

## PAP ATTACKS REAGAN STATEMENTS AT BERLIN WALL

### Shows 'Nerve' With Accusations

[Text] West Berlin, June 13: The way in which the U.S. President Ronald Reagan presented the German issue in front of the Brandenburg Gate last Friday constitutes a threat to the post-war order in Europe, thus for Poland as well. In his militant speech, which he provocatively delivered right next to the GDR's border, Reagan had the nerve to put forward accusations against the Soviet Union and other socialist countries, that it is their fault that the post-war political and territorial realities in Europe are such as they are.

As if Poland, the Soviet Union, and not the Third Reich's pan-German leaders unleashed and next utterly lost the Second World War. Poland felt the enormity of Nazi barbarism for the longest period of time, thus it has a right to speak about it with full voice. Other European nations have also not forgotten those times and human suffering. Presently, those forces in the FRG which would like to reach out for Polish Silesia or Czech Sudetes [as received] have gained a strong advocate in the person of the American President. Under the pretext of humanitarianism, attempts are once again being made at brainwashing young people. In West Berlin, however, over 50,000 young people on the eve of the President's arrival voiced their "no", for his policy of armament and aggression in demonstrations on Berlin streets. A day later a tremendous "no" was heard also after the President's address in Bonn, where 110,000 people demonstrated against all attempts at peace in Europe. [as received] They showed that they are conscious of the threats contained in the policy of aggressive American and NATO circles, that they do not want to fight once more and die in the name of disgraced mottoes and goals.
