As 2009 marks the National Archives' 75th anniversary, many celebrations have taken place throughout the year to explore the Archives' history, examine the records in its holdings, and educate visitors about the vital importance of this institution. On March 12th, the Foundation was proud to invite special guests to an exclusive evening devoted to the Archives' "biggest" celebration, the opening of its 75th anniversary exhibition, *BIG!*

In thanks for the significant support that makes exhibitions like BIG! possible, the Foundation was delighted to welcome Society members and their invited guests to experience this unique display of big records, big ideas, and big events from the Archives' holdings before it opened to the public. Curators were also on hand to answer any questions guests had while exploring items such as the 13-by-13 foot Civil Warera map of the Gettysburg battlefield, a drawing for the refitting of the SS Leviathan measuring over 21 feet long, or a 5 foot 7 inch tall spool containing a petition signed by 150,000 people.

By combining historically significant documents such as the original Articles of Confederation and a rare Dunlap Broadside of the Declaration of Independence with unexpected artifacts such as Shaquille O'Neal's size 22 shoe, the Archives is able to better educate visitors about its wide-ranging role as our nation's official record keeper.

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Foundation Awards Highest Honor to Pulitzer Prize-Winning Author, Historian Annette Gordon-Reed

Distinguished presidential scholar, professor, and author Annette Gordon-Reed will be honored at the Foundation for the National Archives' annual black-tie Gala on September 15 as the recipient of the 2009 Records of Achievement Award.

Gordon-Reed was awarded the 2009 Pulitzer Prize in History for her book *The Hemingses of Monticello:* An American Family, about President Thomas Jefferson's slave family. She also received the 2008 National Book Award for the book, making her the first African-American woman to win the non-fiction award in its 59-year history.

The Foundation's annual award recognizes an individual who has played a major role in increasing the public's understanding of the National Archives, our nation, and its history. Previous recipients of the award include James McPherson, John Hope Franklin, David McCullough, Tom Brokaw, and Brian Lamb.

"We are very pleased to honor Professor Gordon-Reed," said Foundation President Ken Lore. "Through her research and writing on Thomas Jefferson, Sally Hemings, and their descendents, she teaches us how



integral the African-American experience is to the American story. Like her fellow awardees, she has made history more accessible to the American public through her use of primary documents, including those that are held and preserved by the National Archives."

Gordon-Reed first became interested in Thomas Jefferson as a young girl in still-segregated east Texas when she read a children's biography about him. Then, at age 14, while concealing her status as a minor, she joined a Book-

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Foundation President Ken Lore Off to a Running Start

Ken Lore, who became Chairman and President of the Foundation for the National Archives in January, is no stranger to most Society members. A partner and co-chair of global real estate in the law firm Bingham McCutchen, Lore has played an important role on the Foundation's board for the past six and a half years, serving as vice president before taking over the reins from former President Tom Wheeler.

As past chairman of the Foundation's Capital Campaign Committee, Lore understands the great potential of the Boeing Learning Center in educating the public. Creating a "board challenge," he led the way in raising an additional \$1 million to build a cutting-edge ReSource Room and Learning Lab for the Learning Center, which are helping the National Archives improve civics and history education in classrooms nationwide.

Now, as President, Lore has big plans for the future.

"The challenge," he said, "is to maintain existing efforts and simultaneously expand the scope of the *National Archives Experience*. This will require new resources, vision, and tenacity."



During his term as President, Lore hopes to build stronger ties with local communities by expanding educational activities in Washington, on the Web, and through traveling exhibits, including the planned *Discovering the Civil War* exhibition, which will premiere in the Lawrence F. O'Brien Gallery in 2010.

Lore, who has a passion for history and is dedicated to instilling that passion in young people, also is working on outreach to high school students, particularly those in underserved communities, in an effort to produce a generation of more informed and involved citizens. Already, he has initiated and facilitated a new partnership between the National Archives and its Boeing Learning Center and the Marshall-Brennan Constitutional Literacy Project of American University Law School.

The Marshall-Brennan Project enables second- and third-year law students to give back to the community by teaching courses on constitutional law and juvenile justice in public high schools in the District of Columbia and Maryland. Beginning this fall, the law school fellows and their high school students will visit the Archives together to view the official Constitution and to participate in the "Constitution-in-Action" lab in the Boeing Learning Center. Students will be introduced to the major themes of the revered document and the role it plays in our daily lives by working with a variety of archival records. ■

Michael Beschloss serves as vice president of the Foundation for the National Archives, which he has served for ten years, and is also a Society member. He has written nine awardwinning books on American Presidents, most recently the *New York Times* best-

In addition to being an author and historian, Michael Beschloss serves as the NBC News Presidential Historian and is a regular commentator on PBS's *The NewsHour with Jim Lehrer*. In 2005, he won an Emmy for the Discovery Channel's "Decisions That Shook the World," of which he was host. Besides his work with the National Archives, Beschloss also serves as a trustee of the White House Historical Association and is a former trustee of the Thomas Jefferson Foundation (Monticello).

Besides her decades at the World Bank, Afsaneh has worked at J.P.

Morgan in corporate finance in London and New York, and for Shell International Group Planning in London. She has also taught international trade at Oxford University, from which she holds a Master of Philosophy degree in economics. She is currently trustee of the Ford Foundation and the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation.

The Beschlosses live in Washington, DC, with their two sons, who are both particularly interested in National Archives holdings that pertain to the history of baseball.
