## Foreword

The General Services Administration, through the National Archives and Records Service, is responsible for administering the permanently valuable noncurrent records of the Federal Government. These archival holdings, now amounting to more than 1 million cubic feet, date from the days of the First Continental Congress and consist of the basic records of the legislative, judicial, and executive branches of our Government. The Presidential libraries of Herbert Hoover, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Harry S. Truman, Dwight D. Eisenhower, John F. Kennedy, and Lyndon B. Johnson contain the papers of those Presidents and of many of their associates in office. These research resources document significant events in our Nation's history, but most of them are preserved because of their continuing practical use in the ordinary processes of government, for the protection of private rights, and for the research use of scholars and students.

To facilitate the use of these materials our archivists prepare various kinds of finding aids that describe their nature and content. The present work is one such publication. We believe that it will be of value to anyone who wishes to use the records it describes.

15. The fifteenth part of the document is a list of figures. These figures are graphical representations of the data, making it easier to interpret the results. They include line graphs, bar charts, and scatter plots.

## Preface

Inventories are issued by the National Archives and Records Service (NARS) to help its staff render efficient reference service, to establish administrative control over the records in its custody, and to acquaint the public with its holdings. An inventory covers one of the 419 record groups (or an integral part of a record group) to which the holdings of NARS are allocated.

Each inventory contains an introduction briefly stating the history and functions of the Government agency that created and accumulated the records described in the inventory. The records are described series by series; that is, by units of records of the same form, on the same subject or activity, or in the same serial file. Other significant information about the records is sometimes given in appendixes.

Preliminary inventories, which constitute another series of finding aids, have essentially the same content as inventories but are prepared and issued as soon as possible after receipt of the records. Inventories are issued after the records have been analyzed to ensure their completeness, to eliminate disposable materials, and to arrange and describe in greater detail the remaining records.

In addition to inventories and other finding aids that relate to particular record groups, NARS issues publications that give an overall picture of materials in its custody. A new, comprehensive *Guide to the National Archives of the United States* will be issued. A guide devoted to one geographical area—*Guide to Materials on Latin America in the National Archives* (1961)—has been published. Reference information papers analyze records in the National Archives of the United States on such subjects as transportation, small business, and the Middle East. Records of the Civil War have been described in *Guide to Federal Archives Relating to the Civil War* (1962), *Guide to the Archives of the Government of the Confederate States of America* (1968), and *Civil War Maps in the National Archives* (1964); those of World War I in *Handbook of Federal World War Agencies and Their Records, 1917-1921* (1943); and those of World War II in the two-volume guide, *Federal Records of World War II* (1950-51). Records of genealogical interest and value have been listed in *Guide to Genealogical Records in the National Archives* (1964), and a major segment of our motion picture holdings is described in the *Guide to the Ford Film Collection in the National Archives* (1970). The extensive body of maps and charts is described in the *Guide to Cartographic Records in the National Archives* (1971).

Many bodies of records of high research value have been published on microfilm by NARS. These microfilm publications are described in the current *List of National Archives Microfilm Publications* and are available for purchase. For other publications, see the most recent *Select List of Publications of the National Archives and Records Service*, General Information Leaflet No. 3.

## Introduction

On January 18, 1919, the Allied and Associated Powers met in the Hall of Mirrors of the Palace of Versailles for the first plenary session of the peace conference to negotiate and draft the peace treaties with the Central Powers and the Covenant of the League of Nations. The conference was attended by the representatives of the United States, the British Empire, France, Belgium, Italy, Japan, China, and 20 other nations. The resulting treaty with Germany, including the Covenant of the League of Nations, was signed at Versailles on June 28, 1919. Subsequently, treaties were signed with Austria at St. Germain-en-Laye on September 10, 1919, with Bulgaria at Neuilly-sur-Seine on November 27, 1919, with Hungary at the Trianon on June 4, 1920, and with Turkey at Lausanne on July 24, 1923. The Treaty of Versailles was rejected by the U.S. Senate, and the other treaties also failed to receive final approval by the United States. In 1921 the United States ratified separate peace treaties with Germany, Austria, and Hungary.

The United States began studying and preparing for the postwar settlement soon after its entry into the war in April 1917. In the fall of that year, Edward M. House, at the request of President Wilson, began to organize a group of experts to collect and collate data on geographical, ethnological, historical, economic, and political problems of Europe and other areas of the world in preparation for the anticipated peace conference following the war. This group of experts became known as "The Inquiry." Its staff was made up largely of professors recruited from American universities and colleges. The Inquiry made a number of investigations, many of which related to the Middle East and Middle Europe, and assembled a large quantity of material on national boundaries.

With the signing of the armistice on November 11, 1918, the American Commission To Negotiate Peace was organized to represent the United States at the Paris peace conference. President Woodrow Wilson personally led the Commission and selected Secretary of State Robert Lansing, diplomat Henry White, Presidential Adviser Edward M. House, and General Tasker H. Bliss to serve as his fellow Commissioners Plenipotentiary. The Commissioners were supported by a large administrative and advisory staff.

The records described in this inventory amount to 258 cubic feet and comprise Records of the American Commission To Negotiate Peace, Record Group 256, in the National Archives of the United States (hereafter called the Archives). This record group is divided into three subgroups: (1) records of The Inquiry, (2) records of the American Commission To Negotiate Peace, and (3) segregated cartographic records. The Inquiry records total 85 cubic feet and consist primarily of "Inquiry Documents" that are reports and studies on various problem areas relating to World War I. The records of the Commission itself total 163 cubic feet and consist primarily of bound volumes containing reports, minutes, correspondence, publications, and other documents relating to the Paris peace conference. The cartographic records consist of 1,237 separate items totaling 8 cubic feet.

The indexes, lists of documents, and certain other papers described below were prepared by the Peace Conference Section of the State Department's Division of Communications and Records. During the 1930's this Section arranged, classified, bound, and furnished information from the records of the Commission then in the custody of the Department of State.

