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REPORT OF THE

SUBJECT: Meeting with Marcel Ray and Paul Cidres in the latter's apartment (30 West 60th Street, New York City) on 22 November, 1960.

PART THREE OF THREE

1. This portion of my report on above meeting deals with misstatements and omissions which came up during that meeting and which, perhaps, cast additional light on the KDF's political posture.

2. Strengths: the entire conversation became quite clear that Marcel Ray had no illusions and was prepared to believe the various pro-Castro positions which form his alliance with individual MRDers & revolutionaries as a result of "free talk" amongst themselves it appears to me that the KDF is beginning to lose some of its more controversial members. There was repeated reference to the KDF's desire and resolution to work in the best of terms with the U.S. and to be fully committed to all free West German activities, by rejected by revolution. Yet he and/or his group right have "neutralist" aspirations which does not necessarily fit the role of a Latin American known. Again and again, Marcel Ray explained the need to fight the Soviet Union's influence in Cuba to the intent. Also noted in this connection was how he would retain the Soviet/Cuban influence in Cuba, he first tried to talk around the subject, saying that these relationships would have to be considered in the light of Cuba's international status. After this, he denied this totally, saying that these issues of international significance had not been fully considered at all by himself or his group and that they had to give full thought in the forthcoming meeting.

3. When asked to define his position vis a vis the Church, Ray pointed with pride to Bishop Fins and Bishop Casalio—the former an important lay church leader, the latter an important figure in Cuba's Catholic hierarchy. According to Ray, some discrediting proclamations are also already available within the U.S. In other words, Ray claims that he is working well with the Church and the Church is working well with his movement. So, say, as I understand it, he received the final copy of the KDF's program, which he notes was quite different from the first draft that had been given to me. (Concurs this represents recently published in Arms, and so currently has translation to U.S. A cursory examination shows that indeed this platform has been toned down a bit.)

4. Ray informed us that the Cuban Christian Committee of Friends' PCC group has contacts with Gauss and is now working directly with the PCC.

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4. Bay inquired whether or not a decision had been made on the striking of certain KIP singletons. I said that this was a matter for discussion on the technical level. (Comment: unless this has been fully analyzed, I would suggest that KIP/M/PI transmit pertinent instructions on this matter to KIP as soon as possible.)

5. Do we have explosives inside Cabin #8 which could be given to the KIP people at an early date, Bay asked? My answer to this was that I do not yet know. (Comment: I would suggest that KIP/M/PI examine this subject and make pertinent instructions--whatever they may be--to KIP.)

6. While Bay never deviated during this meeting from his previous agreement to coordinate military plans with us, he continued to probe to find out whether or not we could be willing to supply him the names and types of key ports which would facilitate coast operations. In case he wanted "a boat," he said. It is realized that such a boat costs money and, later on, certain cover arrangements will have to be devised. Could we buy the boat; could we provide it with the necessary cover; and, after this is done, would we then turn the boat over to the KIP to be used as they see fit? My answer was that we would fall into the category of sympathizers, since we could explore fully previously during this meeting. (See parts one and two of this Counter Report.)

8. Bay informed us that he had just met a key person and that a meeting with him would be arranged soon; we all must participate in establishing a system under which favorable installations can be established and can be preserved. Bay remarked.

9. Bay told us that he and SIEBEL had a appointment with a Mr. Tom McLean(?) of Time Magazine in the afternoon of 17 November.

10. I told I would write to Mr. [REDACTED] a Cuban currently working in Brazil for Prestrelle, & Green firm. [REDACTED] is to be utilized by the KIP for psychological warfare work. I said that I would look into this matter. .04

11. About three times during the meeting, Bay made a request for special maps which he said were provided by the Aerial Service Company in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This request was not calling these maps publicly. Could I use my influence with the Foreigner or other places to get these maps? Bay also stated that this problem had been raised previously in Miami with [REDACTED] (different); unless there are some strong objections, I suggested that these maps could be made available to the KIP through our diplomatic channels. It is suggested that KIP/M/PI carry the ball on this, if you so wish.) .06 .06

12. Bay who based his information that [SRI MUNI] has about 110 men under his command in Cuban territory. Bay felt that [SRI] has no influence in the Sierra Maestra and that his [SRI] sympathies were not to the KIP. However, after the [SRI] military debacle, [SRI]'s entourage had cooled off a bit and perhaps this would not be the time if not to approach to [SRI] (however, I now do recall some previous KASH traffic on [SRI] the issue, this issue is related to KIP/M/PI's attention for whatever use they intend to have of it.)

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13. Approximately five MF people currently stationed in New York are in contact with the CPUSA in this area, by radio. The MF people are alienating individuals from their Castro followers and at the same time working to turn to Luton their defectors. They did not want to give the names of these people to us and I did not pursue the matter further at this meeting.

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
