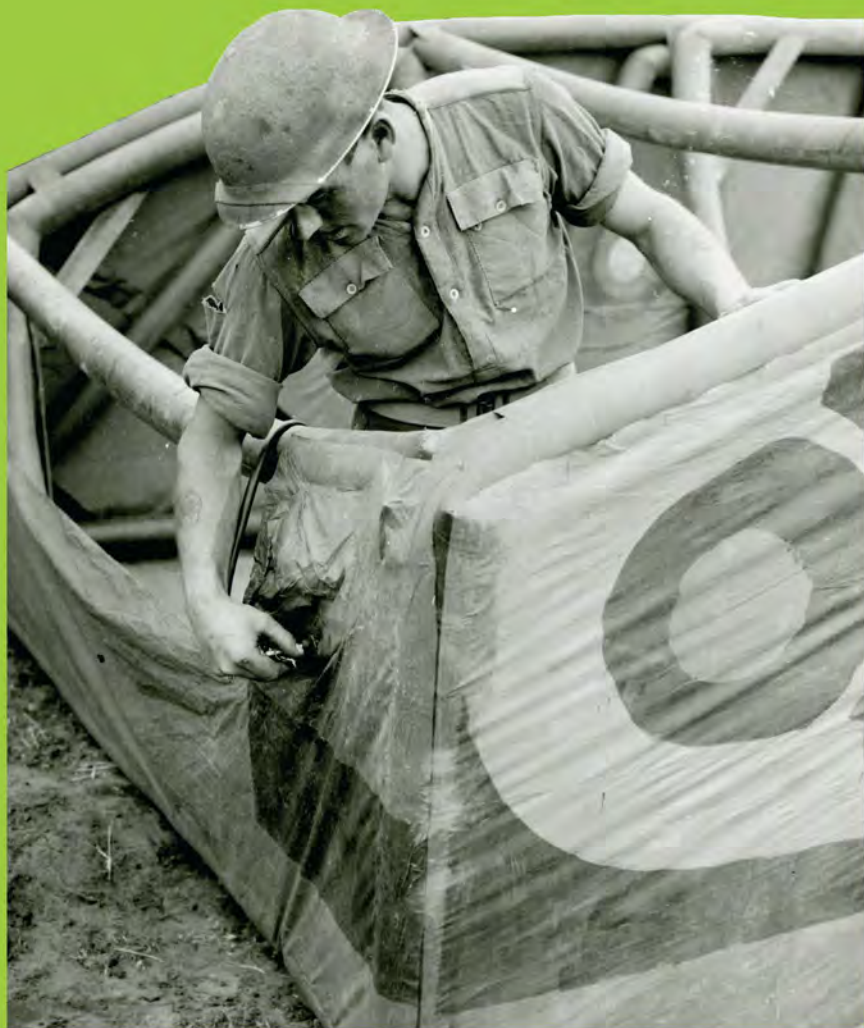

Saturday, July 13 – Who We Are: A Genealogist's Introduction to the National Archives at 10:00 – 11:00 AM

Ever wonder what the National Archives is and how it can help you discover your family's past? This course will give an overview of the mission of the National Archives, its holdings, and Federal records of particular interest to family historians. Learn what to expect when researching at the National Archives.

Friday, August 16 – Exploring Fold3.com at 10:00 – 11:30 AM

Fold3.com takes its name from the "third fold in flag-folding ceremony [honoring and remembering] veterans for their sacrifice in defending their country and promoting peace in the world." This subscription-based website provides digital access to select military records held in the National Archives. Learn what resources are available for various military engagements and how to search them. Bring a WiFi enabled device to follow along.

Friday, August 23 - Googling Your Genealogy at 10:00 – 11:30 AM

Searching online can be a powerful tool when seeking historical documents and resources. One of the biggest challenges is knowing how and where to start looking for them. Learn to harness the power of the internet through the use of simple tools and tricks for finding websites and useful genealogy resources. This is a methodology course.

Wednesday, November 6 – Dawes Rolls Decoded: Understanding Records of the Five Civilized Tribes at 10:00 – 11:30 AM

Dawes Records, created between 1898 and 1914, provide detailed information regarding tribal citizenship for members of the Five Civilized Indian Tribes: Cherokee, Chickasaw, Creek, Choctaw, and Seminole. Learn about the history of these records, how to search for them, and how to avoid common assumptions and pitfalls. Computer and WiFi Access

Patrons of the National Archives at Kansas City are welcome to access many subscription-based genealogy websites using one of ten public computers or their personal WiFi devices.

Directions:

From I-35N Take I-35 North to Southwest/Pennway exit (1C). Turn right (East) on Pennway to Broadway St. Turn right (South) on Broadway St. to Pershing Rd. Turn left (East) on Pershing Rd. At the first stoplight, turn left (North).

From I-70W, I-670, and I-35S Take I-70 West to I-670 to the Downtown Loop. Exit to I-35 South. Exit at 20th Street. At 20th, turn left (East) to Broadway St. Turn right (South) on Broadway St. to Pershing Rd. Turn left (East) on Pershing Rd. At the first stoplight turn left (North).
