- b. Minneapolis Field Office, 1930s-40s.
Unarranged. Approximately 2/3 cubic foot.

Correspondence with the Central Office and other Federal agencies relating to fostering the traditional arts and crafts among the Northern Plains Indians.

Disposition. PERMANENT. Transfer immediately to the National Archives upon approval of this schedule.

- c. Southwest Field Office, 1950s-1969.
Arranged in rough chronological order.
Approximately 2 cubic feet.

The Southwest Field Office was responsible for encouraging traditional arts and crafts in Colorado, Arizona, New Mexico and Utah.

Correspondence with the Central Office and other government agencies, especially the Bureau of Indian Affairs, relating to fostering traditional arts and crafts among the Southwest tribes. The series also includes some records on the operation of the Hopi Arts and Crafts Guild and the Zuni Craftsmen Project.

Disposition. PERMANENT. Transfer immediately to the National Archives upon approval of this schedule.

- d. Alaska Field Office, late 1950s-1969.
Arranged in rough chronological order.
Approximately 6 cubic feet.

The Alaska Field Office was responsible for fostering the traditional arts and crafts in Nome, Juneau, Sitka and Anchorage.

The records in this series consist primarily of correspondence with the Central Office,

other government agencies and Alaskans involved with encouraging native arts and crafts. The records also document such special projects as the Sitka Demonstration workshop and the Shungnak Jade Project.

Disposition. PERMANENT. Transfer immediately to the National Archives upon approval of this schedule.

- e. Seminole Field Office, 1958-67.
Unarranged. Approximately 1/3 cubic foot.

Correspondence with the Central Office and other government agencies, especially the Bureau of Indian Affairs, relating to encouraging native arts and crafts.

Disposition. PERMANENT. Transfer immediately to the National Archives upon approval of this schedule.

- f. Portland Field Office, 1963-68. Arranged in rough chronological order. Approximately 3/4 cubic foot.

The Portland Field Office was responsible for the IACB activities in Oregon, California, Washington, Idaho and Nevada. The records in this series are very similar to those created by the other field offices and consist of correspondence to the Central Office and various government agencies, especially the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Disposition. PERMANENT. Transfer immediately to the National Archives upon approval of this schedule.

- g. Cherokee Field Office, 1968-83.

The Cherokee Field Office was responsible for encouraging native arts and crafts of the Eastern Cherokee and Choctaw tribes.

1. General Subject Correspondence Files of the Cherokee Field Office. Approximately

4 1/2 cubic feet. Unarranged.

The records in this series include correspondence with the Central Office, other Federal agencies and Indian artisans relating to the encouragement of native arts and crafts among the Eastern Cherokee and Choctaw Indians.

Disposition. PERMANENT. Transfer immediately to the National Archives upon approval of this schedule.

2. Audiovisual records of the Cherokee Field Office. Unarranged. Approximately 6 inches.

The records in this series include slides and various sized black and white still pictures documenting Indian artisans at work. Some of the photographs have captions.

Disposition. PERMANENT. Transfer immediately to the National Archives upon approval of this schedule.

3 Publications and studies contracted by the Indian Arts and Crafts Board, 1930s and 1940s. Unarranged. Approximately 2 cubic feet.

Publications include a series of studies on Hopi Crafts, material culture notes and reports, surveys of American Indian arts and crafts, and a report on Navajo trading.

Disposition. PERMANENT. Transfer immediately to the National Archives upon approval of this schedule.

4 "Blackfeet Tales" and "Napi Legends," 1940-43. Approximately two inches. Bound photocopies of an original typed manuscript.

These Blackfeet legends and morality tales were compiled under the auspices of the Montana Writers Project of the Public Works of Art Project. The original man-

uscript is located in the IACB-managed Museum of the Plains Indian.

Disposition. PERMANENT. Transfer immediately to the National Archives upon approval of this schedule.

5 **Still pictures of traditional Blackfeet Indian tipis, n.d. Unarranged. Approximately 6 inches.**

The photographs, some in black and white and others in color, are housed in individual, subject-captioned manila folders. The still pictures, most of which are approximately 8 x 10 inches, document the traditional motifs painted on Blackfeet Indian tipis, which frequently find their themes from the above-mentioned "Napi Legends" and "Blackfeet Tales."
