1. Charles WILEY called collect from New York to report that he had gotten a manuscript written by a Edward J. HAMILTON who was described by WILEY as a long time Agency employee. An OS indices check revealed that in October 1960 Subject had been furnished an alias in conjunction with his proposed assignment to JMARC. In this conjunction Subject had received the name Edward J. HAMILTON, a backstop address and a District of Columbia drivers license in this alias. In June 1963 a post office box at the Woodridge Station in Washington, D. C. was set up for the Subject in the name Edward J. HAMILTON. This box was cancelled in June 1965. It may be assumed that since no other Security Office reference exists for "Edward J. HAMILTON" that this alias may be the nom de plume for Subject in this instance.

2. WILEY advised that he had reviewed sketchily the manuscript and saw nothing new nor exciting other than a reference to General Cabell, former director. According to the manuscript, and WILEY's version thereof, at the time of the Agency participation in the invasion of Cuba Mr. Dulles was out of town. General Cabell, returning from a golf game, allegedly cancelled the second or third air strike against the Castro forces. According to WILEY, General Cabell appears as the villain.

3. WILEY reported that the Holt Publishing Company thought the manuscript too controversial to publish and apparently referred it to Tom WALLACE or Bill BUCKLEY. It was thought that perhaps the Conservative Book Club might be interested.

4. WILEY indicated that he had to return the manuscript tomorrow (27 January 1970) and that he would call me before 11 a. m.
