Dear Dick,

Your [redacted] Station has sought my views on the possibility of declassifying a Warren Commission document in which reference is made to the [redacted]. The document in question is [redacted] together with an attachment dated 29th November, 1963.

I would recommend strongly that [redacted] and its attachment should not on any account be declassified or publicly released for reasons which include the following :

- (i) It has never been officially stated that there is a "C.I.A. [redacted] Station" or that there are C.I.A. officers in [redacted]. This has been avoided as a point of policy.
- (ii) Publication of these facts would invoke a spate of questions by the Press and in the Parliament, which would be contrary to the national security interest, for example :
 - (a) Who approved the establishment of the "C.I.A. [redacted] Station"?
 - (b) What is its composition and location?
 - (c) What is its purpose in [redacted] (Allegations have already been made that C.I.A. is interfering in [redacted] domestic affairs.)
 - (d) With what [redacted] agencies does it deal? [redacted] which has not been publicly disclosed, could be brought into discussion.)
 - (e) With what other foreign agencies does the [redacted] deal?
 - (f) What [redacted] control is there over such dealings?

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(iii) Questions could be raised as to the investigation by the [redacted] of the anonymous telephone calls, the validity of its quoted conclusion and the result of its further enquiries.
