Haiti is very much in the news these days, but it still has not too good a "press" in the business world. And the recent Affaire Fayed did not help... In my humble opinion, with Haiti so near, the US will have to reconcile themselves to the situation and assist that country, in order to avoid having another Cuba.,.

Recently I have been instrumental in bringing together 3 separate groups of people-in New York /Petroleum-Investments/, in Los Angeles /Mergers, international Management Consulting, development, financing etc/ and in the Middle West /Promotion, Real Estate investing with multi million capital behind, etc/. A separate corporation is to be set with offices probably in Rockefeller Center-N.Y. Among them are men familiar with international business and mining, oil, development and also familiar with Haiti, Dominican etc.
