Synopsis: on 7/12/67, another governmental agency which conducts intelligence investigations, informed that during September, 1962, (subject) was approached by the Cuban Intelligence Service (CIS) in Cuba and offered the opportunity of taking an "espionage course" however (S) (she claimed asylum) in the Uruguayan Embassy in Havana (S) before any follow-up was made by CIS. (She subsequently) (S) came to the United States. The above agency advised that during May, 1967, (she) received a letter from a CIS agent (S) suggesting a meeting in New York. Thereafter, (subject) (S) voluntarily advised the FBI that while in New York during July, 1967, (she) was recruited by CIS to work for them, (S) in Miami. (She) furnished detailed information concerning (S) (her contact, targets, objectives, paraphernalia, instructions and communications). Sources and informants not aware of any (specific activities engaged in by subject) while in (S) Miami. (S)

DETAILS:

On July 12, 1967, another United States Government Agency (which conducts intelligence investigations) (S) advised that in September, 1962, (Justina Mireya Moreno Gonzalez) (S) had been approached by the Cuban (S) Intelligence (S)

[Intelligence Service (CIS)] in Cuba and offered the (S)  
opportunity of [taking an "espionage course"] prior to (S)  
being sent abroad. [She] accepted this offer; however (S)  
[claimed asylum in the Uruguayan Embassy, Havana, Cuba, (S)  
on December 9, 1962, prior to any follow-up from the (S)  
CIS. After being denied entry into the United States (S)  
[she] went to [Spain] and subsequently arrived in the United (S)  
States on [December 19, 1964.] (S)

[Subject] was in contact [with ~~PEDRO ORAMAS PEREZ~~, (S)  
a Cuban intelligence agent assigned] to penetration of (S)  
[anti-government groups] in Cuba. On May 11, 1967, [she] (S)  
received a letter from ORAMAS, which accompanied a (S)  
letter [of instructions] presumably from [the CIS. This (S)  
letter was addressed to [Mrs. Mireya Moreno, 319 South- (S)  
west 13th Avenue, Miami, Florida. The addressee was  
listed as [Cecilio Fernandez, 84-29 153rd Avenue, HwdB, (S)  
Queens, New York, and the letter was postmarked May 9,  
1967, Flushing, New York. This letter requested [the] (S)  
[subject] to work for the CIS in the United States, with (S)  
suggestions for [a meeting in] New York or Canada. (S)

[Subject] took no action concerning this letter. (S)

On July 6, 1967, [the subject received a tele- (S)  
phone call] from a Cuban [female] who identified herself (S)  
as "Julia" [She alleged she] was a cousin of ORAMAS (S)  
and was calling from New York City. ["Julia"] told [the (S)  
subject] that in accordance with a message from ORAMAS (S)  
[she, Moreno,] should go to New York City on [July 14, 1967, (S)  
and register at [the Hotel Rex,] where ["Julia"] would meet (S)  
[her.] (S)

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On July 19 and July 21, 1967, [Mireya Moreno, (S)]  
319 Southwest 13th Avenue, Miami, Florida, voluntarily  
furnished the following information to representatives  
of the Federal Bureau of Investigation: (X)(S)

On July 19, 1967, [she] returned from New York (S)  
City at 1:30 a.m., having departed Miami for New York  
via Eastern Airlines on [July 14,] 1967. [She] immediately (S)  
proceeded to [the Hotel Rex,] located on [47th] Street, (S)  
between [Broadway and the Avenue of the Americas,] New (S)  
York City. After registering at [the Hotel Rex] under (S)  
the name of [Justina Mireya Moreno, 319 Southwest 13th] (S)  
Avenue, Miami, Florida, and placing [her] luggage in Room (S)  
323, [she] took a taxicab to [her daughter's] residence in (S)  
Union City, New Jersey, [Magda Juri de Dias, 2211 Central] (S)  
Avenue, [Apartment 1,] Union City. [She] paid the bellhop (S)  
two dollars to inform any inquirers [she] would return (S)  
early the following morning. (X)(S)

On [July 15,] 1967, at 8:45 a.m., [she] returned (S)  
to [the Hotel Rex,] accompanied by [her son-in-law, Luis] (S)  
Diaz, and her daughter. At this time [she sent Diaz] (S)  
for [her] luggage and checked out of the hotel. [Diaz] (S)  
and his wife did not converse with anyone else at the (S)  
hotel and were of the impression [she] was visiting with (S)  
friends in connection with the activities of the Second  
National Front of the Escambray (SNFE), an anti-Fidel  
Castro organization. (X)(S)

