Behind these activities, and concurrent to them, JMWAVE continued processing of 1) the PM Cedar team; 2) organization of an AMSPELL intelligence section and training of an intelligence team (DAMSON) consisting of a radio operator and two agents; and, 3) administratively, the processing of all 201 files, updating them to include PRQ Parts I and III MOC (if applicable), Secrecy Agreements, and technical/psychological assessments where appropriate.

In summing up the JNWAVE-AMSPELL control relationship, there is no panacea; if one statement could be applied to describe it, however, it would be simply that: In spite of rapport at Case Officer level, there is not JNWAVE control because of a conflict between AMSPELL objectives (PBRUMEN liberation soonest) and continued ODYOKE lack of PBRUMEN policy.

4) Development and Plans:

All planning phases of AMSPELL activities supported by JMWAVE at the present time are subject to the results of meetings with AMSPELL concerning increased control, and, the decisions of JMWAVE to continue a support relationship if an acceptable degree of KUBARK control can be established. Meanwhile, however, in the developmental stage is the organization and training of an AMSPELL Intelligence Section, to function independent of AMSPELL normal operations and directly in confunction independent of AMSPELL normal operations and directly in confuct with JMWAVE. This will consist of two officers and two secretaries who will process information gained from debriefing male and female refugee arrivals as well as AMSPELL operational returning personnel. Combined with this effort, is the DAMSON intelligence tenm, which will be formed around radio operator AMHINT-52 who has returned to operational status. The target date for infiltration of the DAMSON team is 15 October 1962. (See Attachment A.) Also, the CEDAR team, a PM team destined for Oriente Province returned from Isolation training and are awaiting infiltration. (See Reference G.)

ANHINTS:

August began with euphoria among AMHINTS because of the return of some of their members who had participated in the AMBARB delegation to Helsinki and the reports of successful agit/prop carried out at the Communist Youth Festival held there. This was not enough, however, to offset the coatinuing frustration of failure to exfiltrate AMHINT-53 on the RANYAN series of operations. Although-AMHINT-2 had no returned from Helsinki and West Berlin as yet, the acting leadership of AMSPELL vented their ire in a 6 August memorandum to JMWAVE, in which JMWAVE was blamed for much of the support failures in the AMHINT section and too much operational interference in the AMBARB functions. An urgent "interview" was requested.

When AMHINT-2 finally returned, a meeting was held with him on 17 August. ZANKA, NOEMAYR, and NELANDER represented AMHINTS, AMSPELL and AMBARBS, respectively, and during a two-hour session, discussed the points set forth in the AMSPELL memorandum, and much of the JMWAVE control problem with AMSPELL. In retrospect, the meeting could not be considered a success. Although some ANHINT paramilitary opera-tional problems were resolved, ANHINT-2 was adamant in retaining control of AMBARB funding of at least one official delegate in each country. He refused to even discuss LCFLUTTER for himself - he did however assure those present that this was personal and that other AMSPELL leaders may submit at their own discretion. One issue which could have made for more rapport in the meeting, was that of support for their vessel, the JUANIN I, which has been processing for about six months. Negotiations on this point eventually fell through comes and the state of the limit the vessel second pletely when AMSPELL rejected the terms of the Maritime Vessel Support Agreement. The meeting was concluded with arrangements for special meetings on the discordant points in the near future.

These meetings never materialized, for in the interim JNWAVE opted to approve the AVEARS funding arrangement - at least for the moment - and play a waiting game on AMHINT-2 refusal to accept tech ical and psychological assessment. Possibly, when all other leaders had been assessed, AMHINT-2 could then be issued an ultimatum, essentially "shaming" him into acceptance.

About this time, 20 August, another message was received from AMHINT-53 (Reference B). He advised AMSPELL headquarters in Miami that he would arrive on the 21st - no request for an operation, no mention of mode of travel, point of exit or entry. And as the days passed no sign of AMHINT-53 either.

Meanwhile, on 22 August, AMSPELL Coordinator Pedro YNTERIAN
Garcia, reported that AMHINTS in PBRUMEN would transmit a shortwave
declaration sometime between 24 and 26 August concerning the buildup
of Soviet/Bloc men and materiel in PBRUMEN. This broadcast was to
come from the vicinity of Havana en about 3500 to 3700 Kcs, and some
time between 2100 and 2300 hours local time. (Reference C) Although
AMSPELL had been working fervently at collection of intelligence on
this very topic, the report seemed strange to the JMWAVE Case Officer
who had ove: the past four months been attempting to supply the
electronic materials requisite to just such an undertaking. This was
dismissed, however, as another example of students' ingenuity and
improvising. KOLA and RIMM were asked to monitor the report, but was
forgotten until the early morning of 25 August.

