SUBJECT: Appointments of Paula L. Brown and Donald V. Seibert to the President's Advisory Committee on Women's Business Ownership

By Executive Order 12426 (June 22, 1983) the President is authorized to appoint no more than 15 members to the President's Advisory Committee on Women's Business Ownership, which is to review the status of businesses owned by women, foster private sector support for women entrepreneurs, and advise the President and the Small Business Administration ("SBA") on these issues. Members "shall have particular knowledge and expertise concerning the current status of businesses owned by women in the economy and methods by which these enterprises might be encouraged to expand."

Paula Brown (a.k.a. Paula Winningham) is the President of P.L. Brown Associates, an industrial management consulting firm. Her firm receives direct assistance from the SBA, one of the entities this Commission is to advise. I do not view this as a disabling conflict, however, in light of the very general advisory responsibilities of the Commission. (I might feel differently if the Commission's role were specifically to review the SBA, but that is not the case.)

Donald V. Seibert retired last fall as Chairman of the Board and CEO of J.C. Penney Co., Inc. His extensive business experience and membership in numerous organizations and groups concerned with business issues suffice to satisfy the expertise requirement for appointees to this Commission. Mr. Seibert has been involved as a defendant in typical corporate litigation against J.C. Penney. This involvement has, however, been in his official capacity as Chairman of the Board, and accordingly represents no obstacle to his appointment.

By Executive Order 12426 (June 22, 1983) the President is authorized to appoint no more than 15 members to the President's Advisory Committee on Women's Business Ownership, which is to review the status of businesses owned by women, foster private sector support for women entrepreneurs, and advise the President and the Small Business Administration on these issues. Members "shall have particular knowledge and expertise concerning the current status of businesses owned by women in the economy and methods by which these enterprises might be encouraged to expand."

Corlene Cathcart, [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] She is Vice-President and Comptroller of Majo Ranch. Clara Giordano recently retired after 18 years of owning and operating a pizza parlor. Both clearly satisfy the expertise requirement of the Executive Order. Malcolm MacKillop is Senior Vice President for Corporate Relations at Pacific Gas and Electric. He is less obviously associated with women's business issues, but may be considered to possess the requisite expertise in light of his broad business and legal background and service on numerous advisory panels on business issues. Neither MacKillop nor Giordano have any financial interests likely to present a conflict of interest. Cathcart, of course, has interests in businesses owned by women, the subject matter of the advisory committee. In light of the general advisory role of the committee, however, these interests should not be considered a bar to her appointment.

As we have discussed, I have not yet received a PDS from Donald Seibert or Paula Brown.

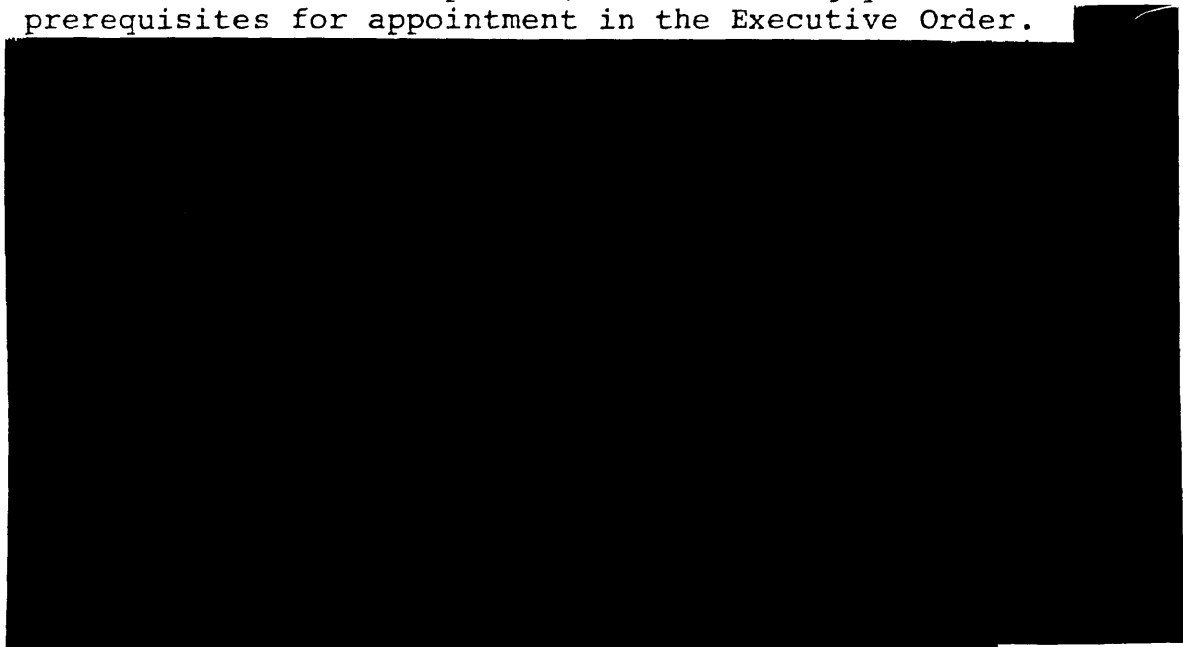



I have reviewed the SF-278 and related materials submitted by Mr. Shlaudeman in connection with his prospective nomination to be Ambassador to Guatemala, and have no objections to going forward with the nomination.



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Mr. Shlaudeman served as Deputy Chief of Mission in Santiago during 1969-1973, and as Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Inter-American Affairs during 1973-1975, and he notes that he was identified with the controversial U.S. policy toward Chile during the Allende period. He volunteers that he was attacked in Congress and elsewhere for allegedly attempting to mislead the House Foreign Affairs Committee in testimony he delivered in 1974 on U.S. involvement in Chile. Shlaudeman has been confirmed by the Senate for three different posts since then, so I consider the episode safely behind him.