MEET WITH CARLOS MORALES QUEVEDO,  
FIRST SECRETARY OF THE CUBAN  
MISSION TO THE UNITED NATIONS  
(CMUN), NEW YORK CITY (S)

On [July 15,] 1967, immediately after checking (S)  
out of [the Hotel Rex,] [she] inquired of the desk clerk for (S)  
any messages, who indicated there had been many calls for  
"Senora Moreno". The desk clerk also pointed to a man (S)  
who was waiting in a salon off the lobby of the hotel, (X)(S)

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who had been waiting to see Moreno. She made inquiry of the unidentified Latin male who was looking for Justina and he said that "Julia" had gone. They conversed briefly and he invited her to sit down where they could talk. (S)

Numerous photographs, including personnel assigned to the Cuban Mission to the United Nations (CMUN), were exhibited to Moreno. She identified the photograph of Carlos Morales Quevedo, First Secretary, as the unidentified Latin male. Moreno indicated Morales did not furnish his name to her, but stated he was "Julia's" husband. He related he was a diplomat assigned to the CMUN. (S) N.Y. CANADA

(Morales) suggested they go to (her room) at the Hotel Rex, but she declined and then he agreed to talk to her in the salon. He indicated she did not need to worry about having registered at the hotel under (her) true name, because there would be no record of (her) registration at this hotel, indicating (Morales) has excellent contacts at this hotel. (S)

(Morales) was interested in CIA infiltration in Cuba; actually what transpired when (Moreno) talked with the American Consul in Madrid, Spain (1963); Arturo Castro, also known as "Pelon", who works as an inter-viewer for CIA; Aldo Vera Serafin; Andres Nazario Sargen; Armando Fleites; Cesar Diosdado; Orlando Carballo; Grand Lodge of the Masonic Order in Exile; RECE, and ENRIQUE LLABRE. (S) These are the things which he asked (her) about. (S) N.Y. It is noted (Morales) briefly mentioned the aforementioned individuals and organizations merely to test (her) reaction and knowledge. However, all conversation was limited and each matter discussed very briefly. (S)

(Morales) asked Moreno if she had an automobile, and she said she had a Dodge automobile. He then asked whose blue Malibu Chevrolet she had been driving recently. She indicated this car belonged to Jose Rodriguez, a friend. She said he also knew she had been keeping company with a fat man with glasses, whom she described as (S) Cuba. I.A.

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(JOSE RODRIGUEZ. MORALES) was interested in (JOSE (S) RODRIGUEZ) political sympathy and (she) informed him (S) (RODRIGUEZ) was a very good friend (of hers from Cuba (S) who was in sympathy with FIDEL CASTRO's government of Cuba. (S)

Concerning (ARTURO CASTRO, who MORALES) indicated (S) worked for (the United States Government, possibly CIA (S) (she) understood he was in contact with (PEDRO ORAMAS PEREZ. (S) (ORAMAS, an old guard communist and (member of G-2 in (S) Havana, is still a communist and pro-CASTRO, and in contact with (ARTURO CASTRO. CASTRO, according to (MORENO, (S) is unaware of (ORAMAS' true political sympathy and regularly furnishes reports to him. (She) related (ARTURO (S) CASTRO) sends reports to (ORAMAS) concerning anti-CASTRO (S) infiltration movements in Cuba in the belief (ORAMAS) (S) would be of assistance in these movements. (She said she (S) had been accused by (ARTURO CASTRO and JORGE LUIS CUERVO (S) CALVO, Grand Master of the Masonic Lodge in Cuba, of being a pro-CASTRO communist. (S)

(MORALES) furnished (MORENO) with the July 25, 1967 (S) issue of "Look" magazine, which he said contained (two (S) white carbons) to be used for (writing secret) messages (S) He also furnished (her) with the gold key chain containing (S) small brown leather fob with the (name plate "Colima", (S) indicating inside the (leather) was a (microfilm message for (S) code) to be used in connection with (her CIS recruitment) (S) He also furnished (her) instructions on methods to communicate with the CIS, both in Cuba and locally. (S)

The following accommodation addresses were furnished to (her, and she) was instructed to send letters (S) when time permitted, otherwise, (she could) send a cable. (S)

