After ninety-five years, NOAA finds the wreck of the *USS Conestoga* three miles off the Farallons

On March 23, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and the U.S. Navy announced the discovery of the USS Conestoga (AT 54) in the Greater Farallons National Marine Sanctuary off San Francisco, 95 years after the Navy seagoing fleet tugboat disappeared with 56 officers and sailors aboard. The discovery solves one of the top maritime mysteries in U.S. Navy history.

On March 25, 1921, Conestoga departed the Golden Gate en route to Tutuila, American Samoa via Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. When Conestoga failed to reach Hawaii by its anticipated arrival date the Navy mounted a massive air and sea search around the Hawaiian Islands, the tug's destination. Nearly two months later, on May 17, a merchant vessel found a battered lifeboat with the letter "C" on its bow off the Mexican coast leading to a search there.

For months, the ship's mysterious disappearance gripped newspapers across the country. Unable to locate the ship or wreckage, the Navy declared Conestoga and its crew lost on June 30, 1921. This was the last

Making Use of General Records Schedules Crosswalks

NARA is currently working on a five-year project to revise and reorganize the General Records Schedules (GRS). For example, we reported in the last issue of *Pacific Currents* on the revised retention for contracts from six years and three months to six years. Revised GRS schedules are issued in GRS Transmittals as they are approved.

New schedules published in GRS Transmittals are not one-to-one replacements of old schedules. Crosswalks provide temporary bridges to help agencies understand what has changed in the GRS and how to convert superseded authorities to new authorities. Once the new GRS is completed and in place long enough for agencies to use it with agility, the importance of these crosswalks will diminish. Eventually, they will no longer be needed at all. But right now, they are your key to understanding the full scope of change.

Two types of GRS crosswalks trace conversion from both ends of the equation: old-to-new and new-to-

U.S. Navy ship to be lost without a trace in peacetime.

In 2009, the NOAA Office of Coast Survey, as part of a hydrographic survey near the Farallon Islands 30 miles off San Francisco, documented a probable, uncharted shipwreck. In October 2015, NOAA confirmed the identification and location of Conestoga during a mission that included an archaeologist from the Naval History and Heritage

Command, as well as several senior Navy officers. The team conducted part of its research at the *National Archives at San Francisco* (San Bruno) in *Mare Island Naval Shipyard* records documenting repair work on Conestoga just prior to her final voyage.

The Conestoga now rests on the seafloor as a military grave for its 56 crew, the remains of whom may remain entombed inside the hull.

The wreck remains a U.S. Navy vessel. This discovery has provided closure for the families of the Conestoga's crew, and the site is now marked and protected by the National Marine Sanctuary Act and the Sunken Military Craft Act.

Wright Brothers' Patent Found!

Starting on May 20, 2016, the National Archives will celebrate the 110th anniversary of the awarding of the Orville and Wilbur Wright "flying machine" patent with a special document display in its West Rotunda Gallery on Constitution Ave. NW, between 7th & 9th St., on the Mall in downtown Washington, DC.

The Wright patent was awarded on May 22, 1906 and assigned patent number 821,393. Portions of the file were last displayed in 1979 to commemorate the 75th anniversary of the Wright Brothers' first flight. However, after the loaned pages were returned to the National Archives the patent file went missing.

The missing patent file was located last month following a search after having been misfiled among more than 269 million pages of patent records held by the National Archives.

Portions of the patent file were last displayed at the Smithsonian Institution's Air and Space Museum in 1978 and 1979 to commemorate the 75th anniversary of the Wright Brother's First Flight.

The loaned pages were returned to the National Archives but subsequently the entire patent file could not be located and has been highlighted as missing until **now**. The National Archives holds more than 107,600 cubic feet of patent files. This patent file was inadvertently refiled in the wrong box.

old. Crosswalks attached to each new schedule compare new items to old ones. These list new items on the left and old (superseded) items on the right. Going the opposite direction is a single crosswalk tracking [old-to-new conversion](#) (.pdf) for the entire old GRS. It shows old items on the left, and superseding new items on the right.

How to read a crosswalk

Each "side" of the crosswalk contains schedule and item numbers, an abbreviated retention statement, and the legal authority for the disposition. [See this annotated pdf](#) for details on how the two sides match up.

How to make use of crosswalk information

1. Use crosswalks to update your agency records disposition manual. If your manual imports GRS items verbatim, you need to know when they have been superseded. Use crosswalks to search for and identify superseded GRS items and update your manual with current, authoritative information.
2. Use crosswalks to update your agency records disposition manual. If you reference GRS disposition authorities or have approved deviations to GRS items, you need to determine if those GRS items have been superseded by a new GRS transmittal.

This is particularly true if your agency uses big-bucket schedules. Big buckets frequently incorporate records covered by the GRS into larger units for simplicity of scheduling. NARA requires you to inform it within 120 days of each new GRS transmittal if you intend to

continue using your approved big-bucket items based on old GRS items instead of newly published items superseding those old items on which your bucket item was based.

Here's where to look for links between agency items and GRS items.

- If your agency has an approved deviation to the GRS, the superseded GRS item(s) should appear on your approved schedule (SF-115 or equivalent) under superseded authorities.
- If you have a big-bucket schedule, supersession of GRS items should appear in its crosswalk as well as in the schedule under superseded authorities.
- If your agency manual includes items drawn directly from the GRS but incorporated into your manual for ease of one-stop shopping, check your manual for items whose authority is the GRS item. Agency records disposition manuals should cite the underlying disposition authority for the records, including GRS disposition authorities.

Updating disposition authorities and manuals will likely prove time consuming, particularly if your agency has not updated its manual in several years.
