We presume that most or all of the important basic biographic data on his available to DCDS. For that reason, we will not attempt to supply any great amount of this except as it will provide a better setting for this assessment. 2. Our normal source description for represents a capsule summary of his background. The following additional points developed by our source seem to be relevant. was born in (Lille) France. His father is a US citizen. His mother was French at the time of his birth, but may since have been naturalized in this country. spent his youth alternately in France or the US and grew up to be completely bilingual in these two languages. He speaks French with no foreign accent. After attending (Chio State University, he took graduate work in French at /Princeton, During this latter period, in 1941 he joined the Free French Forces, was commissioned a lieutenant therein and served in Africa under General LeClair in the campaign from Lake Chad to Tunisia. Later he was younded in Italy, nearly losing his fright arm as a result $\mathcal{V}^{\mathcal{D}}$ He spent about two years in a hospital recovering and was awarded the French Legion of Honor. After the yar, he completed his graduate work and took a position at (Duke) University and distinguished himself in the performance of his duties there. He was hired from (Duke) by (Cornell) University and has been at the latter ever since. TO Our source's close association with at this particular period. was converted to Catholicism Somewhere along the line, and our source describes him as a devout Catholic. He married (a French girl) from whom he has been separated in recent years. is a great admirer of President DeGaulle and knows him personally. He has a strong and continuing interest in

He is extremely well informed and does this particular job in a superior manner. 