(CARIDAD MESA MORALES, Calle 13, #1149 (S) second floor, between 16th and 18th, (S) Vedado, Havana, Cuba

(JOSE IGNACIO ROVIRA GONZALEZ, (S) Calle 21, #1360, Apartment 1, (S) between 24th and 26th (S) Vedado, Havana, Cuba



(X)(S)

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(She was instructed) to send letters to these (S) accommodation addresses concerning (sabotage) proposed (S) attempts on the lives of FIDEL CASTRO and other officials of the Government of Cuba, information concerning (plans, (S) CIA personnel, and (houses and arms caches in Latin America. (S) She should send a cable to the aforementioned accommodation (S) addresses concerning (attacks and landings in Cuba or any (S) other instance where time was of the essence. (She was to utilize the word "saludos," meaning an (infiltration is to take place, and "recuerdos" to indicate (an attack. The (S) instructions reflect the day "X + 2 = 31 and 31 is equal (S) to one." She does not completely understand the meaning of this. (S)

Communications - [Code] (S)

The following (names) were to be used in the cable (S) to indicate the following (locations in Cuba: (S)

"JUANA" is Pinar del Rio.

"MAITA" is Havana.

"GLADYS" is Matanzas.

"MAIRA" is Las Villas. (S)

"ROSA" is Camaguey.

"ANA" is Oriente.

"JORGE" or "JOSEFA" designates the (north coast. (S)

"HUGO" or "TERESA" designates the (south coast. (S)

For example, ("Jorge se operara dia 18, saludos Juana" (Jorge is being operated on the 18th, greetings, Juana). (S)

[Code for Cables] (S)

For urgent information which cannot be waited for through (established channels), a rapid type of communication (S)

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such as cables is necessary. For this reason, we shall establish a code which is explained below. (S)

(1) to indicate the type of action you should use in the text of the cable words based on the following code. (S)

saludos (greetings) - infiltrations (S)  
recuerdos (regards) - attack

(2) This is sufficient to indicate the type of action. To indicate the day on which the action will take place, you should indicate in the text of the cable a day. When you subtract two days from this day you will have the day on which the action is to take place. (S)

Example: 
$$\begin{array}{r} \text{day of the action -} \\ \text{days which you will add -} \\ \text{day you will indicate} \\ \text{in cable} \end{array} \begin{array}{r} 15 \\ 2 \\ \hline 17 \end{array} (S)$$

If, when you add two days to the date of the action, the result is a number of days greater than the number of days existing in a given month (S)

Example: a month which has 30 days (S)

(S) 
$$\begin{array}{r} \text{day of action -} \\ \text{days which you add -} \\ \text{sum total} \end{array} \begin{array}{r} 30 \\ 2 \\ \hline 32 \end{array} (S)$$

Thus you have a sum total of - (S) 
$$\begin{array}{r} 32 \\ \text{Plus number of days in the month -} \\ \text{Result -} \end{array} \begin{array}{r} 30 \\ \hline 2 \end{array} (S)$$

The result will be the day which you indicate in the cable (S)

To indicate the area we will use the following system: (S)

Juana - Pinar Del Rio  
Marta - Habana  
Gladys - Matanzas  
Maira - Las Villas  
Rosa - Camaguey  
Ana - Oriente

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In order to specify whether it is the (north coast) or the (south coast), you will begin the cable with either of two names:

(Jorge or Josefa - North Coast  
Hugo or Teresa - South Coast)

Example of complete cable:

(Jorge will be operated upon the 18th.  
saludos (greetings) Juana)

For us, the text of the above cable will mean:

There will be an infiltration of the (north coast),  
on the (16th), at (Pinar del Rio).

(Communications Drop)

(S) (X) MORENO was instructed to obtain (a locker in Grand Central Station, New York City, at 3:00 P.M., then proceed to the northeast corner of (2nd Avenue and 75th Street, Manhattan, New York City, where (she would) place (a cross on the lamppost with red lipstick. At 3:30 (she was instructed to place the (Grand Central locker key) in a (Chesterfield package of cigarettes, crumpled up as trash, to be thrown in the (air conditioning unit of JOSE F. HELU, 241 Central Parkway, New York City. (She) was also instructed to use the same procedure at night; obtain (a locked in Grand Central Station) at 7:00 P.M., (leave the suitcase, etc., in the (locker, mark the same (post) between 8:00 P.M. and 8:30 P.M. and thereafter deposit (the key) in the same (air conditioning unit. (X) (S)

(S) (X) Communications - Instructions  
for (Invisible Writing)

(S) (X) (MORALES) furnished (her) with (typewritten instructions (in Spanish) on small (paper, 3 x 4 1/2")

"INSTRUCTION FOR (INVISIBLE WRITING)

"The (two sheets of paper) which we are sending you have been (chemically treated) in order to be

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"used as 'carbons' in the preparation of your invisible message. We call them 'carbons' because their function is similar to that of the ordinary 'carbon.' In order to write the following materials are necessary:

- "1) an air mail envelope
- "2) two sheets of white 'bond' paper or air mail 'onion skin'
- "3) a ballpoint pen with a medium point and a No. 2 or HB type of pencil.

"Instructions for writing the invisible message:

- (S)
- "A) You must always write on a table with a glass or Formica top.
  - "B) Take a sheet of white paper and place it on the glass-top or Formica-top table, and with a clean handkerchief between your fingers, go over the paper from top to bottom and from side to side, in other words, in all directions. Doing this gently, clean the paper on both sides.
  - "C) On this sheet of paper, place one of the 'carbons' which we are sending you, and on top of the carbon, place a blank sheet of paper. You should mark the paper so that the writing does not come on the folds of the message. We repeat: On top of the glass-top or Formica-top table goes the sheet of paper which we wipe off with the handkerchief; on top of this goes the 'carbon' and on top of the 'carbon' goes the blank sheet of paper on which you have indicated the folds in order to prevent the writing from coming in those areas. You must turn all three sheets in such a way as

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"to permit you to write lengthwise on the blank sheet on top, and not from side to side as we usually do.

"D) Take the (No. 2 pencil), which should not be very (sharp) (or else a ballpoint pen) which does not (scratch) when you are (writing) and start (writing the message) you wish (to send), leaving a (margin) of (two centimeters) on all (sides). Always use (printed letters 1/2 centimeter) high and leave a (space of 2 or 3 millimeters) between (the lines). Do not use (periods, commas or quotation marks). Instead of a (period), use an X; for a (comma), use the word 'comma'; for (quotation marks), use two small (x's (xx)). When you use (num- bers or figures), write them out first and then put the (numbers in parentheses). The (name of a person, place or town) should be (repeated), using the (words 'I repeat', and when the (message) is finished add the (word 'end') filling out the line you are (writing). The (word message) should be (abbreviated) 'msje'. Also (abbreviate any word concerning which you think there would be no doubt; for example, (ud. for 'usted' (you), hno. for 'hermano' (brother), msje. for (mensaje (message), etc.

"After you have completed the (message), do the following immediately: (S)

"A) Remove the ('carbon') and place it between two clean sheets of paper, and place it in a (safe, dry hiding place), so that it can be (used 20 more times) in the future. Try not to (scratch it) much and (touch it) with your hands as little as possible.

\* The original (Spanish) uses one (word) (S)  
"repito" which is (translated "I repeat.") (S)

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"B) The page used for writing the message should be burned immediately. (S)

"C) With a ballpoint pen or with pen and ink, on the page which contains the invisible message, write a friendly letter on the same side on which the letter is written. The letter must contain the date and fill one side of the page (at least), although it can be written on both sides of the paper. The contents of this letter should be friendly and not political. It can be to a relative, friend, or about studies. The address of the sender and addressee should be written before placing the invisible message in the envelope. (S)

"Note: We wish to stress the following: the pressure used in writing the invisible message is very important. It must not be too heavy or too light. Write a bit more lightly than you normally do. When the 'carbon' has been used for several messages, the pressure should be increased somewhat, since the more it is used, the more lightly it comes up when developed." (S)

(She stated MORALES indicated he would like to meet with her on September 2, 1967, at 3:00 P.M. She was instructed to proceed to Loew's Capitol Theatre, Broadway and 51st Street, New York City, and enter the salon to the right of the main lobby as you enter the theatre. In this connection, he furnished her five \$20 bills totaling \$100 to cover her expenses and plane fare to New York. He indicated at that time he would possibly furnish her with material necessary to set up a radio transmitter and receiver plant in Miami. He also indicated she should not become affiliated or active in any anti-CASTRO organization at this time. She should remain friends with individuals in all of these organizations. (S)

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It was suggested (she) should listen to Radio Havana Cuba and (S) since (she) did not have a shortwave receiving set, (she) should (S) listen to the local radio stations in Havana, (including CMU, (S) MORALES) also indicated he would like (for her) to possibly (S) become a contact with communists from Latin American (S) countries. (She) believed he meant by this a person (friendly (S) with the CASIRO communist government of Cuba who might render (S) certain favors to visiting (communists) passing through Miami. (S)

Radio Havana Cuba is a shortwave radio station operating 24 hours a day, propagandizing the FIDEL CASTRO communist government of Cuba, and is completely anti-United States.

