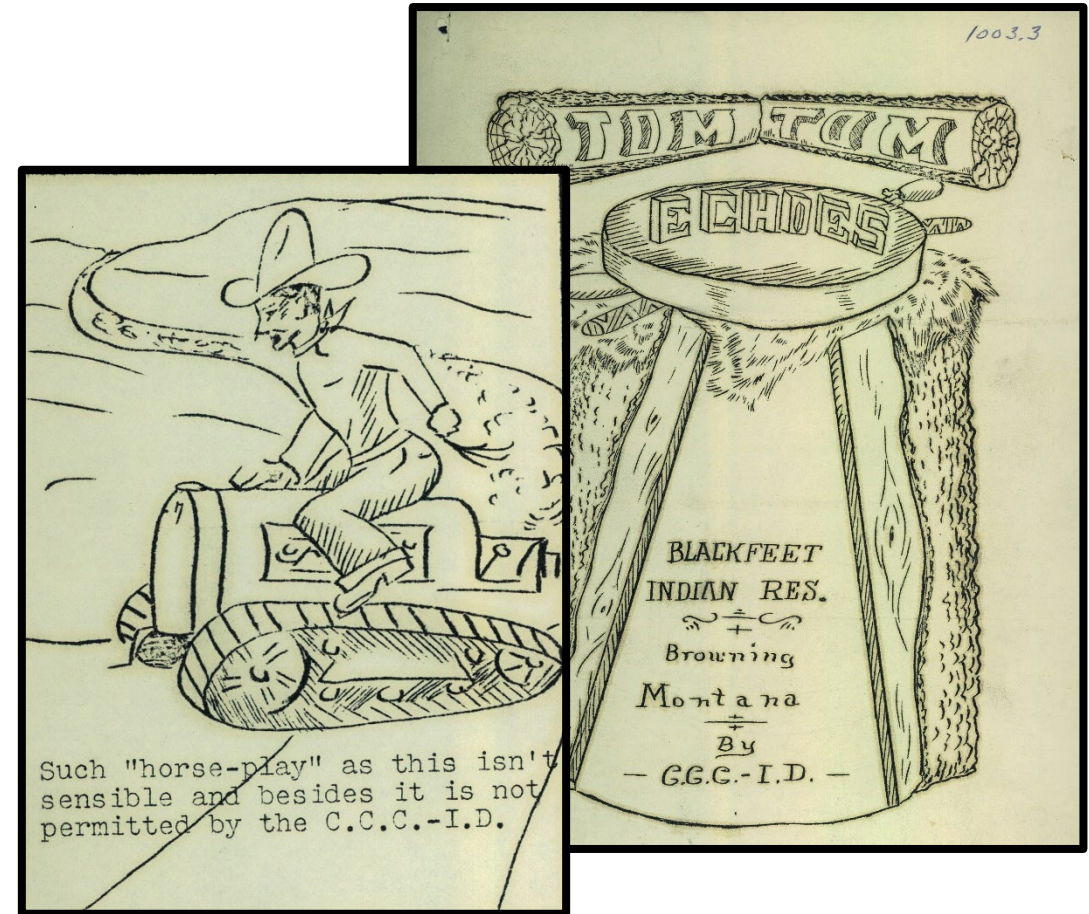
The following trees recently received from the Soil Conservation Service at Shiprock, New Mexico, have been planted by CCC-ID enrollees on the reservations noted below:
