on 7/12/67, another governmental agency which conducts intelligence investigations, informed that during September, 1962, (subject) was approached by the Cuban (S) Intelligence Service (CIS) in Cuba and offered the opportunity of taking an "espionage course" however she claimed asylum in the Uruguayan Embassy in Havana before any follow-up was made by CIS. (She subsequently) came to the United States. The above agency advised that during May, 1967, [she] received a letter from a CIS agent] (S suggesting a meeting in New York.) Thereafter, subject \ \ voluntarily advised the FBI that while in New York during July, 1967, she was recruited by CIS to work for them, in Miami. (She furnished detailed information concerning 5 [her contact, targets, objectives, paraphernalia, instructions(S and communications. Sources and informants not aware of any specific activities engaged in by subject while in Miami.

DETAILS:

On July 12, 1967, another United States Government Agency (which conducts intelligence investigations advised that in September, 1962, Justina Mireya Moreno Gonzalez had been approached by the Cuban

Intelligence Service (CIS) in Cuba and offered the opportunity of taking an "espionage course" prior to sering sent abroad. She accepted this offer; however claimed asylum in the Uruguayan Embassy, Havana, Cuba, on December 9, 1962, prior to any follow-up from the CIS. After being denied entry into the United States she went to Spain and subsequently arrived in the United States on December 19, 1964.

Subject was in contact with PEDROADRAMAS PEREZ, (5) a Cuban intelligence agent assigned to penetration of anti-government groups in Cuba. On May 11, 1967, she received a letter from ORAMAS, which accompanied a letter of instructions presumably from the CIS. This letter was addressed to Mrs. Mireya Moreno, 319 Southwest 13th Avenue, Miami, Florida. The addressee was listed as Cecilio Fernandez, 84-29 153rd Avenue HwdB, Queens, New York, and the letter was postmarked May 9, 1967, Flushing, New York. This letter requested the subject to work for the CIS in the United States, with suggestions for a meeting in New York or Canada. (5)

(Subject took no action concerning this letter, (S)

On July 6, 1967, the subject received a tele-(5) phone call from a Cuban female who identified herself (5) as "Julia" (She alleged she was a cousin of ORAMAS (5) and was calling from New York City. "Julia" told the subject that in accordance with a message from ORAMAS (5) she, Moreno, should go to New York City on July 14, 1967, (5) and register at the Hotel Rex, where "Julia" would meet (5) her.(5)

On July 19 and July 21, 1967, Mireya Moreno, 319 Southwest 13th Avenue, Miami, Florida, voluntarily furnished the following information to representatives of the Federal Bureau of Investigation:

On July 19, 1967, she returned from New York
City at 1:30 a.m., having departed Miami for New York
via Eastern Airlines on July 14, 1967. She immediately
proceeded to the Hotel Rex, located on 47th Street,
between Broadway and the Avenue of the Americas, New
York City. After registering at the Hotel Rex under
the name of Justina Mireya Moreno, 319 Southwest 13th

On July 15, 1967, at 8:45 a.m., she returned to the Hotel Rex, accompanied by her son-in-law, Luis 5 piaz, and her daughter At this time she sent Diaz 5 for her luggage and checked out of the hotel. Diaz 5 and his wife did not converse with anyone else at the 5 hotel and were of the impression she was visiting with 5 hotel and were of the impression she was visiting with 5 friends in connection with the activities of the Second National Front of the Escambray (SNFE), an anti-Fidel Castro organization.

MEET WITH CARLOS MORALES QUEVEDO, FIRST SECRETARY OF THE CUBAN MISSION TO THE UNITED NATIONS (CMUN), NEW YORK CITY

On July 15, 1967, immediately after checking Sout of the Hotel Rex, she inquired of the desk clerk for any messages, who indicated there had been many calls for "Senora Moreno". The desk clerk also pointed to a man show who was waiting in a salon off the lobby of the hotel,

who had been waiting to see Moreno. She made inquiry of the unidentified Latin male who was looking for Justina, 5 and he said that Julia" had gone. They conversed briefly and he invited her to sit down where they could talk.

Numerous photographs, including personnel (assigned to the Cuban Mission to the United Nations (CMUN), were exhibited to Moreno. She identified the photograph of Carlos Morales Quevedo, First Secretary, as the unidentified Latin male. Moreno indicated Morales (S) did not furnish his name to her but stated he was "Julia's" (S) husband. He related he was a diplomat assigned to the CMUN.

Morales suggested they go to her room at the S. Hotel Rex, but she declined and then he agreed to talk to her in the salon. He indicated she did not need to S. Worry about having registered at the hotel under her true so name, because there would be no record of her registration sat this hotel, indicating Morales has excellent contacts of at this hotel.

Morales was interested in CIA infiltration in Cuba; actually what transpired when Moreno talked with the American Consul in Madrid, Spain (1963); Arturo Scatro, also known as "Pelon", who works as an interviewer for CIA; Aldo Vera Scrafin: Andres Nazario Sargen; Viewer for CIA; Aldo Vera Scrafin: Andres Nazario Sargen; Armando Fleites Gesar Diosdado; Orlando Carballo; Grand Lodge of the Masonic Order in Exile; RECE and ENRIQUE LLABRE SThese are the things which he asked her about the individuals and organizations merely to test her reaction individuals and organizations merely to test her reaction and knowledge. However, all conversation was limited and each matter discussed very briefly.

Morales asked Moreno if she had an automobile, and she said she had a Dodge automobile. He then asked she whose blue Malibu Chevrolet she had been driving recently. She indicated this car belonged to Jose Rodriguez, a she friend. She said he also knew she had been keeping she company with a fat man with glasses, whom she described as

JOSE RODRIGUEZ. MORALES was interested in JOSE (S) RODRIGUEZ political sympathy and she informed him (RODRIGUEZ was a very good friend of hers from Cuba (S) who was in sympathy with FIDEL CASTRO's government of Cuba (S)

Concerning (ARTURO CASTRO, who MORALES indicated worked for the United States Government, possibly CIA she understood he was in contact with (PEDRO ORAMAS PEREZ. ORAMAS) an old guard communist and (member of G-2) in (S) Havana, is still a communist and pro-CASTRO, and in contact with (ARTURO CASTRO. CASTRO, according to (MORENO,) is unaware of (ORAMAS) true political sympathy and regularly furnishes reports to him. (She related (ARTURO CASTRO) sends reports to (ORAMAS) concerning anti-CASTRO (S) infiltration movements in Cuba in the belief (ORAMAS) would be of assistance in these movements. (She said she (S) had been accused by (ARTURO CASTRO and JORGE LUIS CUERVO) (S) calvo, Grand Master of the Masonic Lodge in Cuba, of being a pro-CASTRO communist. (S)

MORALES furnished MORENO with the July 25, 1967 S issue of Look" magazine, which he said contained two swhite carbons to be used for writing secret messages S He also furnished her with the gold key chain containing small brown leather fob with the name plate "Colima", S indicating inside the leather was a microfilm message for S code to be used in connection with her CIS recruitment. S He also furnished her instructions on methods to communicate with the CIS, both in Cuba and locally. (S)

The following accommodation addresses were furnished to her, and she was instructed to send letters when time permitted, otherwise, she could send a cable (S)

She stated MORALES indicated he would like to meet (S) to proceed to Loew's Capitol Theatre, Broadway and 51st Street, (S) New York City, and enter the salon to the right of the main (S) lobby as you enter the theatre. In this connection, he salon furnished her five \$20 bills totaling \$100 to cover her (S) expenses and plane fare to New York. He indicated at that time he would possibly furnish her with material necessary (S) He also indicated she should not become affiliated or active in any anti-CASTRO organization at this time. (She should (S) remain friends with individuals in all of these organizations, (S)

MORALES also indicated he would like for her to possibly secome a contact with communists from Latin American second countries. Radio Havana Cuba is a shortwave radio station operating 24 hours a day, propagandizing the FIDEL CASTRO communist government of Cuba, and is completely anti-United States.

Subject stated that during her conversation with SMORALES, she had mentioned that ENRIQUE/LIABRE was possibly one of those individuals in Miami who had accused her of SMORALES and infiltrater for the CASTRO government of Cuba When she mentioned the name LIABRE, MORALES identified him CSMOROW (The Moor - dark one) & Approx 99

MORENO described ENRIQUE LLABRE as a man S approximately 50 years of age, anti-communist, who worked for ARTURO CASTRO, also known as "Pelon," in covert inter-S view work for CIA.

SCHEDULED MEETING SEPTEMBER 2, 1967 (S)

She recalled that on one occasion in the SOKAMAS much as said that this was occurring, stating that a great deal of good information was obtained from CASTRO in Cuba.

MORENO noted that MORALES had not indicated any surprise when she mentioned to him that she had been saccused as a Government of Cuba infiltrater by CASTRO. This to her was an indication that the Cuban Government of had received information relative to accusations made against her in Miami. In this regard and relative to the sinformation apparently in possession of MORALES regarding sher personal life in Miami, she conjectured that some of this information might have had its origin with CARLOS straightfully, furnishing it to PELO. She advised that EGUILUZ occasionally visited her home in the past and was somewhat familiar with her habits (%)

She said she knew EGUILUZ to be anti-CASTRO and had known him in Cuba as connected with the SFNE (Second National Front of the Escambray) when she had begun operating (with) this movement after the Playa Giron She figured that STEGUILUZ being anti-CASTRO and suspicious of her might have passed on his suspicions to ARTURO CASTRO (S)

Subject also during 1966 recalled that on one visit to the home of EGUILUZ by her she surprised him in the company of a tall, blond, Spanish-speaking man. She condition of the presence of this individual, who apparently knew her identity, and did not further explain his presence. Contact with various sources and informants familiar with both pro and anti-FIDEL CASTRO activities in Cuba and the United States in 1967 failed to reflect the subject was engaged in any Cuban political or revolutionary activities.
