COMMENTS:

After review of the submission, SHPO concurs that the Harry S. Truman Library at 500 West US Highway 24 is listed in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP). According to the additional information provided in the latest submission, all of the landscape updates that are being proposed for this project were originally part of the Library's 2020 renovation plan. These prospective changes were already reviewed in 2018, at which time it was noted that the undertaking would have no adverse effects. SHPO concurs that the scope of work (which includes adding sidewalks, a monument sign, outdoor classroom area, and picnic areas; replacing some roadway lighting; making changes to irrigation lines; replacing soil; and planting trees and other plants) will have **no adverse effect**.