The American participation in the peace conference and the reaction to the treaties negotiated there have been the subject of many historical studies. Numerous memoirs and first-person accounts of the conference by members of the Commission have also been published. The most thorough study of The Inquiry group is Lawrence E. Gelfand, *The Inquiry: American Preparations for Peace, 1917-19* (New Haven: Yale University Press, 1963). Selected documents from the records of The Inquiry and the American Commission To Negotiate Peace were published by the Department of State in *Papers Relating to the Foreign Relations of the United States, 1919: The Paris Peace Conference* (13 vols., Washington, 1942-47).

Records closely related to those described in this inventory are found in the decimal file among General Records of the Department of State, Record Group 59. Of particular interest are records in decimal file 763.62, records relating to World War I and its termination (available as NARS Microfilm Publication M367), and 500.C, records relating to the League of Nations. In the National Archives Gift Collection, Record Group 200, is a typed copy of the diary of Mark Jefferson who served as head of the Division of Geography and Cartography of the American Commission To Negotiate Peace, with entries dated December 17, 1918, and January 17 to May 13, 1919.

Other related records in the Archives include several series among Records of the American Expeditionary Forces (World War I), 1917-23, Record Group 120. These series include the records of the American section of the Supreme War Council, 1917-19; records of the American section of the Permanent International Armistice Commission, 1918-19; and records relating to the American Commission To Negotiate Peace, 1918-19. The records of the Central Bureau of Planning and Statistics among Records of the Bureau of the Budget, Record Group 51, also include related material since President Wilson designated the Central Bureau as the source for economic data required by the American Commission. These records include statistical material collected by the Central Bureau ("Contact Material"), 1913-18, and materials sent to the peace conference, January-May 1919.

Several manuscript collections contain material that supplements the records described in this inventory. These collections include the Sidney E. Mezes papers at Columbia University, the Edward M. House papers at Yale University, the Isaiah Bowman papers at Johns Hopkins University, and the Woodrow Wilson, Robert Lansing, Henry White, Tasker H. Bliss, and David Hunter Miller papers at the Library of Congress. Additional cartographic records are in the custody of the American Geographical Society.

This inventory is a revision of and supersedes H. Stephen Helton, comp., *Preliminary Inventory of the Records of the American Commission To Negotiate Peace*, Preliminary Inventory No. 89 (1955) and James Berton Rhoads, comp., *Preliminary Inventory of the Cartographic Records of the American Commission To Negotiate Peace*, Preliminary Inventory No. 68 (1954). Most of the information in these publications has been incorporated into this inventory without change. Some of the series descriptions have been elaborated upon or altered as a result of closer examination. In a few instances, the entries have been reordered. The descriptions of the records of the Peace Conference

Section, Division of Communications and Records, Department of State, relating to the indexing, binding, and servicing of the records have been deleted to reflect the reallocation of these records, in part, to General Records of the Department of State, Record Group 59, and the disposal of the remainder. Finally, two new appendixes (I and V) have been added.

To maintain the integrity of the originals the information for each item in appendixes II-IV is reproduced exactly as it appears on the face of the document. For that reason the appendixes as a whole are not editorially consistent.

Edith J. Blendon assisted the compiler in describing the textual records, and William J. Heynen supplied information regarding the cartographic records.

## Records of The Inquiry

The Inquiry was first under the direction of Sidney E. Mezes, a philosopher of religion and president of City College of New York, and later of Isaiah Bowman, a geographer and head of the American Geographical Society. The Inquiry staff was composed largely of geographers, political scientists, lawyers, historians, and other academicians assigned to various divisions dealing with specific geographic areas or with more general subjects, such as economics, diplomatic history, and international law. At its maximum size, in October 1918, The Inquiry's personnel records listed 126 research collaborators, executives, and staff assistants. Key personnel included lawyer David Hunter Miller and James T. Shotwell, historian and director of the National Board for Historical Services. Walter Lippman, assistant to the Secretary of War, served as the Secretary of The Inquiry. Other noted members of The Inquiry included George L. Beer, Stephen Bonsal, Clive Day, Stephen P. Duggan, Stanley Hornbeck, Robert H. Lord, A. H. Lybyer, Samuel Eliot Morison, Dana G. Munro, W. H. Pitken, William Lytle Schurz, and W. L. Westermann.

The Inquiry undertook studies of virtually every region of the world, collecting and producing nearly 2,000 reports and over 1,000 maps. President Wilson used The Inquiry's formal recommendations in drafting the territorial propositions in his Fourteen Points and later incorporated some of its suggestions into the peace treaties. In December 1918 The Inquiry ceased as an independent body and was absorbed into the Division of Territorial, Economic, and Political Intelligence of the American Commission To Negotiate Peace. Twenty-three members of the former Inquiry staff accompanied Wilson to the peace conference.

Arranged alphabetically by subject.

Correspondence, memorandums, reports, minutes of meetings, research memorandums, and other papers dealing with organization, committee meetings, accounts, personnel, equipment and supplies, and other administrative matters relating to The Inquiry.

- 3. CARD INDEX TO SPECIAL REPORTS AND STUDIES. 1918. 2 ft.**

Arranged alphabetically by subject and name of author.

Index, on 3- by 5-inch cards, to the documents described under entry 4. Each card shows the subject of the report or study and its date, the document number, and the title.

- 4. SPECIAL REPORTS AND STUDIES. 1917-18. 29 ft.**

Arranged numerically.

Reports, research studies, and related materials prepared, collected, or copied by The Inquiry and its collaborators for the information of the U.S. representatives to the peace conference. They cover certain geographical, ethnological, historical, economic, and political problems of Europe and other areas of the world. Each of these reports and studies is stamped "Inquiry Document" and is numbered. A numerical list is filed with the records, and a list arranged by subject and by area appears as appendix II of this inventory. A subject-author index to the records is described in entry 3.

**5. CARD RECORDS CONTAINING RELIGIOUS AND LANGUAGE STATISTICS FOR THE CENTRAL POWERS. n.d. 3 ft.**

Arranged for the most part by country and thereunder by district.

Manuscript cards, 5 by 8 inches, containing data on the number of persons in each religious or language group in each country and the percentage that each group represented of the country's total population. Each card shows the country, the district, the total population, name of each religious or language group, number of persons in each group, and the percentage that each represented of the total population. Some cards are filed under the heading "Fluctuations."