He explained (the subject) could be of considerable (S) use and value (to the CIS) in the United States (on a long-range (S) program. (S)

(S)  
On August 2, 1967, (subject) advised a representative (S) of the FBI (that she) recalled the following additional infor- (S) mation concerning (her meet with CARLOS MORALES QUEVEDO, (S) First Secretary of the CMUN, New York City, on July 15, 1967: (S)

(Re RIGOBERTO GONZALEZ) (S)

(MORALES) after referring to a slip of paper in his (S) pocket, asked (her) if she knew (RIGOBERTO GONZALEZ, who had (S) left Cuba within the past six months. He asked (her) to (S) attempt to find out if (GONZALEZ) was working for the Central (S) Intelligence Agency (CIA). He was interested in knowing (S) (GONZALEZ) whereabouts and activities. (She) was told that (S) any information (she) developed concerning (GONZALEZ) should (S) be furnished (to the CIS) by cable. MORENO did not recall (S) (MORALES) having furnished any further identification of (S) (GONZALEZ) (She) noted (MORALES) interest in (GONZALEZ) seemed (S) more definite than in (the other individuals) he had men- (S) tioned as set forth above. (She) related that as of August 2, (S) 1967, (she) had been unable to ascertain any information con- (S) cerning (GONZALEZ) however, felt that (MORALES) might have been (S) expecting some (communication) in this regard. (S)

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Re JUAN PEREZ RIVAS

(MORALES) made inquiry concerning ("PACO" (FRANCISCO) PEREZ RIVAS, stating that he understood this individual was working on a CIA boat traveling from the United States to Latin America. (She) corrected (MORALES), advising him that it could not be ("PACO") because he, ("PACO" PEREZ RIVAS, was in Venezuela. In reply, (MORALES) said then it must be one of his brothers. (She) informed (MORALES) that (JUAN PEREZ RIVAS) was located in Miami. (MORALES) expressed interest in knowing whether or not (PEREZ) was working on a boat going to Latin America and if he was, to what countries the boat might be traveling, whether to (Panama, Colombia) or other countries.

(The subject) advised (she) was acquainted with (JUAN PEREZ RIVAS) and knew that he was the (captain of a merchant ship) located in Miami but (she) did know the name of the (company). (She) did not believe (PEREZ RIVAS) was working for the CIA. He resided near the corner of (Northwest 19th Terrace and 17th Avenue) when not aboard ship.

Re ENRIQUE LLABRE

(Subject) stated that during (her) conversation with (MORALES), (she) had mentioned that (ENRIQUE LLABRE) was possibly one of those individuals in Miami who had accused (her) of being an infiltrator for the (CASTRO) government of Cuba. When (she) mentioned the name (LLABRE), (MORALES) identified him as "EL MORO" (The Moor - dark one).

(MORENO) described (ENRIQUE LLABRE) as a man approximately (50) years of age, anti-communist, who worked for (ARTURO CASTRO), also known as ("Pelon," in covert interview work for CIA.

(SCHEDULED MEETING SEPTEMBER 2, 1967)

(MORENO) recalled that relative to (her) scheduled meeting with (MORALES) in New York City on (September 2, 1967), (MORALES) told her they could converse without any problems in a section of the (lobby) of the (Loew's Capitol Theatre). To allay (her) fears, he said this could be reserved and therefore they would not be disturbed.

