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1. In bringing Headquarters up to date regarding the APPANETY/5-Colub relationship we would first like to make a few commonts on reference cimpatch which discussed the suitability of a second FM (1), trip for (1)/5. Head-overters has a lower opinion of (AP)/5 than the tation has. We agree that 22 (AP/5 is probably unsuitable for any CE operation directed against Colub, other than reporting on her contact with him, largely because of her personal reluctance to become any further involved with him than she already is. However, we also feel that she has handled herself fairly well in a rether difficult attuation. She has never professed to being a Soviet scholar as such, but she is fairly knowledgeable and convergant on Communist theory and current politics and has been able to hold her own in discussions with Colub. She is a prodigious reader and keeps up on all aspects of U. 3. political and cultural life. (She was employed by Senator Jackson) of Washington State in his last empaign.

2. As far as her overall production on her RENATE trip is concerned, it is true that it was "not startlingly impressive;" however, no mention was made if the information on Soviet public reaction to the Berlin crists sent [1] in 217 was over disseminated. Crented the information was negative, but permare it was contributive during that critical period. In any event this was one of the main reasons for heretrip. The only other positive intolligence we reported was included in [Chi] %47 and 950. Many details were lacking, as you point out, but both sightings were fleeting and were made when she was truvelling. Also, we would like to stress that the customer evaluations of CB 3/403,094, which included both of the above field reporte, stated that the report would have been improved considerably if details such as the exact departure, arrival and sighting times had been included. Cur field report, CDFN 947, included this information but it was left out of Headquarters disseminated report. We will debrief her on this particular sighting for any additional information.

3. The above ecomente are academic and are not intended to push the possibility of a second RTEXIE trip, unless some unforaseen operational opportunity presents itself. Of celub told (A)'s that he had an extra ticket and if and had no ebjection to going to a public piace with him, she could have it. A number of times he OZ asked [175 ti she was sure she wanted to go with him. Colub attempted to explain to ner how it would look for an American student to be seen with a coviet diplomat at a function which would undoubtedly be attended by most of the American imbussy. (All) stated the baruly know anyone at the imbassy and boaldes she was free to choose her friends. Column obviously was cuite dis-OZturbed that (A) 5 would get in trouble being seen with him and stated: "You don't understand. If I saw a Soviet student with an American diplomat, it eculd be my outy to send the Soviet home immediately. % (AS)'s responded that Wings were different for American citizens and that we did not live in a police state. She stated that she coubted very much if anyone in the Dabass cared one way or the other. Colub gave her the ticket and told her they would most at their seats which were together. During the intermission Colub got mp by himself and walked around slone. (A 11 totober Celub called Coatille to invite his to lunch. (This is the first overture Colub has made toward Costille since the beginning of September.) 6. Boris Mobin (201-196362)*+; he has been met by both [17]5 and Costille socially. He is shout 5'10", 170 lbs, light break hair truck lighter in color than shown in his ENICAP Notobook photo;, slin but sturdily built, appears to be in good physical shape, rough stim, sharp, bard face. Although the MUNCAP shout states he was born in Sverdlowsk, Siberia, CAT'S believes that he is a Karele-Fine. He also told Costille that he had just returned (sugger 1959) from a vacation in Petrosavodek, Larald-Finnish UCSA. He speaks some Pinnish, a little inglish, Swedish and Sussian. he is friendly, quiet, moderate to heavy spoker and drinker (he handles his liquor bell), and does mot give the impression of being too cultured or everly intelligent. Judying by appearance and manuscrisms he is not comeone a person would like to neet alone in a dark alley. ALT set him once or thice at colub's aportuent and again at the Coviet exhibition in Pelsinki. He was friendly to ner, but still standoffish. Since Slodin is such a different type than folub or femal, 6175 asked Colub shy Florin was always included in their social evenings.
