1. A check of headquarters' files has revealed that on 16 March 1951, the FBI made available the following memorandum concerning David Duno TENDLER Lang, who may be identical with the Daniel DUNO described in reference as a contact of Ludovico MURWITZ. The information originated at the San Antonio, Texas, office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service on 10 March 1951.

David Duno Tandler Lang was born November 7, 1912 in Poland. He departed from the United States at Dallas, Texas on March 4, 1951.

On September 30, 1944, one David Tandler, aka Daniel Duno, arrived at Brownsville, Texas via Pan-American Airways enroute from his residence, Geneva Hotel, Mexico, D.F. to Great Northern Hotel, New York City. At that time he advised that he was a Polish citizen born November 7, 1912 at Truste, Poland. He held Polish passport No. 8416, issued at Mexico, D.F., March 20, 1944, valid for one year. He advised that his wife is Ana Valeria Tandler, a Polish citizen residing in Mexico, D.F.

He stated that he left Poland in 1936 and went to Milan, Italy, where he stayed until 1939. Thereafter, he resided at Nice and Monte Carlo, France, until August, 1941 where he was an opera singer. He came to Cuba in 1941, where he resided until October 22, 1942. He has resided in Mexico since that time.

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At the time of his entry in 1944, he stated that he was returning from a concert tour in Rio de Janeiro, Trinidad, and the Canal Zone, and was enroute to go on a tour in Canada. He also expected to accept a contract with Charles Wagner, an impresario in New York City, for a tour in the United States.

He advised that his parents had lived in Lwow, Poland, but that he believed them to be dead since he had heard nothing from them for four years.

2. The files of a predecessor organization contain an Overseas News Agency article, dated 9 January 1944 at Mexico City, which states that Daniel DUNO, a Metropolitan Opera singer who was then singing with the Mexican opera, was threatened by Minister NEMEN of the Polish Legation in Mexico City with withdrawal of his Polish passport if he took part in a concert sponsored by the Aid to Russia Committee. DUNO at that time was under contract for concert tours in several Latin American countries.