The AMHINT raid on the Rosita HORNEDA (now Sierra Maestra)
Hotel and the Blanquita (now Chaplin) Theatre in the Miramar section
of Havana at about 2330 hours local time on the night of 24 August 1962
has been reported substantially in Reference D. The press has
covered it to the point of satiation, but the essential press reporting
was forwarded in Reference E. As the smoke of cannon and cold war
exchanges cleared, the operation could be analyzed for what it was,
and what it meant to JNWAVE in terms of the control relationship with
AMSPELL.

As stated earlier in this report, it was an Agit/Prop action designed to alert the peoples of Latin America, and impress upon the world, the reality of the Soviet buildup in PBRUMEN. It was also destined to - albeit students are apolitical by classical definition - place AMSPELL in a leading political position in framework of Latin American and PBPRIME anti-CASTRO, anti-Communist activities. AMSPELL realized this and prepared for a deluge of propaganda on the action. By the time JMWAVE had received instructions from Headquarters to caution them about gloating over their success, this propaganda campaign was already launched. Publicity was a buyers market for them and there was not enough AMSPELL participants or officials to satisfy the demands of press, television, radio, and personal appearances. Their degree of foresight and organization can be appreciated by the fact that the AMBARBS throughout the hemisphere were standing by with instructions for agit/prop should ODYOKE have decided to prosecute the AMHINTS participating in the action.

JMWAVE, however, cannot afford to be very objective about AMSPELL revolutionary zeal that not only aggravates the cold war exchanges, but places the Task Force - and ultimately, KUBARK - in an awkward and untenable control position as far as PBRUMEN independent action is concerned. It would be no overstatement to say that this exile group could sink a Soviet vessel and force ODYOKE to the brink of Therefore, on 30 August, when AMPALM-4 reported that the AMSPELL attack on Havana was the first of a three-phase plan, the second stage being an attack on a Soviet vessel in Havana Harbor - Subsequently abandoned in favor of an attack on a surfacecraft in Caibarten Harbor it was obvious that the JMWAVE/KUBARK control relationship with AMSPELL must be submitted to a profound and firm reappraisal. This was done under the supervision of REUTEMAN and through a series of conferences with TROUCHARD, ZAMKA, NOEMAYR and NELANDER. The results were reported to Headquarters by REUTEMAN in WAVE-7899 on 30 August In short, this Reference reviews the ANSPELL independent course of action, consequent liability KUBARK, framework of the JAWAVE relationship with AMSPELL and present commitments, and pointed out that the ultimate test of the control issue would be the severance of AMSPELL support funds. Headquarters comments and concurrence were requested but during the first week in September, this problem was treated during a series of conversations between the Chief of Station and the Chief of Task Force. A final decision is pending at the date of this writing.

C. ANBARB

No new AMBARB assignments of personnel to delegations in Latin America were made during August 1962, and no representatives of AMBARB were withdrawn from their areas of assignment. Therefore, the personnel assignment listing for AMBARB given in the June Profits. Report (UFGA-4840, dated 20 July 1962) is accurate, except for the addition of AMBARB-8 and AMBARB-77 to the delegation in Uruguay and selection of AMBARB-8 to the delegation in Costa Rica, as reported in the June Progress Report. No travel of AMBARB personnel to Miami occurred during the month of August except for the trip of AMBARB-75 from Bogota on 10 August for a stay of several weeks during which to renew his resident visa. AMBARB-16 departed 22 August 1962 for an inspection tour of Latin American delegations (WAVE-7468 and WAVE-7441) concerning which a report will be furnished; a main purpose of this trip was for AMBARB-16 to explore the AMBARB mailing operation capabilities.

