The Records of the Office of the Provost Marshal General and Enemy Prisoners of War Held in the United States During World War II

Q1: Does the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) have records of individual enemy prisoners of war (POWs/PWs)?

A1: No. Records related to individual POWs/PWs were returned to their home countries after the war. Please contact national or military archives in those countries for more information.

Q2: Where can I find information about the types of records or about the series of records in Record Group 389: Records of the Office of the Provost Marshal General, 1920–1975? **A2:** Depending what you are looking for, you can:

Q8: Does the National Archives (NARA) have any pictures of POWs and POW camps? **A8:** NARA does <u>not</u> have photographs of individual POWs. There are also **no** separate series of photographs in RG 389, although there may be an occasional photograph mixed in with the textual records.

There are some photographic series in other record groups that include images of POWs and POW camps; however, most of the names of the individuals who appear in are unknown. Here

are several series that include digitized photographs that are available and searchable in the Catalog:
