GENERAL

At Cheverly, Maryland:

On 17 May 1961, a live address was established for Gladys O. DANBRUNT at [redacted] Maryland, through the cooperation of [redacted] and [redacted] householder at that address.

On the same date, Mrs. [redacted]⁰⁶ her daughter, [redacted]⁰⁶ and son, George, were briefed to the effect that they should accept any cables, letters, telegrams or telephone calls for Mrs. DANBRUNT. In the event any inquiries were received concerning Mrs. DANBRUNT, they were to advise that Mrs. DANBRUNT was residing with them but that she was not available at the moment. They were to determine who was calling and the purpose of the call. If the call was from the cable or telegraph office, Mrs. [redacted] or [redacted] was to call back later as Mrs. DANBRUNT and receive the message and request delivery of the written cable or telegram. In the event the inquiry was from any other source, they were to contact the Reporting Agent immediately.

The same individuals were further briefed, in general, as to why Mrs. DANBRUNT was supposedly residing with them and why she was expecting some form of communication. They were informed that Mrs. DANBRUNT was the mother of Mustace H. DANBRUNT, who was being held a prisoner by a foreign government. The mother has sent a cable to her son asking how he is, whether he needs anything, inquiring if there is anything she can do for him, and asking him to please communicate with her. She is now awaiting and expecting some form of reply from him.

On the following day, 18 May 1961, Dr. [redacted]⁰⁶ was⁰⁶ contacted. The above information had been related to him by Mrs. [redacted] at the request of the Reporting Agent. Dr. [redacted] was requested to notify the [redacted] and the [redacted] Post Offices that Mrs. DANBRUNT was residing at his home and any mail received for her should be delivered to his address.

On 22 May 1961, Dr. [redacted]⁰⁶ was again contacted and he advised that he had personally called the Postmistress at the [redacted] Post Office regarding delivery of Mrs. DANBRUNT'S mail and had requested

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hor, in turn, to notify the [redacted] Post Office.

Dr. [redacted] is a well-known [redacted] He maintained an office at [redacted] for a number of years until he was drafted into military service. He served in the Army as a [redacted] and upon his release, as a Lieutenant Colonel, he re-opened [redacted] with an office at [redacted] a number of years he was on the [redacted] as an instructor of [redacted] the [redacted] He has resided in [redacted] Maryland for at least the past twenty years, previously at [redacted] and currently at [redacted] His daughter, [redacted] is attending Maryland University. His son, [redacted] is attending [redacted] College High School.

Daily contact was maintained with Dr. [redacted] on 22, 23 and 24 May 1961. As of the latter date, no communication had as yet been received for Mrs. DARRUNT.

On 18 May 1961, a Western Union Telegram was sent to Eustace DARRUNT, Reclusorio Nacional, Nueva Gerona, Isla de Pinos, Cuba. A copy of this telegram is attached as Exhibit #1.