A listing of AMBARBs awaiting assignment has been furnished in UFGA 5739; a listing of dropped AMBARBs has been furnished in UFGA-5704

The AMSPELL raid on Havana 24 August 1962 provided the dominant theme for AMBARB exploitation subsequent to that event Inasmuch as this adventure was undertaken without JMWAVE knowledge or concurrence and counter to the policy of our government, it would be superfluous of us to comment that we regard the event with misgiving from a stand-point of KUBARK "control" over AMSPELL. At the same time, a clear dist inction must be made between the activities of the AMBARB section of AMSPELL and those of the organization's military leadership: essentially, AMBARB serves only to promote propaganda activity in the Latin American countries where AMBARB delegates are assigned; and additionally some delegates work on covert assignments with local KUBARK stations in fulfilling GYROSE objectives. The overt tasks of the AMBARBS, however, serve to exploit the propaganda value of such events as the 24 August raid and to capitalize upon information demonstrating the failures of Castroism and Sovietization of Cuban life: as such, the AMBARBs are themselves removed from the center of such controversial activities as the 24 August raid or the threats of ANHINT-2 against shipping in Cuba. Naturally, the AMBARBs support the policies of their organization and the statements of its leader; as noted above, they could also bring their facilities to bear to embarass ODYOKE, at the behest of AMHINT-2, in the even ANSPENDENDED to mount a concentrated propaganda barrage condemning ODYOKE response to ANSPELL's unilateral undertakings. It is clear that the ANBARD potential to mount any such campaign of support for ANSPELL can be controlled by KUBARK only to the extent that local stations have direct dealings with the AMBARBs in Latin America. JMWAVE, for it s part, exerts every possible effort to assure that AMBARB representatives will not engage in any propaganda action likely to embarass ODLOKE or GYROSE policy courses. We are encouraged to believe that, while overall JMWAVE control of AMSPELL appears negligible at this time on We are encouraged to believe that, while the large issues of striking direct blows against targets of opportunity, we do have fairly good control over the subordinate AMBARB leadership within AMSPELL.

Basic JMWAVE policy in respect to the AMBARB Section of the AMSPELL organization has been set forth in considerable detail in our regular monthly progress reports for May, June, and July 1962. Our earlier remarks are still valid, and the reader is referred to them for a synopsis of our relationship with AMBARB and the general JMWAVE attitude towards future development of this group. It should be kept in mind that AMBARB is not a group over which KUBARK is in a position to exercise absolute control, but on the other hand it must be regarded as a distinct entity within AMSPELL itself whose potential JMWAVE hopes to develop at a separate pace without permitting AMBARB assets to become embroiled in controversy over AMSPELL paramilitary undertakings.

AMBARB is sensitive to what it would regard as any KUBARK attempt to "take over" its organization; therefore, in the matter of local Station funding of ANBARBS, we have agreed that at least one ANBARB delegate in each country will continue for the present to receive his salary directly from AMBARB. AMBARB argues that only by this means can AMBARB retain the minimum control over its people necessary to insure satisfactory execution of overt AMBARB propaganda activities (the funding for these overt activities will also continue to be paid for the present by AMBARB to its delegates). JHWAVE does not believe it would serve a useful purpose at present for local Stations to attempt to fund these regular AMBARB activities, since it should be remembered that these overt ANBARB activities give the organization. its public reason for being and, therefore, a cover facility under which AMBARBs may be utilized by local Stations for covert activities. Since AMBARB is jealous of administering the funds for its overt activities, JMWAVE feels it should be permitted to do so for the sake of KUBARK rapport with the group. At the same time, although AMBARB delegates receive from AMBARB propaganda materials, thematic guidance, and funds to cover local expenses in carrying out the overt AMBARB mission, local Stations are not precluded from exerting influence on AMBARB activities supporting GYROSE objectives. Since the local Stations will be paying the salaries of all but one ANBARB in their areas, as well as funding covert activities, it should be possible for local Stations to influence overt AMBARB work substantially. By agreement with AMSPELL, all covert utilization of AMBARBS by local Stations is strictly by arrangement between the ANBARB representatives themselves and the local Stations, and AMSPELL expects no information concerning such covert use either from JNWAVE or from its AMBARB representatives in the field.

Over a period of time, we expect that local Stations will gradually take over complete AMBARB funding. For example, in Chile the Santiago Station has assumed funding of all three AMBARBs, although BD-3269 required that if fund only one AMBARB. We convinced AMSPELL to accept this situation, so that in effect the Santiago Station will exercise direct, local control of AMBARB salaries, even though AMBARB will continue for the time being to send the delegation \$600 monthly for the conduct of overt AMBARB activities in Chile.

