Dear agents of the United States, With respect to Case 1:15-cv-00021-DB-PMW before the United States District Court for the District of Utah: (1) "CRYPTIC" actually means the secret regulations prescribed under *Section 206 of Pub. L. 107-347 ("E-Government Act")* sometime since December 17, 2002 by the **Administrative Committee of the Federal Register (ACFR)**, which have authorized the distribution of the matters codified under *5 USC 552(a)(1)* and *553(b)* and *1 CFR 5.9(b)* to the ubiquitous electronic internet versions of the Federal Register on the Executive Branch "**dot gov**" websites which should, when I need to be guided with respect to administrative laws, be available to me **for free** on a computer in the land-grant college in Logan, Utah constituted on March 1, 1907 as a Federal Depository Library (FDL-UT) under *Chapter 2284 of Public, No. 153*; (2) "CONFUSING" actually means all such Executive Branch "**dot gov**" websites' Federal Register buttons which have been **cryptically** prescribed by the ACFR under the **E-Government Act** to be "clicked" on by me in order to navigate to and find the matters codified under *5 USC 552(a)(1)* and *1 CFR 5.9(b)* if I'm able to access **for free** a computer in the FDL-UT when I need to be guided with respect to administrative laws; and (3) "**NEARLY UNINTELLIGIBLE**" actually means the cryptic manner prescribed by the **ACFR** under the **E-Government Act** in which the matters codified under *5 USC 552(a)(1)* and *1 CFR 5.9(b)* are to be published on such Executive Branch "**dot gov**" websites' if I'm able to access **for free** a computer in the FDL-UT when I need to be guided with respect to administrative laws. To my knowledge, 44 USC 1902 and 1911 or the E-Government Act do not mandate that I buy a home-based-computer and pay an internet subscription fee in order to access an Executive Branch "dot gov" website and then "click" on a Federal Register button to navigate to Federal Register documents when I need to be guided with respect to administrative laws.**
