


# THE PRESIDENT'S INTELLIGENCE CHECKLIST

#### 1. Laos

- a. Souvanna, still in Paris, gives evidence of being troubled by the Nam Tha action and has promised to send a message to his headquarters in the Plaine des Jarres registering his disapproval. He admitted to having few if any troops at Nam Tha and said queries about an ICC investigation would have to be made to Souphannouvong.
- b. We have no word yet as to Moscow's reaction to a British request for its cooperation in obtaining an ICC investigation.
- c. US aerial reconnaissance carried out yesterday revealed signs that the Royal army force withdrawing from Nam Tha was still under some enemy pressure. This makes the government's contention that an orderly, pre-planned regroupment is under way sound overly-optimistic.
- d. There is, meanwhile, new evidence of a swelling Chinese Communist presence nearby. Aerial photography reveals that the Chinese are now working on a railroad in Yunan province in the direction of the Burmese border and toward a possible link-up with the road they have been building into northern Laos—this at a time when economic stringency has forced Peiping to drop many of its building projects.

 Reported Soviet announcement of test resumption Our monitoring facilities have not picked up any flat-out declaration from Moscow of intent to resume testing. The broadcast to Japan, which is the basis of this morning's press stories, appears to have been one made over the weekend in which the Soviets merely restated their contention that they cannot stand idly by in the face of our tests.

3. Sputnik XVI linked to lunar flight study

Data on the most recent space vehicle—the one launched on April 26 and recovered 3 days later—in—dicate that it is part of a new phase in the Soviet space program which aims at extending the duration of manned flights in near—earth orbits as a step toward manned lunar exploration. In size and other characteristics it is akin to the Vostok vehicles which carried Gagarin and Titov aloft.

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4. Syria

a. The escape from prison yesterday of one-time strong-arm security chief Abdul Sarraj, a UAR vice president under Nasir, introduces another element of instability into the volatile mixture. There is a suspicion in Damascus, however, that the government, although it has expressed a proper chagrin, had no enthusiasm for bringing to trial a leading symbol of Nasirite socialism.

b. The notion that the US is backing Nasir in Syria has gained widespread credence there, to the extent that our Embassy people are much embarrassed. Thanks are due, in part at least, to the French who are broadcasting to that effect

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#### NOTES

A. UN authorities in the Congo have no information to confirm the allegations aired by the central government over the weekend of fighting between its forces and Tshombé's gendarmerie in northern Katanga. Present indications are that the charges are either groundless or much-exaggerrated.

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C. Cuba is reaping the results of its noisy and anything but inbetween performance at Belgrade last September, and since, and does not figure in Yugoslavia's plans for the next non-aligned economic conference for which the spade work is now being done.
