The documents generated the course of processing a elemency application are stored in individual case files.

by OPA staff; media reports, such as newspaper and magazine articles, relevant to the petition; the results of any background investigation conducted by the FBI; OPA's internal notes and memoranda about the merits of the case; correspondence with other government officials, such as the U.S. Attorney in the district of conviction and the sentencing judge, about the merits of the case; the Justice Department's report and recommendation to the President in each case; decisional memoranda from the White House Counsel's office to the Justice Department; and, if granted, the clemency warrants evidencing the President's action. Approximately 30 cubic feet.