**6. CARD RECORDS ON DENSITY OF POPULATION OF AUSTRIA-HUNGARY. n.d. 8 in.**

Arranged by geographical area.

Typed cards, 5 by 8 inches, showing the name of each district in Austria-Hungary, its area, its population in 1900 and in 1910, the density of population in 1910, and the increase or decrease during the 10-year period.

**7. CARD RECORD OF INDUSTRIAL CENSUS OF AUSTRIA-HUNGARY. n.d. 6 in.**

Arranged by major subdivision of Austria-Hungary and thereunder by district.

Typed cards, 5 by 8 inches, showing the name of each district in Austria-Hungary, the total population of the district, and statistics regarding its industries or persons engaged in industries.

**8. CARD RECORD OF WHO'S WHO. 1918. 4 in.**

Arranged alphabetically by name of person.

Typed cards, 5 by 8 inches, containing information regarding prominent political leaders of various countries of the world. Each card shows the name of the person, his title or position in the government, the country, the political party to which he belonged, or his views concerning certain topics connected with the peace settlement, the date, and, occasionally, a brief biographical sketch.

**9. CARD RECORD OF POLITICAL PARTIES AND THE PRESS. 1917-18. 6 in.**

Arranged in two parts, political parties or political press, thereunder by country, and thereunder by name of party or newspaper.

Typed cards, 5 by 8 inches, showing the country, the name of the political party or newspaper, its political leanings, and, occasionally, the date and subject content of a declaration or proposal made by it.

**10. INDEX TO NEWSPAPER CLIPPINGS OF OFFICIAL STATEMENTS AND PROPOSALS. 1914-18. 6 in.**

Arranged alphabetically by country and thereunder chronologically.

Index, on 5- by 8-inch slips, to the series of newspaper clippings described in entry 11. Each slip lists the clippings in chronological order and shows the date of each, the country to which it relates, the type of statement (official or unofficial), the source, and whether the clipping is filed in folder "A" or "B" for the country. This index is incomplete.

**11. NEWSPAPER CLIPPINGS OF OFFICIAL STATEMENTS AND PROPOSALS RELATING TO A PEACE SETTLEMENT. 1914-18. 2 ft.**

Arranged alphabetically by country and thereunder chronologically.

Clippings, mounted on 5- by 8-inch slips, of various statements, speeches, and articles that appeared principally in newspapers of the United States. The subjects of these clippings include Alsace-Lorraine, indemnities, war aims, strikes, peace proposals and peace offers, President Wilson, Siberia, the League of Nations, the Baghdad railway, atrocities, the political situations of countries, and annexations of territory. Filed with these clippings are some digests of declarations and proposals of the same type as those described in entry 13. Some folders of clippings are marked "A" and others "B."

**12. TRANSLATIONS OF GERMAN NEWSPAPER CLIPPINGS. 1918. 2 ft.**

Arranged in part by country to which the clippings relate; in part unarranged.

English translations, on 5- by 8-inch slips, of German newspaper clippings. Among the subjects covered by these clippings are agriculture, capitalism, children, food supply, illegality and crime, Lithuania, nationalities, profiteering, propaganda, real estate, reconstruction, taxation, transportation, and religious questions. Each slip shows the subject of the clipping, the name of the newspaper from which it was taken, and the date. There are some typed copies of clippings in German.

**13. TOPICAL DIGEST OF DECLARATIONS AND PROPOSALS. 1915-18. 4 ft.**

Arranged alphabetically by subject and thereunder by subtopic or chronologically.

Digests, on 5- by 8-inch slips of newspaper clippings and articles containing declarations or proposals made by spokesmen of various countries relative to the peace settlement. Among the subjects covered by these digests are Alsace-Lorraine, German intrigue, international organization, class struggle, Bolshevism, peace feelers, indemnities, annexations, peace offers and peace rumors, peace agitation, strikes, Siberia, social ferment in Germany, pan-Europe versus the Monroe Doctrine, peace terms for the conference, and the strength of political parties. Each slip shows the country to which the digest relates, the subject, the name of the newspaper or other source from which taken, the date, and the name of the person who made the statement or who wrote the article. Included is an index to expressions of U.S. policy regarding the peace settlement. This index is arranged by subject and it lists under each subject the source of the statement and the date.

**14. NUMERICAL FILE OF DECLARATIONS AND PROPOSALS. 1916-18. 4 vols. 6 in.**

Arranged numerically, 1-5012.

Slips, 5 by 8 inches, containing digests of declarations and proposals relative to the peace settlements that were made by spokesmen of Allied and Entente countries. These digests are of the same type as those described in entry 13.

**15. DIGEST OF OFFICIAL AND UNOFFICIAL STATEMENTS. 1914-17. 1 ft.**

Arranged in two parts, official and unofficial statements, thereunder alphabetically by country, and thereunder chronologically.

Manuscript cards, 5 by 8 inches, containing digests of official and unofficial statements made by Allied and Entente spokesmen concerning matters of interest to the peace conference. In addition to the digest each card shows the country concerned, the source of the statement, the type of statement (official or unofficial), the newspaper or publication from which taken, and the date of the statement.

**16. WEEKLY BULLETIN OF TRADE INFORMATION. Mar. 29-May 10, 1918. 2 in.**

Arranged chronologically.

Processed copies of the bulletin prepared and issued by the War Trade Intelligence Department of the British Government.

**17. DAILY REVIEW OF THE FOREIGN PRESS. 1918. 2 in.**

Arranged by title.

Scattered copies of the British War Office publication *Daily Review of the Foreign Press* and supplements entitled "Allied Press," "Blockade and Supply," "Economic Supplement," and "Food Supplement," dated between June and September.

**18. RECORDS OF THE ECONOMIC DIVISION OF THE INQUIRY. 1917-18. 3 ft.**

Arranged for the most part numerically; in part unarranged.

Reports, memorandums, graphs, maps, publications, and other documents, mainly on the economy, trade, and economic relations of countries. Many of these records were received by A. A. Young, Chief of the Economic Division, from agencies of the U.S. Government. The subjects covered by the records include overseas investments, the economic situation, the industrial position, trade agreements, the supply position, tariff relations, balance of trade, railways, gold stocks, commodities, and other matters relating to the economy of certain countries. There are also some reports on political problems, population, and linguistic statistics of certain of the Central Powers. These records, except for some unnumbered ones, are stamped "Peace Conference Document." There is no index. See appendix III for a list of these documents.

**19. RECORDS OF THE LATIN AMERICAN DIVISION OF THE INQUIRY. 1918. 1 ft.**

Arranged alphabetically, in part by country and in part by subject.

Correspondence, memorandums, reports, and newspaper clippings, mainly of Bailey Willis, Chief of the Latin American Division, relating to the history, economy, and foreign relations of the Latin American countries and to the administration of the Division. The folders of this file are numbered as "Inquiry Documents" Nos. 916 through 978. A list of the reports and memorandums, except those of a minor administrative nature, constitutes appendix IV of this inventory.

**20. BIBLIOGRAPHY ON LATIN AMERICA. 1918. 7 ft.**

Arranged alphabetically by country to which the item relates, thereunder by subject, and thereunder alphabetically by name of author.

Bibliography, on 3- by 5-inch cards, of books, maps, manuscripts, and other materials in the Yale, Columbia, New York Public, and other libraries of

interest to the research staff of the Latin American Division of The Inquiry. Each card shows the title or subject of the book, manuscript or map, the date and place of publication, number of pages, name of author, and the name of the library in which it was located.

**21. BIBLIOGRAPHIC SYNOPSES. 1918. 1 vol. 2 in.**

Arranged alphabetically by name of author.

These are synopses of the works of various authors on Latin America. Each synopsis shows the subject, the country, initials of compiler, name of author, title of work, date and place of publication, and number of pages.

**22. CARD RECORD OF PERSONNEL AND PERSONNEL ASSIGNMENTS. 1917-18. 9 in.**

Cards, 4 by 6 inches and 5 by 8 inches, containing the following information regarding each person in the employ of The Inquiry: name, address, division to which assigned, name of person to whom reporting, salary, assignment (title of position or title of research project to which assigned), and date and title of reports prepared. One set of cards covers administrative personnel and is arranged alphabetically by name of person. A second set of cards covers personnel employed in preparing research reports and studies; it is arranged alphabetically by country.

## Records of the American Commission To Negotiate Peace

The American Commission To Negotiate Peace was organized in November 1918 and served as the American negotiating team at the Paris peace conference of 1919. This body consisted of the five Commissioners Plenipotentiary headed by President Wilson, a large secretariat directed by Leland Harrison and P. H. Patchin, a group of technical advisers, and a number of administrative officers. The Commission's Division of Territorial, Economic, and Political Intelligence (commonly referred to as "Intelligence") included some of the experts who had served in The Inquiry.

Notable members of the Commission's staff included Bernard M. Baruch, Archibald Cary Coolidge, Allen W. Dulles, John Foster Dulles, Samuel Gompers, Ulysses Grant III, Joseph C. Grew, Herbert C. Hoover, Edward M. Hurley, Vance McCormick, Gen. Frank R. McCoy, Henry Morgenthau, Gen. John J. Pershing, Nicholas Roosevelt, and Robert A. Taft.

Active U.S. participation in the peace conference ended on December 9, 1919, when the American Commission To Negotiate Peace left Paris to return to the United States.

The general records of the American Commission To Negotiate Peace (entry 27), the lists of documents (entry 23), the "Key to Records" (entry 25), and the lists of councils, committees, commissions, and field missions of the conference (entry 30) are available as NARS Microfilm Publication M820. The contents of this microfilm publication are listed in appendix V.

**23. LISTS OF DOCUMENTS ("Purport Sheets"). 1918-31. 12 ft.**

Lists of the documents bound in the series of 537 volumes described in entry 27. The entry for

each paper indicates the decimal file number and subnumber, the person or agency from whom received or to whom sent, and the purport or summary of the message or document. There are two sets of these lists, each arranged according to the decimal classification scheme described for the record under entry 26. The second series of these "purport sheets" is an incomplete one. These lists were prepared by the Peace Conference Section of the Division of Communications and Records, Department of State. These purport sheets are filmed as rolls 2-26 of M820.

**24. CLASSIFICATION MANUAL FOR RECORDS OF THE COMMISSION. n.d. 1 vol. 1 in.**

This manual, prepared by the Peace Conference Section of the State Department's Division of Communications and Records, contains the classification scheme of the records described in entry 27, including a supplementary list of country numbers, a list of file numbers covering correspondence regarding boundaries of certain European countries, and an alphabetical subject index to the records of the American Commission.

**25. KEY TO RECORDS. n.d. 1 vol. 3 in.**

The "Key" was prepared by the Peace Conference Section of the State Department's Division of Communications and Records. It was designed as a supplement to the extensive, but complicated, card index. The "Key" describes the records described in entry 27 and how the individual documents are filed. It also offers advice on how to conduct *general* research and locate any particular document. It also explains briefly the organizations of the peace conference and the Commission. For example, the Supreme

War Council, the "Big Ten," and the "Council of Ten" all refer to the Bureau of the Conference, and it is under this latter name that all records relating to it are to be found.

The annexes to the "Key" are interrelated. Annex I provides an alphabetical index to subjects considered by the peace conference and the Commission with the file numbers of each subject included. In addition, page citations refer to pages in the classification scheme so that one may see which committee, subcommittee, etc., considered the subject and how that committee fits into the organization of the peace conference.

Annex II describes in detail the councils, commissions, committees, etc., of the peace conference and of the field missions of the American Commission, including a chronological listing of each meeting and members present at each session. It is followed by its own alphabetical index and an alphabetical name index to the members of the councils, commissions, committees, etc., and the committees on which they served.

Annex III provides an alphabetical index to subjects considered and the card index heading under which each is to be found.

Annex IV is a chronological listing of the meeting dates of the councils, commissions, committees, etc.

Annex V lists the personnel of the American Commission and the volume in which their personnel information may be found. The list also includes names of many prospective employees.

Annexes VI through X provide outlines of the various final treaties with the file number and volume to be searched for each article of each treaty. Annex VI is Germany (Versailles), annex VII is Austria (St. Germain), annex VIII is Hungary (Trianon), annex IX is Bulgaria (Neuilly), and annex X is Turkey (Sevres). Annex XI lists all of the treaties negotiated with the file number for each. Annex XII lists the file numbers for each boundary question considered and the volume that contains the negotiation. Annex XIII is a numerical list of the bound volumes of the records showing the contents of each by decimal file numbers.

The "Key" is reproduced on roll 1 of M820.

#### **26. CARD INDEX TO THE GENERAL RECORDS OF THE AMERICAN COMMISSION. 1918-31. 102 ft.**

Arranged alphabetically, in part by subject and in part by country, thereunder by subtopic, and thereunder chronologically.

Index, on 3- by 5-inch cards, to the records described in entry 27. These cards were prepared by the Peace Conference Section of the State Department's Division of Communications and Records. They show the subject, decimal file number, date, and type of document, and give a digest of contents.

#### **27. GENERAL RECORDS OF THE AMERICAN COMMISSION TO NEGOTIATE PEACE. 1918-31. 537 vols. 158 ft.**

Arranged according to a decimal classification scheme devised by the Department of State.

These records include the following: (1) minutes of meetings of the various councils, plenary sessions, committees, and commissions of the conference; (2) reports of committees and commissions; (3) telegrams sent and received by the American Commission; (4) letters sent and received by the American Commission; (5) instructions sent by the Commission to its field missions and reports received from field missions; (6) memorandums, publications, and pamphlets; and (7) minutes of meetings of the Conference of Ambassadors, 1920-31, which was organized to consider certain political questions following the termination of the peace conference. There are also numerous documents that have no relation whatever to questions considered by the conference. Part of the latter are accounted for by the fact that President Wilson and Secretary of State Lansing were in Paris with the American Commission for several months and for that reason various questions of policy were referred to the two officials by the Department of State—questions not relating to the work of the conference. Described in entries 23-26 are lists of papers, a card index, a classification manual, and the "Key to Records."

The general records of the Commission have been reproduced as NARS Microfilm Publication M820.

#### **28. MINUTES, REPORTS, AND DOCUMENTS OF COMMISSIONS AND COMMITTEES. 1919. 8 in.**

Arranged by name of Commission and thereunder chronologically.

These are copies of minutes, reports, and documents, other copies of which are among the series of records described in entry 27. Copies are present for the following: Central Territories Committee; Credentials Committee; Committee on the Repatriation of German, Austrian, and Hungarian Prisoners of War in Siberia; Commission on Prisoners of War; Geography Commission; Commission on the Eastern Frontiers of Germany; Commission on Political Clauses for

Europe; Commission on Czechoslovakia; Commission on Territorial Questions Concerning Rumania and Yugoslavia; Commission on Baltic Affairs; Commission Relative to Affairs of Teschen, Spisz, and Orava; Commission on Polish Affairs; and Commission on Tientsin.

**29. DAILY AND WEEKLY INFORMATION OR INTELLIGENCE BULLETINS. 1918-19. 10 in.**

Arranged by country or subject to which the bulletins relate or by title of bulletin.

Processed and carbon copies of daily and weekly bulletins containing summaries of information from the press and other sources of interest to the American Commission. Included are some related memorandums.

**30. LISTS OF COUNCILS, COMMITTEES, COMMISSIONS, AND FIELD MISSIONS OF THE PARIS PEACE CONFERENCE. 1918-19. 1 vol. 1 in.**

These are lists compiled by the Peace Conference Section of the Division of Communications and Records of the Department of State. There are three lists as follows: (1) a descriptive list of councils,

committees, commissions, field missions, and other units of the Paris peace conference containing information about the personnel and functions of each unit; (2) an alphabetical list of the names of persons who were members of the units; and (3) a list of the units of the conference arranged chronologically by date of establishment. A copy of this volume is filmed on roll 1 of M820.

**31. PRESS CLIPPINGS REGARDING THE PEACE CONFERENCE. 1919. 3 ft.**

Arranged alphabetically by subject and thereunder chronologically.

Clippings from the *Chicago Tribune*, *New York Sun*, *Public Ledger* (Philadelphia), *Minneapolis Tribune*, *Washington Star*, *New York World*, *New York Tribune*, *New York American*, *Wall Street Journal*, *New York Evening Post*, *Omaha Nebraska News*, *Baltimore Sun*, *New York Times*, and other newspapers in the United States regarding the peace conference. Among the subjects covered by these clippings are embargoes, finance, indemnities, industries, the Rhine Republic, the Saar Basin, Shantung, the treaty, the Ukraine, war debts, President Wilson, women, and responsibility for war.

## Segregated Cartographic Records of The Inquiry and the American Commission To Negotiate Peace

Although most of the maps described below carry the stamp of The Inquiry, they were subsequently transferred to the Division of Territorial, Economic, and Political Intelligence ("Intelligence") of the American Commission To Negotiate Peace. Within Intelligence, the maps were used by the Division of Economics and Statistics, the Division of Geography and Cartography, and nine other divisions dealing with specific nations or regions. The Division of Geography and Cartography assembled or produced a large number of base maps that were made

available to the other Divisions for use in depicting geographical, ethnographic, political, and other information, and for drafting proposals for international boundaries.

Some of the maps relate directly to various reports by individual authors described elsewhere in this inventory. Other maps, however, appear to have been produced or collected for their own informational value. Additional cartographic records are interspersed among the textual records of the Commission (entry 27).

### Cartographic Records of the Economics and Statistics Division

The Economics and Statistics Division was headed by Dr. Allyn A. Young of Cornell University. It studied general and local economic questions and, from the conclusions reached, advised other Intelligence divisions on boundary, commercial, and economic problems. Much of the cartographic material utilized by the Division was prepared by the U.S.

Geological Survey and by the Forest Service, the Bureau of Plant Industry, and the Bureau of Soils of the Department of Agriculture. Within each series the records are arranged by arbitrarily assigned numbers.

**32. GENERAL ECONOMIC MAPS. 1917-19. 172 items.**

Annotated base maps, bound in atlases, showing the power resources and mineral deposits of the world, prepared by the Geological Survey in

cooperation with the Forest Service; a photostat map showing international trade in wool; and manuscript and photostat bar and line graphs showing Allied and neutral tonnage sunk by enemy action, merchant marine tonnage of the world, forest resources, and agricultural and livestock production.

**33. MAPS RELATING TO AFRICA. 1917-19. 49 items.**

Manuscript maps and annotated base maps prepared by the Bureau of Plant Industry, the Bureau of Soils, and the Forest Service, showing crop distribution and potentialities, vegetation, land classification, and forested areas, with explanatory textual material; and annotated base maps showing farm and livestock distribution in German Southwest Africa and German East Africa.

**34. MAPS OF THE ALSACE-LORRAINE REGION. 1917-19. 21 items.**

Annotated base maps and photostat maps showing mining and mineral deposits, ironworks, and political subdivisions in the basins of the Rhine and Saar Rivers and in Alsace-Lorraine; geological profiles showing mineral deposits; and a manuscript block diagram of Lorraine, with a published copy annotated to show mineral deposits.

**35. MAPS RELATING TO ASIA AND OCEANIA. 1917-19. 6 items.**

Annotated base maps showing mineral resources in Asia and manuscript maps showing the extent of forestation in Asia and Oceania.

**36. GRAPHS RELATING TO AUSTRIA-HUNGARY. 1917-19. 4 items.**

Manuscript bar graphs showing the volume of trade between Bohemia and Germany by railroad and by inland waterways in 1910 and 1911, and the agricultural and mineral production of Bohemia, Moravia, and Silesia in relation to the rest of Austria in 1911 and 1912, with related textual material.

**37. MAPS OF CENTRAL AMERICA. 1917-19. 6 items.**

Annotated base maps showing mineral deposits.

**38. MAPS OF EUROPE. 1917-19. 18 items.**

Annotated base maps showing the location and size of mineral resources and a manuscript map showing the extent of forestation.

**39. GRAPHS RELATING TO GERMANY. 1917-19. 13 items.**

Manuscript and photostat circle and bar graphs showing Germany's export markets, the national origin of her imports, and her supplies of metals.

**40. MAPS OF MEXICO. 1917-19. 5 items.**

Annotated base maps showing locations and sizes of mineral deposits.

**41. MAP OF NORTH AMERICA. ca. 1918. 1 item.**

An annotated base map showing forestation.

**42. MAPS OF SOUTH AMERICA. 1917-19. 10 items.**

Annotated base maps showing mineral deposits and forested areas in South America, and a manuscript tracing showing irrigated and irrigable land in the coastal portions of Peru and Ecuador.

**43. MAP OF THE TIROL. ca. 1918. 1 item.**

An annotated base map prepared by the Bureau of Farm Management showing the distribution of wheat production.

**Cartographic Records of the Geography and Cartography Division**

The Geography and Cartography Division, under the direction of Mark Jefferson of Michigan State Normal College at Ypsilanti, assembled, prepared, and maintained a central file of the base outline and general maps. These maps were available to the other divisions of Intelligence.

**44. CONTROL SHEETS FOR THE NUMERICAL FILE OF BASE AND ANNOTATED MAPS. 1918-19. 5 in.**

Typescript sheets identifying the maps described in entry 45, arranged in numerical order corresponding to the map file (Nos. 2a-64, 100-101a, and 487-792). These are apparently control sheets on which a record was kept of the preparation and disposition of each map. A typical record contains the number and title of a map, the type and scale of the base map used, the process employed in reproducing the map (engraving or photostating), the name of the draftsman and the date drafted, the person or agency who ordered the map, number of copies made, and to whom delivered. Many also indicate the features shown on the map and the corresponding symbols. For base maps the name of the commercial engraving

company is shown. Some of the sheets do not show the full information.

**45. NUMERICAL FILE OF BASE AND ANNOTATED MAPS. 1918-19. 350 items.**

A central file consisting of two parts: loose maps and bound maps. The loose maps, numbered 2a-64, 100-101a, and 487-791 (with gaps) are published and manuscript base maps of parts of Europe, Asia, Africa, and Latin America showing boundaries, cities, railroads, and drainage features for the most part, and physiographic block diagrams and topographic maps of parts of Europe. Interfiled among the loose base maps are several detailed manuscript maps relating to particular subjects including a population density map of Europe (No. 563a), a linguistic map of Europe (No. 695), a linguistic map of Austria-Hungary (No. 101a), and a map of central Europe showing boundary and plebiscite areas in Schleswig and Mazuria (Poland), proposed Hungarian boundaries, an area of "possible strategic rectifications" of the German-Belgian frontier, and historical boundary lines in Alsace-Lorraine (No. 704).

The bound maps are in three volumes and are numbered from 500 to 799 (with wide gaps); they consist of small-scale base maps (often reduced photostatic copies) on which has been annotated detailed information about ethnic and linguistic distributions, literacy, employment, industry, agriculture and climate, proposed frontiers, conflicting territorial claims, and boundary changes in certain areas. A card index to the geographic areas and general subject matter on these maps is available in the Archives.

**46. AREA FILE ("PHOTOSTATS FROM NEW YORK"). 1917-19. 68 items.**

Unnumbered photostat maps, many not clearly reproduced, arranged by country or region. They show language distribution, population density, religious data, ethnic problems, transportation networks, industrial development, locations of cities, and political subdivisions for Africa, Arabia, Austria-Hungary, the Balkans, Belgium, Bulgaria, Europe (general), Germany, Italy, Poland, Rumania, Russia, Schleswig, Serbia, South America, Switzerland, and Turkey.

**Cartographic Records of the  
History Division**

The History Division was headed by Dr. James T. Shotwell of Columbia University, who was assisted by Dr. Frank Anderson of Dartmouth University. The

Division was engaged chiefly in the study of diplomatic history as it applied to postwar problems, the historical backgrounds of nationalities aspiring to independence, existing independent states, and colonial areas that would be affected by the peace treaty.

**47. CHRONOCHART RELATING TO THE WEST INDIES AND CENTRAL AMERICA. 1918. 1 item.**

A manuscript chronochart depicting colonial status and ownership, 1600-1918, for individual islands of the West Indies and political units of Central America and adjacent areas, such as Texas, Florida, Colombia, and Venezuela. The participants in wars and treaties affecting the West Indies and the relative land areas of each island or country are indicated.

**Cartographic Records of the  
Africa Division**

The Africa Division, with Prof. George Louis Beer as its Director, studied colonial problems and made recommendations concerning proposed African mandates.

**48. GENERAL MAPS OF AFRICA. 1917-19. 29 items.**

Arranged numerically.

Manuscript maps, annotated base maps, and photostat maps showing population density, ethnographic and religious distribution, areas suitable for white colonization, climate, natural resources, and projected Cape-to-Cairo railway routes.

**Cartographic Records of the Inner  
Asia Division**

The Inner Asia Division, Directed by Dr. R. B. Dixon, studied problems affecting the lands of Central or Inner Asia that lie between China proper and Russian Asia.

**49. MAPS RELATING TO ASIA. 1917-19. 4 items.**  
Arranged numerically.

Annotated photostat maps showing ethnographic distribution, population density, and Russian colonization in Turkestan; an annotated map of Eurasia showing the domains of the German-Russian-Japanese Alliance proposed by Werner Daya in *Der Aufmarsch im Osten* and the general plan advocated by him for

the next war against Great Britain; and a map showing commercial routes and agricultural regions of Asia.

**50. MAPS OF SINKIANG. 1917-19. 5 items.**

Arranged numerically.

Annotated photostat maps showing the orography, soils, lines of communication, population density, and linguistics.

**Cartographic Records of the  
Austria-Hungary Division**

The Austria-Hungary Division, directed by Dr. Charles Seymour of Yale University, studied possible divisions of the empire, giving special consideration to Czechoslovak and Yugoslav aspirations for independence.

**51. MAPS AND CHARTS RELATING TO AUSTRIA-HUNGARY. 1917-19. 128 items.**

Arranged numerically.

Manuscript and annotated base maps showing population density, areas of highest literacy rates, employment data, industrial development, agricultural production and the size of land holdings, quantity and value of foreign and transit trade in 1912, the commercial hinterland of Trieste in 1911, emigration and immigration, railroad and river transportation networks, navigable rivers and connecting canals in the Polish region, political subdivisions, historic territorial divisions in Austria-Hungary, territorial acquisitions of the Hapsburgs, proposed federalization within the existing boundaries of Austria-Hungary, proposed change from existing Austro-Hungarian "dualism" to "trialism" with Yugoslavia or Poland as the new third partner, historic and ethnic claims of the Czechs, the new frontiers of Italy and Yugoslavia as specified by the Pact of London, the proposed boundaries of Yugoslav and Czechoslovak states with a connective corridor, present territorial claims of the Yugoslavs and Czechs, the distribution of major cities, the distribution of members of parliament for and against federalization or dismemberment of Austria-Hungary, and the distribution of linguistic, ethnic, and religious groups; annotated base maps showing the history of areas proposed to be included in the new states of Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia, and Poland; annotated base maps and pie graphs showing actual and ideal representation by nationality in Austrian and Hungarian parliaments; physiographic block diagrams of

the Trieste-Isonzo region and of the Carpathian Mountains; a tracing showing the drainage in the Danube River Basin; and related textual material.

**Cartographic Records of the  
Balkans Division**

The Balkans Division was headed by Dr. Clive Day of Yale University. Its chief function was to work out a satisfactory solution to the ever-snarled boundary situation in the Balkan States. The accomplishments of the Division were augmented by a geographical study of the eastern Adriatic region made by Maj. Douglas W. Johnson, who was on leave from Columbia University.

**52. MAPS OF THE BALKAN NATIONS. 1917-19. 78 items.**

Arranged numerically.

Manuscript and annotated base maps and photostat maps showing historic and proposed boundaries of Balkan nations (including a set of seven manuscript maps showing Yugoslav boundaries over several centuries), conflicting territorial claims of those nations, boundaries for a proposed new Danubian monarchy and for a proposed independent Macedonia, territorial aspects of the Rumanian treaty with the Central Powers and Rumanian cessions to the Ukrainian People's Republic, administration of commerce on the Danube River and work of the European Commission on the Sulina branch of the Danube, railroad and highway networks, existing Roman roads, linguistic and ethnic problems, distribution of Orthodox Catholic churches, boundaries of political subdivisions, and forestation; and a manuscript physiographic block diagram of Albania.

**Cartographic Records of the Far East  
and Pacific Division**

The Far East and Pacific Division specialized in the study of Japanese-Chinese relations and of the colonial problems in the Pacific islands. Dr. Stanley K. Hornbeck of the University of Wisconsin was Director.

**53. MAPS OF CHINA. 1917-19. 5 items.**

Arranged numerically.

Annotated base maps showing railway development and ownership, spheres of foreign influence, and the relation of outlying Chinese provinces to the Republic of China; and a manuscript map showing

the location of Mongolian peoples and the direction of Chinese colonization movements.

**54. MAPS OF THE PACIFIC OCEAN. 1917-19. 14 items.**

Arranged numerically.

A series of nine base maps of the Pacific annotated in various colors to show the colonial status of islands in 1880, 1884, 1885, 1885-91, 1892-98, 1898, 1899-1914, at the outbreak of World War I, and at the conclusion of the war; similar maps showing types of American interests in the Pacific including territorial, missionary, and trade, and the locations of radio stations, steamship lines, and cables administered by various nations; and a map illustrating the "Problem of the Pacific," by Dr. Preston W. Slosson.

**Cartographic Records of the  
Italy Division**

The Italy Division, headed by Dr. W. E. Lunt of Haverford College, studied claims involving the boundary of Italy, with special emphasis on conflicting claims in the Tirol.

**55. MAPS OF ITALY. 1917-19. 9 items.**

Arranged numerically.

Annotated base maps showing the linguistic problem in the Italo-Austrian border region, conflicting Italian and Austrian claims in the Tirol region, and possible, suggested, and historic boundaries between Italy and Austria; a manuscript tracing showing the Italo-Austrian disputed area; and physiographic block diagrams of the Trieste-Isonzo and Trentino regions annotated to show various proposed Italo-Austrian boundaries, with some explanatory textual material.