There is an additional advantage in permitting AMBARB to pay the salary of at least one of its delegates by mail from Miami and in allowing AMBARB to disburse funds, provided by JMWAVE, for overt AMBARB activities. By this means JMWAVE is in a position to obtain from AMBARB a coordinated monthly progress report of the total overt AMBARB work; this report, forwarded in the group of attachments to this dispatch, in turn furnishes Headquarters with a single point of reference in assessing the overall AMBARB overt effort. Naturally, for its part, JMWAVE does everything possible to elicit from AMBARB as complete an accounting as possible of the monthly propaganda activity undertaken by each AMBARB delegation throughout Latin America. Since it is doubtful that a timely, coordinated picture of all AMBARB activities in all countries could be obtained by means of separate local Station progress reporting on overt AMBARB work, JMWAVE considers this system the most satisfactory for keeping tabs on such widespread activities; we are doubtful that any centralized control

over AMBARB propaganda could be achieved without permitting the AMBARB office in Miami to retain some semblance of control over AMBARB delegations in the form of a monthly allowance of salary for at least one AMBARB representative.


1) Development and Plans

General plans for the future remain unchanged as reported in Progress Reports for the last three months. A number of AMBARBS are awaiting assignment, as reported in a separate dispatch cited above. Our main undertaking for the future will be to insure an orderly and gradual transfer of AMBARB representatives to local Station control, without impairing AMBARB morale by depriving the AMBARB office completely of administrative responsibility, as discussed above. JMWAYE believes it is in KUBARK's interest for the local Stations to fund the majority of AMBARBs in the field; at the same time the AMBARB to miami office will continue to fund the minimum of AMBARBS necessary to insure an orderly flow of AMBARB propaganda material to local LA outlets through the AMBARB delegations, to guarantee timely reporting outlets through the AMBARB delegations, to guarantee timely reporting from AMBARB delegations to the central AMBARB office in order to enable preparation of an overall progress report by AMBARB and JMWAYE on overt AMBARB activity, and finally to insure the responsiveness of AMBARB to JMWAYE efforts to step up recruitment of delegates suitable for covert use by WH Station in meeting GYROSE objectives.

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JULY 26. THE DAY.

In view of the dimensions the manifestation had acquired, the police thied to break it apart with horses, blackjacks, and tear has, but it anyway lasted until approximately 2 o'clock. Many young boys were arrested and these police cars' strens could be heard throughout the night. The Delegation had already made the right contacts to produce an incident during the inaugural march which bould take place along Fannarheim Ave. After Finnish youth had manifested in opposition to the restival and had thrown stones on the official cars, we determined to produce a violent action. According to that solice declared, around 20 young men

were arrested that night.

JULY 29, SUID Y.

Around 4 o'clock that afternoon, two members of the DE Delogation been gan to prepare a written cloth which textually said: "Freedom for the 15,000 young prisoners in Cuba". It was written in Spanish, English, and French. The Finnish translation as not ready in time and could not be presented. The cloth was a white sheet measuring 150 by 250 cms.

The rest of the group -4 persons- divided in two couples, one of which would take photos and the other one would inspect the place in order to find the most appropriate point to produce the incident.

At approximately 6:30 that late afternoon, Corlos Hernander, Juan Manuel Salvat, John Koch, and Enrique Baloyra, driving a Wopen car, tried to bre ak the line of spectators and place the car in front of the Cub number of the Cub number of the parliament. But the people did not go back, so they parked the car there. Koch and Baloyra climbed to the top of the car and began vigorously crying out while unfolding the cloth. The other two Hernandez and Salvat- stayed standing in the street and later rushed shead against the Communist Cuben Delegates. The police captured the two members of the Delegation that carried the cloth and the other two succeeded in escaping in the middle of the confusion high as brought about. Photos on the incident were taken by Ana Diaz and Jose I. Rodriguez, members of the DRE, and also by the OBS and by photographers of a news againty of estern Germany. The police seized the cloth and then released the two members of the DRE that had been captured, after having taken record of the in-

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cident. From that moment on, all the activities of our Deligation were carefully followed by the Finnish police.

JULY 30, 1:0XDAY.

At 10 o'clock in the morning Juan Manuel Salvat called tone ther a Press confer ence in order to explain the motives is the incident produced the day before. All lestern news correspondents in Helsinki, as well as representatives of the Finnish Press, were present at it. Each was given a copy of our booklet "The Forversion of a University". We hadthe opportunity to meet several delegates from the Swiss Coordination Center, also a Cuban named Pedro Reuiz Quintero who at first seemed a little suspicious, and a Congo native member of Pax Romana. Me headed that afternoon to solicit credentials to take part in the official acts of the Festival as representative delegation of the not-Communist Cuba. After having visited two or three organization centers of the International Breparatory Committee of the Festival, we decided to go directly to Jean Garcias, President of the Committee and highest hie orchical figure of the Festival. Garcias avoided the problem telling us, as had the other officials of the Festival, that we should suscribe in the official Delegation from Cuba, which we evidently did not do.

