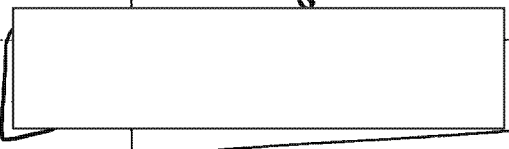

 SUBJECT : Ruby-Oswald Conspiracy

1. ~~The~~ Evening Star of 9 July 1976 carried an inside article entitled "Ruby Met With Castro, Sturgis Says". The ~~five~~ paragraph article made the following points:

A. Watergate burglar Sturgis says Ruby met ~~Castro~~ and discussed "removal" of Kennedy ten weeks before the assassination.

B. Sturgis passed above information to US ~~Government~~ agencies in early 1964.

C. Sturgis' investigation of Cuban exile involvement ~~in~~ assassination was negative.

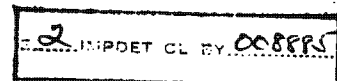
d. Sturgis refused to identify agency for which ~~employed~~, but is known to have worked for CIA.

E. Sturgis said his investigation produced evidence ~~that~~ Oswald and Ruby were involved in the same conspiracy along with other people.

2. ~~The~~ following comments re Sturgis' remarks are based ~~on~~ agency ~~records~~:

A. With regard to the report that Sturgis was ~~employed~~ by the Agency the report of the Rockefeller ~~Commission~~ on page 252 says that Sturgis testified

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under oath that he was never an employee of the Agency and a search of Agency records revealed no evidence of such employment in any form.

B. The Agency did ~~report~~ ^{forward} to the FBI in CSCI 3/779,814 on 30 January 1964 ~~that an unevaluated~~ ^{INFORMATION from AN} ~~report~~ ^{EXILE ORGANIZATION} of a visit by Ruby to Cuba in late 1962-early 1963 had been received from Havana. This same report received press distribution and was widely known in the Cuban exile community in Miami.

C. There was no confirmatory information for that report either before or since it was made.

D. In considering the matter of Agency diligence and thoroughness in investigating the assassination of President Kennedy, the main point is that the information was reported.

E. There is no record in the Agency that this information was reported to the Warren Commission by the Agency ^{OR} ~~of~~ the Bureau. In fact National Archives state that the Warren Commission records do not contain the information.

F. On the same point it is noted that in a memo to the Warren Commission on 15 September 1964 the DDP Mr. Karamesines said, "The Agency has no indication that Ruby and Oswald. . . might have been connected in any manner."

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G. It is clear from our records that the ^{JANUARY 74} memo-
 randum to the Bureau on Ruby's visit to Cuba was in
 the file material which was made available to ^{DAN DWYER JR OF} the
 Senate Sub-committee staff on 1 December 1975.

THE CASE — which
arose from a 1971 complaint
filed by Ralph Nader — pri-
marily involves fares
charged in California and
Texas, where there are
local intrastate airlines
(those that fly solely within
a single state) not regulat-
ed by the CAB. In both
states fares between cities
within the state are sub-
stantially lower than those
normally charged by inter-
state airlines.

As a result, interstate
airlines long have main-
tained two sets of fares for
the states involved — one
for interstate passengers
and one for intrastate pas-
sengers. The fares involve
only points within each
state, and interstate pas-
sengers are not affected
unless they wish to travel
within either California or
Texas.

In recent years, as word
of the difference has
spread, even knowledge-
able long-distance travel-
ers have been able to buy
lower-priced tickets on
trips to Texas and Califor-
nia by specifying they want
the intrastate price.

Most passengers, how-
ever, are unaware of the
difference and wind up pay-
ing far higher fares.

ACCORDING TO the
June 1976 Official Airline
Guide, for example, the
intrastate fare between San
Francisco and Burbank (a
Los Angeles suburb) is
\$25.50. The interstate fare is
\$30. Between San Antonio
and Houston, intrastate
passengers pay \$15 while
interstate passengers are
charged \$31.

In issuing the ruling, the
CAB authorized the inter-
state airlines involved to
lower their fares to the ex-
tent necessary to meet
competition.

Ruby Met With Castro, Sturgis Says

MIAMI (UPI) — Water-
gate burglar Frank Sturgis
says that Jack Ruby met in
Havana with Fidel Castro
10 weeks before the assassi-
nation of President Kenne-
dy and discussed "removal
of the president" along with
arms purchases for Cuba
and smuggling of illicit
drugs into the United
States.

Sturgis said in a tele-
phone interview yesterday
that he "and other agents"
passed that information on
to various government
agencies early in 1963, be-
fore the Warren Commis-
sion completed its hearings,
but he is uncertain whether
the information was ever
made available to the com-
mission.

Sturgis said he had been
assigned to investigate
possible involvement of
Cuban exiles in the Miami
area in the Kennedy assas-
sination. He said neither his
investigation nor that of fel-
low agents turned up any
Cuban exile tie with the
shooting of Kennedy.

He refused to say for
what agency he was work-
ing, or who gave him the as-
signment. Records have
indicated that he was work-
ing for the CIA at about that
time.

He said the investigation
did produce evidence that
Kennedy assassin Lee Har-
vey Oswald and Ruby, who
shot Oswald while he was in
police custody in Dallas,
were involved in the same
conspiracy, along with
other people.

Extract of a letter from St. Eustatia
