1. Charles R. BAUMBACH is listed as the Executive Officer for the Institute for Policy Studies in Washington, D. C.

2. FBI reports reveal that Charles BAUMBACH of 1216 East 54th Street, Chicago, Illinois, was an Associate Editor of New University Thought in 1961. New University Thought, located in 1961 at 909 East 55th Street, Chicago, Illinois utilized a mailing address of 5478 South Woodlawn Avenue, Chicago. In the Spring 1961 issue the editorial stated, "WE, young intellectuals, students, and professionals, founded New University Thought because we are dissatisfied with what we saw."

During March 1961, ten thousand copies of this publication were printed at Praga Press, which is the printing firm primarily concerned with the printing of "Ludove Noviny" and "Nova Doba", both of which are reported to be Communist-dominated publications.

The files of this Agency reveal that in August 1962 New University Thought published an abridged version of Pakistan Today, a British publication whose editor, Hanza Alavi (also spelled Alvi), is well known for his Communist views. This abridgement, entitled "Pakistan: The Burden of U.S. Aid", is described as easily the most damaging piece of

work to the U.S. Aid Program ever seen.

One of the Associate Editors, David Charles HALPERIN (201-280321), the son of American Communist Maurice HALPERIN (201-128561) wrote a letter on New University Thought letterhead dated 10 March 1961 to Albert MALTZ (201-005329) and his wife, Margaret, both members of the American Communist Group living in Mexico.


Charles HALPERIN had contact with both the MALTZs and with Anna and Noah SEBORER while in Mexico City for the Christmas Holidays in 1960. Anna SEBORER, a suspected Soviet agent, and Noah SEBORER are both American Communists living in Mexico City.
