<p>1. On the evening of 24 October 1961 S'ITHAN received a telephone call from AMSHIP/1, who said that he and AMSHIP/2 would be in Rome until the morning of 27 October at the latest. An appointment was made for a meeting at the Hilton Hotel at 1200 hours on 25 October. S'ITHAN and BUNCE kept the appointment.</p> <p>2. We had planned to take AMSHIP/1 and AMSHIP/2 to lunch, but they were tied up and had, in fact, little anticipated free time before their departure. A brief talk was therefore held in the lobby of the Hilton--an unsatisfactory meeting site. AMSHIP/2 greeted us but immediately had to return to a store full of customers. AMSHIP/1 explained that he had recently been in Paris and Madrid and that Madrid was fully briefed on his recent activities. For this reason, and also because of the insecurity of the site, BUNCE did not take up the question posed in Reference b. of Reference a, ie can explore this matter later if it is necessary.</p> <p>3. AMSHIP/1 said that business in Rome is booming and that he and/or AMSHIP/2 expected to be back in ten days, when they would again get in touch with us. BUNCE briefly explained to AMSHIP/1 that we should appreciate it if he would determine whether he has any trusted Cuban friends in Paris, Madrid, or elsewhere, who know Ramon Matias (201-35144) well. He will check. AMSHIP/1 was asked if there was anything we could do for him and he said no.</p>

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4. Shortly before SMITH and BUNCE left, AMHIP/2 rejoined the group. At this point SMITH was engaged in a conversation in Spanish with ALMIDA/1. AMHIP/2 took a little to one side and explained in German (ALMIDA/1 was not listening, in any case) that he had filled out the PBO I which BUNCE had given him but that there were a few items which he wanted to discuss with BUNCE before handing the form over. He could not do so in the presence of ALMIDA/1 because, according to AMHIP/2, ALMIDA/1 is not aware of AMHIP/2's tie to KUBINKA, and AMHIP/2 wants to keep it that way. (AMHIP/2 is obviously well aware of ALMIDA/1's tie.)

5. AMHIP/2 had to get back to Geneva not later than 27 October 1964 because as was reported in Reference 3, Swiss authorities are continuing to insist that as a foreigner AMHIP/2 cannot live in Geneva. He has now hired two lawyers and is prepared to make a fight of it, but he is obviously worried that he may be forced out, despite the fact that he grew up in Geneva and regards it as his home town.

6. AMHIP/2 also said that the Rome store was doing very well and that he felt sure that he would be back in ten days. (BUNCE Comment: In the past AMHIP/2's visits to Rome have always been much more widely spaced than he had planned or expected.)

7. We have from DEVIGIL a report dated 26 October 1964 which merely states that ALMIDA/1 makes frequent trips between Rome and Geneva for unknown reasons and that he is often accompanied by AMHIP/2. As Headquarters knows, we have surfaced AMHIP/1 to DEVIGIL; and in accordance with the permission granted in OIRW-22967, 7 August 1964, we shall also surface AMHIP/2, but only to DEVIGIL and only verbally. We shall not communicate anything about the activities of either outside Italy and shall relay information about any action in Italy only if DEVIGIL has a need to know.

8. The information in Reference c. about Juan ALMIDA Bosque is very interesting. AMHIP/2 has twice mentioned ALMIDA to BUNCE. ALMIDA came out to the home of AMHIP/2 and family in Havana with the intent of requisitioning it but instead became a firm friend and protector of the family. AMHIP/2 describes him as simple, straightforward, likeable, and very popular with the Cuban people. It is believed that AMHIP/2 described him as a mulatto. He fought bravely with Castro's forces at the time of the revolution, but his present important position is the result of his popularity and his value to the regime as a symbol, not of sophistication or a high level of intelligence.

9. During his next visit to Rome AMHIP/2 cannot get away from ALMIDA long enough for the discussion of the PBO I which is expected (or for a debriefing on ALMIDA's visit with AMHIP/1 and possibly fit it materialized), or if AMHIP/2's visit is such delayed, BUNCE feels that we should accept AMHIP/2's request for, perhaps, a visit to his home in Geneva. So doing would give the obvious advantage of enabling us to obtain whatever information he has more rapidly and more securely. It would save the further advantage of making it easier to persuade AMHIP/2, who will feel more secure at home, that he runs no major risk, in a return to an event relationship to KUBINKA. One probable result of such a talk with AMHIP/2 is, however, a renewal of his offer to bring his wife into the operational picture, per paragraph 4 of ref 1 above. (According to AMHIP/2, he and his wife worked as a team for the COMINT officer listed in

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paragraph 3 of Reference c.) In this event, BUNCE will request biographic data on the wife, make an assessment, and forward a recommendation to Headquarters. If the trip to Geneva does become necessary, we shall of course notify CERN and Geneva in advance.
