

Signals 'Anticommunist Crusade'

[Text] Warsaw, June 14 -- In an address delivered in front of Reichstag in West Berlin on Friday President Reagan gave a signal for another "anti-communist crusade", and in fact he again called for changing the territorial and political realities shaped in Europe as a result of World War II, and in particular for solving the "open German question". There is no need to explain the dangerous aspect of this policy, that all attempts at changing status quo in Europe carry a threat of a new catastrophe.

(Reagan's) demand to "open the Brandenburg Gate" prompts one remark: The key to this gate is also in his hands. He could have indeed helped to get it open, by accepting in Reykjavik the Soviet disarmament proposals of historic significance which would have dramatically reduced the threat of war and also increased the security of states and trust in East-West relations. One can hardly be surprised that in the atmosphere of such "friendliness" on the part of the American protector, revisionism becomes an increasingly open element of the FRG's foreign policy. Numerous statements by prominent government figures contain phrases flagrantly contradicting the December 1970 Polish-FRG treaty and the CSCE Final Act, and revisionist organizations do not have to worry either about funds or about the presence of senior government representatives at their rallies.
