The National Archives is the nation's recordkeeper, home to your history and heritage. Our records provide essential documentation of the rights of American citizens, the actions of the government and our national experience. We are free and open to the public.

The National Archives at New York City maintains and provides access to thousands of documents, photographs, maps, drawings, and other historic artifacts, from more than 100 Federal agencies in New York, New Jersey, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands. We welcome you to visit our office to learn more about us.

Every year we host a series of information sessions to educate the public about the National Archives. We provide overviews of our holdings and government initiatives, explain archival research strategies, and provide a behind the scenes tour of our stacks and facility to highlight some of our treasured originals, i.e.: *President John Adams 1789 appointment of a New York District Court judge, the early 19th century Attorney Roll signed by both Aaron Burr and Alexander Hamilton, Civil War era "Slave Receipts", records relating to the Titanic disaster, Martin Luther King Jr.'s "I Have a Dream" copyright infringement case and so much more.*
