SPECIFIC— License Plate Solution

1. On 5 November 1957 at 1110 hours two women, driving a late model Buick, California 1958 license plate number BFW-019, entered the Soviet Embassy and remained approximately 5 minutes.

2. Attached are two copies of three photographs (1 front view of the automobile, 2 views of the women). The photographs were made from a clandestine location and if shown outside KUBARK all the background should be deleted.

3. It is requested that this plate be solved and the solution, together with available traces, be sent to this Station.

4. The information in paragraph 1 is being disseminated locally by memorandum to the ODENVY representative with a request for any information available from their local office.

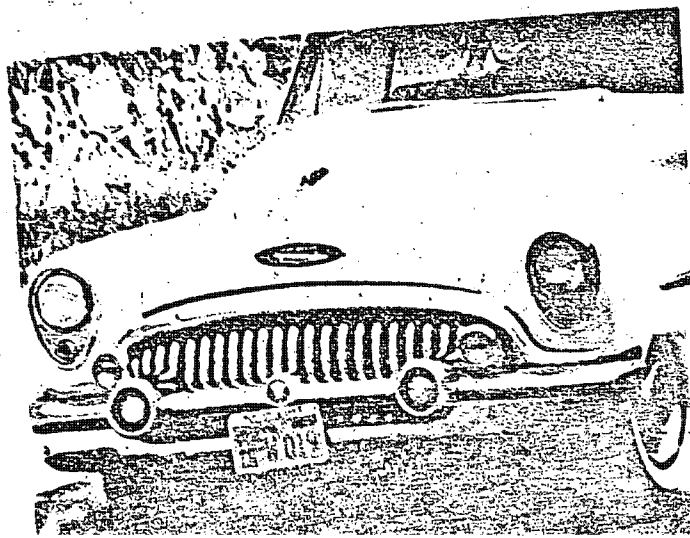
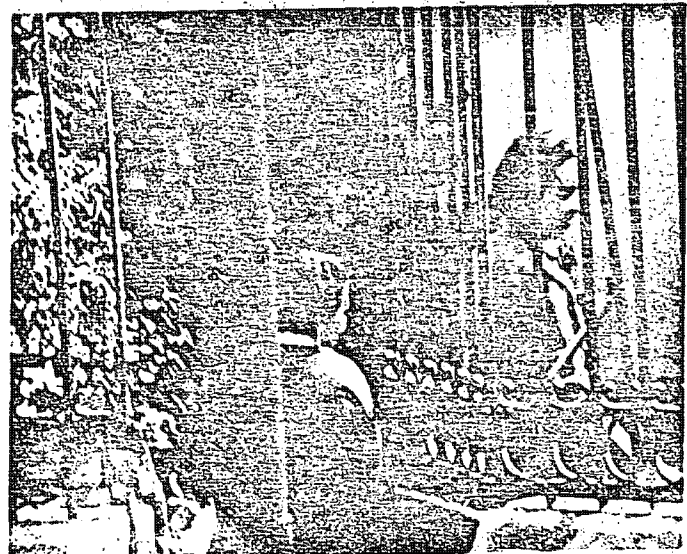
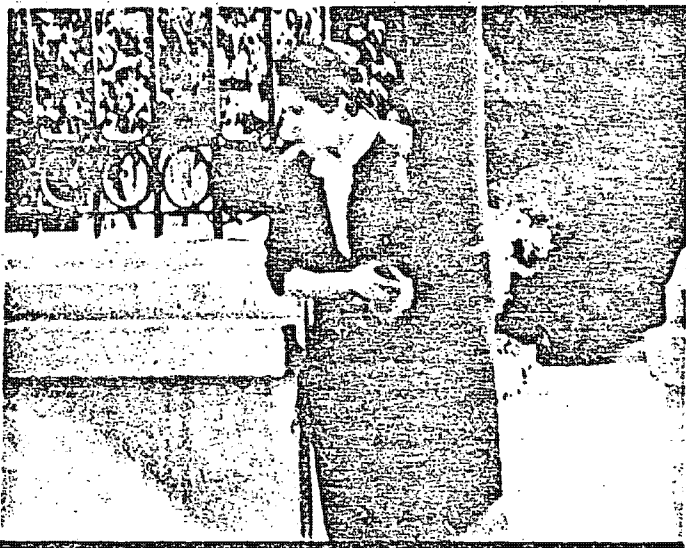

SUBJECT : Visitor to the Soviet Embassy, Mexico City

1. A sensitive, reliable source reported that on 16 May 1967 an unidentified man, circa 60 years old, thin, with gray hair and wearing glasses, visited the Soviet Embassy in Mexico City from 1300 to 1330 hours. He was driving a 1961 tan Pontiac with California license plates JED-824.