An American newspaper can accommanied us in all our activities to obtain the credentials. He apparently seemed to master himself controlling his nerves during all the time. The downot remember his name, we called him Roger, and made a pleasant impression on us. During the rest of the day nothing important of remarkable took place, the acts of the Festival, which had already lost strength, were held relitively normally. Once

JULY 31. That afternoon we assisted at a talk, counting on the supposed guarantee offered by Jarcia - that we had a right to attend all theracts of the Festival - . noger came along with us and recorded the discussion aroused between the officials of the Festival and Juan Manuel Salvat and the Disz Silveira, who argued and objected that we had been told we had the fight to speak at the talk. We returned disclosing our protests in presence of the many reporters who had now come about us.

That night again, quarrels between the rinnish police and the apponents to the restival took place. Folice acted more severely this time, since the manifestations were greater and more violent than the previous ones. They stretched forth Mannerheim Ave. through various zones of the city.

AUGUST 1 . NEDNESDAY .-

At 9 Sharp in the morning we went into the place where they were celebrating the final meeting of the Seminary for the Democratization of the Edutation it the beginning they did not let us got in, but afterwards we met swiss young man who young men who granted us some credentials. This man was interrogated by russians who kidnapped him during the event. Being us inside, we got a spot for speeching, and we had, also, the right of a three-minute speeching in case we whished to do it. There were 85 speechers before us.

At 12:30 pm. we had a brake. At the exit gate there were about 40 members of the red Cuba delection who tried to provoke us. They were directed by Venegas and Al room. Nothing happened cause we were waiting for the evening session to produce a great end.

When we returned back it was 3.30 m. This time we couldn't make it. Then we began to discuss our points of view. In the discussion, more or less, Robert Pinel, President of the International Union of Students, told us we had no right to participate in the Seminary cause we were exited cubans. In all the discussion we were sorrounced by security agents of the International Proparatory Committee. The conversation was recorded by an american correspondent.

The discussion finished when Finel broke it up. Another arerican correspondent informed us that the finish police was seeking us with an order of extradiction. We decided there, to abandon the piace and retire back to think talma about the new situation and take a decision. At 6pm keep and Balogra were intercepted by an armored jeep of the finden police,

They were conduced to the Police Station.

After a three hour staying there they put them in jail. Meanwhile Salvat, Hernandez and Diaz had another meeting with the press, and they informed public opinion about the evening deeds.

The impartrial observers and violent reaction against the international Permanent Committee after they knew this deeds. The press failed trying to make contact with the imprisioned Dan delegates, because finish police didn't want a single word about it. The rest of our delegation was affraid from kidnapping, but after they ask information to police about both they knew the truth. They believed it because since days ago, our movements were watched, and by the were fact that a middle, aged guy from Argentina tried to make contact with us and afterwards, we could know he was JAIME CODOVIIA well known member of N.A.V.D.

The day finished with the firmin police finding out two automatic pistols in the luggage at the station wagon where koch and Baloyra were arrested. The pistols were a 38 Star and a 52 caliber automatic pistols.

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August 2, Thursday:

The day began with the rumor that a bomb blasted at the Finnish Commist Farty Headquerters.

After a four hours questioning, during that the police tried to seek who sconsored financially our delegation, what contacts did the delegation make and other routine questions, the 2 imprissioned members of our delegation were accused by police as responsable of the night rists, ilegal weapon possesion and were submitted for deportation. At 5 p.m. they were released under their word to take the first plane t o Stockholm.

The rest of the delegation put a flower offering at Pariscal Mauner heine Statue, and they have the press the following declara-

"After this evening incident in which members of DRE tion: organization of cub n exiled youth, were forbidde n to assist the Coloquium convocated by the Sth. Youth Postivel, it has been stated that such festivels are merely a subject at the service of the ends and purposes commist totalitarium.

DRE representation have been making efforts to express themselves in the Pestivel. This orning seemed to be thet they would have the opportunity to make it, then they got it from a guy named voldes, member of the Chilean Radical Youth.