**56. MAPS OF THE TIROL REGION. 1917-19. 26 items.**

Arranged numerically.

A bound series of 26 annotated base maps prepared for a report by W. E. Lunt emphasizing historical administrative boundaries but also including topography, conflicting territorial claims, and distribution and density of German-speaking and Italian-speaking people, 1890-1910.

**Cartographic Records of the Russia  
and Poland Division**

The Russia and Poland Division, under the direction of Dr. R. H. Lord of Harvard University,

studied particularly the problems connected with the establishment of an independent Poland, and also the problems of western Russia.

**57. MAP OF FINLAND. ca. 1919. 1 item.**

An annotated base map showing the corridor to the Arctic Ocean ceded to Finland by Bolshevik Russia, with related textual material.

**58. MAPS OF POLAND. 1917-19. 121 items.**

Arranged numerically.

Manuscript maps, annotated base maps, and photostat maps showing, for the areas of Germany, Austria, and Russia proposed to be included in the new Polish nation, the political subdivisions, distribution of members of religious faiths, linguistic and ethnic problems, density of population, agricultural production, industrial development, employment data, transportation and communications networks, educational facilities, extent of landownership, distribution of wealth, distribution of Polish language publishers and publications, mineral deposits, hydrographic information, rainfall patterns, topography, and forests; and annotated base maps showing historic frontiers and proposed boundaries for Poland and minimum Polish territorial demands, with related textual material.

Included are four bound sets of annotated and manuscript maps entitled "Romer's Atlas of Poland—Agriculture," "An Atlas of the Transitional Area of White Ruthenia" showing ethnic and religious data, "Preliminary Abstract . . . Concerning Industries in Poland" showing types and numbers of industrial establishments and numbers of workers in each province, and "The Government of Chelm" showing linguistic and religious distributions in southeast Poland, 1897-1917.

**59. MAPS OF RUSSIA. 1917-19. 30 items.**

Arranged numerically.

Annotated base maps and photostat maps showing religious and ethnic distribution, population density, political subdivisions, railroads, topography, and soil types in Russia; and historic frontiers of Lithuania, Russian colonization in Asia, new frontiers in former Russian territory as provided by the Treaty of Brest-Litovsk, the sphere of German influence and occupation in Russia, conflicting claims of newly independent states created from former Russian territory, the proposed political division of the Caucasian area, facilities of the American Relief

Administration in the famine area of Russia, and related textual material.

#### Cartographic Records of the Western Asia Division

The Western Asia Division was organized in mid-1917 to study primarily the political problems connected with the plans for breaking up the Turkish Empire. The Division's first maps were produced under the direction of Dr. Dana G. Munro of Princeton University. Most of its maps were produced, however, in 1918 and 1919 when Dr. W. L. Westermann of Cornell University was Director of the Division.

#### 60. MAPS RELATING TO TURKEY. 1917-19. 27 items.

Arranged numerically.

Annotated base maps and photostat maps showing density of population, the transportation system, areas under military control of foreign powers, distribution of mineral resources, political boundaries in the Arabian peninsula, proposed boundaries of Asiatic Turkey, the Pan-Turanian area, ethnography, political subdivisions, language areas, and distribution of members of various religious faiths.

#### 61. MAP OF ANATOLIA. ca. 1918. 1 item.

An annotated base map showing the proposed boundaries of an Anatolian subdivision of Turkey and the area included in the Venizelos Claim (Greek) of January 1918.

#### 62. MAPS OF ARABIA. 1917-19. 6 items.

Arranged numerically.

Annotated base maps showing proposed boundaries for a Jewish state, areas of British control, linguistic areas, location of major cities, and topography; and an annotated photostat map showing political boundaries and railroads in Arabia.

#### 63. MAPS OF ARMENIA. 1917-19. 7 items.

Arranged numerically.

Annotated base maps showing various proposed boundary lines for an autonomous Armenian state, historic boundary lines of Armenia, population density, and distribution of members of various religious faiths in the Armenian areas.

#### 64. MAPS OF MESOPOTAMIA. ca. 1918. 2 items.

Annotated base maps, one of which shows proposed boundary lines for a Mesopotamian state

and the other, the strategic world position of Mesopotamia.

#### 65. MAPS RELATING TO SYRIA. ca. 1918. 4 items.

Arranged numerically.

An annotated base map showing boundaries of the proposed Jewish and Syrian states and autonomous district of Lebanon, and the location of Jewish agricultural colonies; and three maps relating to the Princeton Archaeological Expedition to Syria, 1904-5 and 1909.

#### Cartographic Records of the France, Belgium, and Schleswig Division

Within each series the records are arranged numerically. The France, Belgium, and Schleswig Division was formed in mid-1917 to study particularly the many Franco-German border problems. Similar problems involving Belgium, Denmark, and other western European nations also received its attention. Dr. Charles H. Haskins, dean of the Harvard Graduate School, served as Director.

#### 66. MAPS RELATING TO EUROPE. 1917-19. 5 items.

Annotated and manuscript maps and tracings showing battle lines on the Western Front, the location for a concrete obstruction proposed by the Allies to be built across the North Sea as a barrier to German submarines, and ethnic and linguistic distribution in Europe.

#### 67. MAPS OF FRANCE. 1917-18. 3 items.

An annotated map of the French battlefield showing areas of greatest destruction and two physiographic diagrams of the western war zone, one annotated to show the battle front at various dates.

#### 68. MAP OF THE NETHERLANDS. ca. 1918. 1 item.

An annotated map of the northern provinces of the Netherlands.

#### 69. MAPS OF SCHLESWIG. 1917-19. 4 items.

Annotated photostat maps showing linguistic and ethnic distribution in North Schleswig, and a proposed boundary line between Denmark and Germany, and photostats of linguistic population tables.

#### 70. MAPS OF SPITSBERGEN. ca. 1918. 2 items.

Annotated photostat maps showing the geographical and strategic relation of Spitsbergen to northern European nations, and geological information.
