- (1) IDENTIFICATION OF RECORDS
 - <u>Title:</u> Study of Employer Supplementation of State-Required Workmen's Compensation.

Description: One machine readable file and related documentation. The data was collected in the first quarter of 1972. This file was prepared by Hay Associates for the written report <u>Study of Employer Supplementation</u> of State-Required Workmen's Compensation. This report served as the basis for the analysis of employer supplementation in <u>The Report of the National</u> Commission on State Workmen's Compensation Laws, Washington, D. C., July, 1972.

The data was collected in a survey done by Hay Associates of the companies with whom it normally does business. The responses to this survey covered 771 companies employing approximately 10 percent of the nation's nonagricultural workers. Each record describes the number of employees of a company in every state in which it operates plus a detailed listing of the types of supplementary benefits provided for these workers. However, the individual companies are listed only by non-public codes. There is no other description of the type of company.

On the other hand, the written report of Hay Associates does not contain the individual records given on the tape, but it does contain very detailed summary tables covering the various types of benefits offered, methods of payment, geographic breakdowns, and breakdowns by type of industry.

- (2) ESTIMATED VOLUME: Two mini-reels of magnetic tape and less than one cubic foot of documentation.
- (3) ARRANGEMENT: Each reel of magnetic tape contains the same records in a different character code. The sequence of records within the file is unknown. The sequence of data within each record is exactly described in the file documentation.

- (4) DOCUMENTATION: The documentation for these files contains complete information on the physical characteristics of the medium, the recording mode, the recording system, the record layout, and the code tables (with the exception of the codes for individual companies).
- (5) INTERSPERSION OF VALUELESS MATERIAL: None.
- (6) CONDITION: Condition of medium excellent; condition of data not yet verified.
- (7) FREQUENCY AND NATURE OF USE: Since most possible manipulations of the data have already been done and are available in the report of Hay Associates, and since the absence of any company identification (which was available to Hay and was used in the preparation of the printed report) to go with the tapes makes the printed tables more complete than what could be obtained from the tapes, and since the study was merely done of Hay's normal business contacts (rather than a random sample) and is therefore not suitable for comparison with any other present or future studies of Workmen's Compensation; it is unlikely that there will be any significant future demand for the data in its machine readable form.
- (8) RESTRICTIONS ON USE: None.
- (9) EVALUATION:
 - A. <u>Data:</u> Since the data in machine readable form has already been fully manipulated and since the printed report is more complete, and since the <u>printed</u> Hay report was the basis for Commission recommendations, the machine records have no significant permanent value.
 - B. <u>Technical</u>: There is sufficient technical documentation available for these files to be successfully processed by most large scale computers. Within the limits of the data, the recorded information is defined adequately for processing and interpretation.
- (10) RECOMMENDATION: I recommend that these files not be accessioned into the National Archives.
