Background Information	<p>Marvin Hoffenberg, who collected this set of records, attended Ohio State University where he received his Bachelor's Degree and Masters Degree. He also completed his course and residence requirements in Social Statistics for a PHD from Ohio State University before being lured away at the beginning of World War II to join the Roosevelt administration to become a new deal economist at the US Department of Labor where he served from 1941 to 1952. He was the Bureau of Labor Statistics expert on national accounts.</p> <p>The historical background of the Bureau of Labor Statistics' work in input-output analysis provides the context for these records. The purpose of the program was to develop economic and social policies to meet the assumed changes in the structure of employment that would follow a cessation of defense production. The input-output analysis was used as an analytical tool to aid this effort: studying the changes in a post-defense economy. Input-output analysis is one of a set of related methods which show how the parts of a system are affected by a change in one part of that system. In this case it shows how industries are linked together through supplying inputs for the output of the economy. Most uses of the input-output analysis focuses on the matrix set of inter-industry exchanges but the actual focus of the analysis from the perspective of most national statistical agencies which produce the tables is the benchmarking of gross domestic product. The study is comprised of the statistical implementation of inter-industry economics and includes project statements and proposals, flow models and data, dynamic model, final demand, manpower, commodity applications, applications to single plants, applications to single industries, regional applications and money flows.</p>

The most important work of the Inter-industries Studies section of BLS was concerned with the input-output study and the survey of the postwar employment expectations. Analyses were done for the War Production staff and the Inter-industry Studies section of BLS was the only Washington office that predicted a steel shortage and a high employment economy after the end of the war. According to the Battelle Memorial Institute's study, Interactions of Science and Technology in the Innovation Process: Some Case Studies, the Bureau's projections, "alone among postwar predictions," did not foresee a depression, and their correctness enhanced the standing of input-output analysis in the upper echelons of the Federal Government.

The work was done in collaboration with Wassily Leontief, a Russian born, German educated economist who spent decades as a member of the Harvard faculty. He devoted his middle and later decades to input-output economics; this work was the basis for his winning the Nobel Prize. According to Leontief "The Department of Labor was the first government agency to take an active interest in the 'input-output' approach to the study of the American economy and the continual cooperative relationship with its Bureau of Labor Statistics has benefited our work most decisively."

The Bureau's second contribution consisted of a series of conceptual refinements. The most important of these was Hoffenberg's decision to take capital-account transactions out of the inter-industry portion of the table, facilitating the reconciliation of the input-output table and the national income accounts. The Bureau's input-output work also had indirect effects on how the Agency measured the economy. By developing input-output tables, it acquired a complete framework that required consistency and linkages between the different classification systems. Hoffenberg advanced both the construction and application of input-output tables.
