Intelligence section operations also included briefing material on

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events and trends in Japan, such as Diet activities, subversives, defense work, anti-nuclear beliefs, and economics.

Daily issuances providing local psychological warfare units with decisions of planning meetings on treatment of news developments. Contains news summaries and policies on what items of news to report or not to report in broadcasts to China and Korea. Includes directives on what news commentaries should state. Stress is on assorted problems in communist countries and on U.S. military strength and peaceful intentions. Those news items not to be reported generally reflect poorly on U.S. or West and/or well on communist bloc.

12 Propaganda Analysis Files, ca. 1953-55, 3 in.

Daily and weekly issuances of analyses of communist propaganda. Each daily issuance focuses on a specific problem or situation in a particular country, - China, North Korea, Vietnam, or the Soviet Far East. The focus generally concerns economic development in both the industrial and agricultural sectors. The issuance analyzes the situation and suggests possible themes for exploitation by U.S. propaganda. Weekly issuances provide overviews and analyses of communist propaganda as a whole during that week.

13 Psychological Warfare Weekly Activity Reports, ca. 1954-57, 8 in.

Weekly issuances providing reports on changes in existing facilities, and a breakdown of propaganda by themes, language, and media used. Operation goals were to demonstrate the moral and spiritual strength of the free world, expose inhuman conditions under communism, and undermine faith in communist governments. Basic themes presented are free world strength and partnership, the value of free enterprise, communist oppression, brutality, and duplicity, United States foreign aid program, and the spread of atomic reactors through Atoms-for-Peace program. Propaganda was geared toward Korean civilians and North Korean and Communist Chinese troops. Series includes posters on a variety of topics.

Rosters and lists of American MIA's and POW's, including rosters for each branch of military service; listings of liberated U.S. POW's; change of status reports documenting change from MIA to POW status; International Red Cross list; lists of unconfirmed POW's; and correspondence with next-of-kin, including copies of letters sent by POW's to their families. Lists and rosters generally provide name, rank, service number, organization, and date of MIA status.

Transcripts of broadcasts by Radio Peiping of statements by UN POW's testifying to the good treatment they are receiving from the Chinese and urging their families to work for peace. Includes statements and interviews relating to alleged American use of germ warfare in Korea, and lists of POW's making broadcasts.

Photographs of United States POW's and other UNC POW's held by North Koreans and Communist Chinese. Photographs were obtained from Chinese publications, European news photographers, or an AP photographer held as a POW. They are frequently marked with identification of individual POW's.
