POLYGRAPH RESULTS

Analysis of the polygraph test indicates consistent reactions to questions 16, 16a, 13, 13a, 20, 22, 20 (4), 51, 56, 57, 60, 62, 64, and 65. These reactions were not resolved through interrogation because of insufficient time being available. It is, however, the interrogator's opinion that Subject has much more information to reveal and must be re-interviewed at a later date and then tested again.

DETAILS

1. Information obtained from Subject during the pre-test interview indicates a close relationship between Subject and a Dominican Republic citizen in the United States on a resident visa. This individual is undoubtedly one of Subject's closest friends and confidants. In Subject's own words, "I tell her everything."
2. Subject's financial status was discussed. She advised she had no bank accounts, that money meant nothing to her. She said when she needed money, she always got some from her father and friends. She was asked to name the friends that had given her money and to state approximately how much money they had each given.

CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Information obtained from Subject is outlined in attachment which is a transcription of the interview. These transcriptions were made because Subject and the information presented by her presented a bizarre background, one which is interwoven with odd financial circumstances, intelligence personalities and activities and many questionable associations. Subject's motivation and loyalty are unknown at this point. Also, the extent of her devotion to Castro and his beliefs is questionable.

2. Before Subject can again be interrogated and given a polygraph examination, the following should be completed:

- a. Research completed on attached transcriptions.
- b. All of Subject's close associates investigated.
- c. Thorough asset checks completed.
- d. All background information existing on Subject be obtained, FBI, Bureau of Narcotics, Department of State, etc., and presented to the undersigned for review in order to prepare for the next interrogation.

4. The Security Support Division provided audio coverage during the interrogation. Transcriptions of the tape recordings are attached.

5. Mrs. Joan Pierson, CI/JM/RK, and the Case Officer, Mr. Hermsdorf, monitored the entire interview from an adjoining room.

These transcriptions were made because Subject and the information presented by her presented a bizarre background, one which is interwoven with odd financial circumstances, intelligence personalities and activities and many questionable associations. Subject's motivation and loyalty are unknown at this point. Also, the extent of her devotion to Castro and his beliefs is questionable.

2. Before Subject can again be interrogated and given a polygraph examination, the following should be completed:

- a. Research completed on attached transcriptions.
- b. All of Subject's close associates investigated.
- c. Thorough name checks completed.
- d. All background information existing on Subject be obtained, FBI, Bureau of Narcotics, Department of State, etc., and presented to the undersigned for review in order to prepare for the next interrogation.