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(MORENO) said that with reference to (her) previous information indicating (ARTURO CASTRO) was working for the CIA and mistakenly trusting and furnishing information to (PEDRO ORAMAS PEREZ), (she) was sure (CASTRO) was working as an inter-viewer (covert) for the CIA. (She) said (CASTRO) had faith in (ORAMAS) in the past in Cuba when (ORAMAS) was suspected of being an infiltrator for the Department of State Security (DSE) in anti-CASTRO movements, and would not pay heed to (her) beliefs in this regard. (She) said (ARTURO CASTRO) still had trust in (ORAMAS). (She) believed (CASTRO) passed on information to (ORAMAS) in Cuba relative to possible anti-CASTRO movements there. (She) recalled that on one occasion in the past, (ENRIQUE LLABRE), during a conversation (with her), had as much as said that this was occurring, stating that a great deal of good information was obtained from (CASTRO) in Cuba. (S)

(MORENO) noted that (MORALES) had not indicated any surprise when (she) mentioned to him that (she) had been accused as a Government of Cuba infiltrator by CASTRO. This to (her) was an indication that the Cuban Government had received information relative to accusations made against (her) in Miami. In this regard and relative to the information apparently in possession of (MORALES) regarding (her) personal life in Miami, (she) conjectured that some of this information might have had its origin with (CARLOS EGUILUZ), furnishing it to (PELO). (She) advised that (EGUILUZ) occasionally visited (her) home in the past and was somewhat familiar with (her) habits. (S)

(She) said (she) knew (EGUILUZ) to be anti-CASTRO and had known him in Cuba as connected with the SFNE (Second National Front of the Escambray) when (she) had begun operating with this movement after the Playa Giron. (She) figured that (EGUILUZ) being anti-CASTRO and suspicious of (her), might have passed on his suspicions to (ARTURO CASTRO). (S)

(Subject) also during 1966 recalled that on one visit to the home of (EGUILUZ) by her she surprised him in the company of a tall, blond, Spanish-speaking man. (She) said that (EGUILUZ) lightly passed off the presence of this individual, who apparently knew (her) identity, and did not further explain his presence. (Subject) was led to believe from this occurrence that the stranger was from CIA and that (EGUILUZ) is possibly a CIA contact. (S)

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## COMMUNICATIONS (DROP)

(Subject) recalled that on July 18, 1967, per (S) the instructions of (CARLOS MORALES QUEVEDO), she went to (S) the Grand Central Station, where at approximately 3:00 P.M. (S) she obtained (locker #9048) in which (she placed) a brief (S) resume of (her activities) in Cuba for the information of (S) (MORALES). This locker was obtained (by her in a regular) (S) manner and was not (a number) designated by (MORALES), nor was (S) he present at the time. (She) then proceeded to the north-east corner of (Second Avenue and 75th Street), Manhattan, (S) New York City, where (she) made (a cross or an "X" on the lamp- (S) post with her lipstick. Afterwards informant proceeded to (241 Central Parkway, New York City, the office of (JOSE F. (S) HELU), where at approximately 3:30 P.M. (she) discarded, as (S) if trash, in (the air conditioning unit) at this (address), a (S) crumpled (Chesterfield cigarette pack) in which (she) had put (S) (the key) to the above-mentioned (locker) (S)

(She) returned the evening of July 18, 1967, from (S) New York to Miami, arriving in Miami in the early hours of July 19, 1967. (She) has no knowledge as to whether or not (S) the resume was recovered by (MORALES) as she has not been (S) contacted by or in communication with him since (her meeting) (S)

## RE RIGOBERTO GONZALEZ

(MORENO) originally stated that (CARLOS MORALES) had (S) specifically expressed an interest in (RIGOBERTO GONZALEZ). (S) However, (she) did not have any further identification of him. (S) (She) was reminded the (name (RIGOBERTO DELGADO) had appeared in (S) her letter to PEDRO ORAMAS. After this (she) recalled that (S) the name was (DELGADO) and not (GONZALEZ) and that (she) had been (S) mistaken because of faulty memory from the time of (her) (S) writing this letter and the interviews by representatives of the FBI. (She) further stated that (she) herself, knew (S) nothing about (DELGADO). (S)

Investigation at New York City revealed that (S) (CARLOS MORALES QUEVEDO, First Secretary of the CHUN, New (S) York City, traveled to (Montreal, Canada), to attend (Expo 67) (S)

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MM (134-1434) (X)(S)

He was away from New York City for the period (September 1] [S]  
through (September 4,] 1967. Also, (MORENO] was reportedly ill [S]  
and apparently did not travel to New York City. Therefore,  
the (proposed meet] of (September 2,] 1967, did not occur. (S)

Contact with various sources and informants familiar with both pro and anti-FIDEL CASTRO activities in Cuba and the United States in 1967 failed to reflect the subject was engaged in any Cuban political or revolutionary activities.

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
