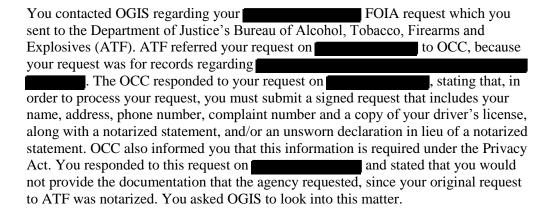

Your request for assistance concerns your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to the Department of the Treasury's Office of the Comptroller of the Currency (OCC).

Congress created OGIS to complement existing FOIA practice and procedure and we strive to work in conjunction with the existing request and appeal process. OGIS's goal, whenever practical, is to allow the requester to exhaust his or her remedies within the agency, including the appeal process. OGIS has no investigatory or enforcement power, nor can we compel an agency to process a particular request before others. OGIS serves as the Federal FOIA Ombudsman and our jurisdiction is limited to assisting with the FOIA process.



Please know, when an individual requests access to his or her own records, it is most often, but not always, considered a Privacy Act, or first-party, request. Privacy Act matters are outside the scope of our office's mission as the FOIA Ombudsman. However, many Privacy Act requests overlap with FOIA; therefore, OGIS provides ombuds services, including providing information about the process and the status of requests, to individuals requesting their own records. OGIS does not have a statutory role in reviewing policies, procedures and compliance with the Privacy Act as we do with FOIA. In addition, OGIS has no investigatory or enforcement power, nor can we compel an agency to release documents.



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OGIS contacted the FOIA Public Liaison for the Department of the Treasury to discuss your request. We learned, in order for the agency to process your request, you must submit the documentation the agency requested in its letter. We note that in your letter to the agency you noted that the agency did not send you a telephone number you could use to contact the agency; we asked Treasury for this information and the agency provided the following number: (202) 649-6758. We also enclosed a copy of the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency's FOIA regulations.

We hope this information about the Treasury's requirements to process your FOIA request is helpful to you. At this time, OGIS can offer no further assistance. Thank you for bringing this matter to OGIS. We will close your case.
