

WHAT CAN I DO IN THIS SPACE?

The Innovation Hub provides a space for the public to:

transcribe documents • tag documents • scan documents in our holdings

When you scan National Archives records in the Hub, you receive digital copies free of charge. Your scans will also be uploaded into the NARA Catalog. We are also a space for the public and staff to collaborate on projects that move the agency forward. These are just a few of the projects we are working on now.

HOW CAN I USE THE MEETING SPACE?

You can use our meeting area for transcription, tagging, and innovative programs and events.

HOW CAN I USE THE SCANNERS?

You can use our citizen scanning room for scanning files of records: you'll get to keep a copy of the scans, and we'll upload a copy to our catalog and give you the credit. In order to scan you must commit to an entire file's worth of materials.

Citizen Scanning

If you're registered as a researcher at the National Archives in Washington, DC, have your records brought directly to the Hub for scanning. You'll take home a digital copy of your scans, and we'll upload a copy to our National Archives Catalog.
