Dear Mr. McGahn:

In accordance with the requirements of the Presidential Records Act (PRA), as amended, 44 U.S.C. §§2201-2209, this letter constitutes a formal notice from the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) to the incumbent President of our intent to open Clinton Presidential records in response to the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests listed in Attachment A.

These records, consisting of 68,061 pages, have been reviewed for all applicable FOIA exemptions, resulting in 10,248 pages restricted in whole or in part. NARA is proposing to open the remaining 57,813 pages. A copy of any records proposed for release under this notice will be provided to you upon your request.

We are also concurrently informing former President Clinton's representative, Bruce Lindsey, of our intent to release these records. Pursuant to 44 U.S.C. 2208(a), NARA will release the records 60 working days from the date of this letter, which is June 6, 2018, unless the former or incumbent President requests a one-time extension of an additional 30 working days or asserts a constitutionally based privilege, in accordance with 44 U.S.C. 2208(b)-(d). Please let us know if you are able to complete your review before the expiration of the 60 working day period. Pursuant to 44 U.S.C. 2208(a)(1)(B), we will make this notice available to the public on the NARA website.

This researcher submitted a Freedom of Information (FOIA) request for records related to the Reverend Jesse L. Jackson, Sr. Special Envoy for the President and the Secretary of State for Promotion of Democracy in Africa. The Clinton Presidential records proposed for opening include correspondence, memoranda, reports, emails, administrative paperwork, transcripts of press briefings, press releases, foreign press compilations, and speeches. Electronic records include weekly reports, USIA compilations of international media, and lists of names for consideration and invitation to events and travels related to Africa.

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2015-0491-F	Gore-Chernomyrdin Commission and the Global Positioning System, Satellites, and Space Policy	3,262	1,859	1,404

This researcher submitted a Freedom of Information (FOIA) request for records relating to the Gore-Chernomyrdin Commission and the Global Positioning System (GPS), satellites, and space policy. The Clinton Presidential records proposed for opening consist of 1993 and 1994 Gore-Chernomyrdin Commission meeting briefing books, cables and emails pertaining to Gore-Chernomyrdin Commission meetings, press briefings, press releases, science, technology, and space cooperation, commercial space launches, and speech transcripts pertaining to President Clinton's visit to Russia and Ukraine in May 1995.

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2016-0152-F (segment 2)	Robert Bell Chron Files 1995—February 1998	27,315	6,243	21,072

This researcher submitted a Freedom of Information (FOIA) request for the chronological records -- Chron Files -- of Robert G. Bell, Special Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs and Senior Director for Defense Policy and Arms Control, National Security Council (NSC). The Clinton Presidential records proposed for opening primarily consist of issues related to the United States military and non-proliferation issues. It includes policy discussions on the drafting of Presidential Decision Directives (PDDs) as well as records related to treaties on landmines, Nonproliferation (NPT), and the Conventional Test Ban Treaty (CTBT). This material also includes a significant amount of correspondence from members of Congress to either President Clinton, Samuel Berger, or Donald Kerrick. Also present is correspondence from President Clinton to the Senate on nominations to the US military office corps. The bulk of the records contain memoranda and correspondence dealing with administration policies concerning the daily operations of the military. This includes those related to military operations in Bosnia, tensions over Iraqi disarmament issues, and the 1997

Ottawa treaty to ban the use / production of anti-personnel landmines. There are also a number of approvals for various Significant Military Exercises, scheduling proposals for President Clinton to attend military related functions such as the Army vs. Navy football game, and records related to meetings of the National Security Telecommunications Advisory Committee (NSTC). There are a number of Legislative Referral Memorandum (LRM) on proposed legislation or testimony to be given before congressional committees and various administrative paperwork related to the operation of the directorate.

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2016-0531-F	Minimum Wage/Living Wage	13,210	343	12,867

This researcher submitted a Freedom of Information (FOIA) request for material related to the minimum wage and living wage. The Clinton Presidential records proposed for opening consist of emails, articles, background papers, clippings, correspondence, draft legislation and legislative summaries, graphs, issue briefs, lists of votes cast, models, notes, pamphlets, press releases, remarks, reports, scheduling materials, statistical charts, statements and testimony, tables, and talking points concerning this topic. Correspondence describes efforts both for and against a minimum wage, legislative strategy, legislative issues such as the Earned Income Tax Credit, and also state and local minimum wage campaigns. This correspondence is primarily between the White House, members of Congress, non-profits, religious leaders, research and policy institutes, and unions. Emails include meeting summaries, internal correspondence, policy discussions, background material, drafts of memoranda, statements, talking points, and Q&As.

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2017-0395-F	NSC and CF files related to the Free Trade of the Americas	622	203	419

This researcher submitted a Freedom of Information (FOIA) request for NSC and CF textual records related to the Free Trade Area of the Americas. The Clinton Presidential records proposed for opening consist of news articles; White House meeting schedules and agendas; travel related materials such as tickets; authorization forms for staff to travel to summit meeting places; reports to Congress on various trade negotiations; pre-summit strategy reports; summit meeting working group reports; and trade ministerial meeting minutes.

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2017-1075-F	Lifetime Learning Tax Credit, student loan interest deduction, and educational IRAs, 1996-1998	14,932	28	14,904

This researcher submitted a Freedom of Information (FOIA) request for material between 1996-1998 related to the 1997 Taxpayer Relief Act, specifically the Lifetime Learning Tax Credit, educational IRAs, and the student loan interest tax deduction. The Clinton Presidential records proposed for

opening consist of correspondence among Department of Education, National Economic Council, and Department of Treasury officials (most notably Robert "Bob" Shireman, who led the interagency efforts to expand upon and improve tax cuts for higher education via the HOPE Scholarship and Lifetime Learning Credits). There is external correspondence with stakeholders (i.e. higher education association directors, board members, etc.), including a financial aid listserv that served as a forum for higher education officials to discuss the proposed legislation, its implementation, and its impact. There are summaries of meetings with stakeholders and legislators regarding the proposed education credits. There are press briefings, press clippings, reports, memoranda, drafts of statements and memoranda, the Families' Guide to the 1997 Tax Cuts, talking points, fact sheets, and schedules. There is also the text of the Taxpayer Relief Act printed from the 1997 version of the Speaker of the House's website.

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2018-0316-F	Letters from President Clinton to Kim Jong Il	29	0	29

This researcher submitted a Freedom of Information (FOIA) request for two letters written by President Clinton to North Korean leader Kim Jong Il. The first was delivered by William Perry in May 1999, and the second by Madeleine Albright in October 2000. The Clinton Presidential records proposed for opening consist of copies of the letters, draft versions of the letters, routing paperwork and cover memoranda for the two letters.