2. Investigation revealed that these plates were assigned to a 1962 Pontiac Coupe owned by Ben C. DELAO of 315 Mockingbird Lane, South Pasadena, California. The driver's license reflected that DELAO was born 29 April 1908 (age 59). He is 5 feet 11 inches tall, weighs 175 pounds, has black hair and brown eyes.

3. Files of the Retail Merchants Credit Association of Los Angeles were searched in the name of Ben C. DELAO and revealed a file which possibly might be identical with Subject showing that DELAO and his wife, Bettie, have been known to them since March 1952. His age was given as 32 in 1952 (sic), and their most recent address was given as 2209 South Vermont Avenue, Los Angeles, in 1962. Prior residence was at 4211 Union Pacific Avenue, Los Angeles, in March 1952, for 14 years. He is originally from Las Cruces, New Mexico. In August 1951 the Lockheed Aircraft Company, Burbank, California, was his employer. This was verified in March 1952. Credit was satisfactory; criminal and subversive checks were negative.

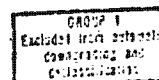

SUBJECT : Visitors to the Soviet Embassy in Mexico City



1. A sensitive, reliable source reported that on 26 April 1967 three unidentified men who appeared to be Americans were seen entering the Soviet Embassy in Mexico City. They were driving a 1967 Ford Mustang with Texas license plates C18-468. Their visit lasted about five minutes. A set of photos of the three men are provided your Bureau for identification, and this Office would appreciate being informed if any of the men in the photos is positively identified.

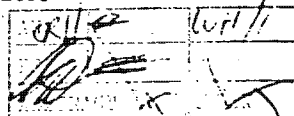
2. Further investigation revealed that these plates were assigned to a 1967 Ford two-door Mustang owned by Antonio ECHEGARAY C., Jr., of 1418 North Stanton, Apartment A, El Paso, Texas.

3. The only information available in the files of this Office are two Bureau reports on Antonio ECHEGARAY (aka ECHEGARAY, dated 28 and 30 July 1952). Our Subject is probably not identical with your Subject; however, he could be the son who reportedly traveled with ECHEGARAY and his wife in 1952 and was at that time a "young boy."

4. Your Bureau's representative in Mexico City has been provided with the information contained in paragraph one along with a set of the photos.

5. This information is made available to your Bureau with the understanding that it will receive no further dissemination without prior approval from this Office.

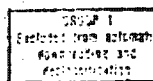

1. A reliable, sensitive source reported on 9 March 1967, that an American-looking male stopped at the Soviet Embassy in Mexico City and talked with the Soviet Consul, Valentin Sergeyevich LOGINOV. The man did not enter the Embassy. He was driving what appeared to be a late model Buick Electra, bearing Florida tags 10-W-67776.

2. Investigation revealed that these 1966 Florida tags were issued to Lester Linton and Ethel STANGER of Pompano Beach, Florida for use on a 1964 Buick sedan. *NOTE: USA*

b. Ethel McBride STANGER was born 9 November 1894 and resides with her husband in Florida. *SELF*

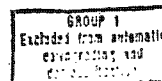

Action Required: For Your Information

1. In December 1966 Raymond H. GERRON, Principal Agent for the LIMPPY Project, was asked to prepare a security review including his opinions on the security of the LILYRIC, LINDRO and LICALA households vis-a-vis Soviet knowledge of their existence. The following paragraphs contain a slightly edited version of GERRON's report, which was received on 28 December 1966. Station comments follow GERRON's and are so indicated.

LILYRIC

2. In its present new location LILYRIC is the newest of the photo bases under my control. According to LIMPPY-1, there has been no indication of interest of any sort by the Soviets in the family's move to the new apartment nor was there in the past any show of interest or peculiar behavior on their (Soviet's) part with regard to the old base and the possibility that they might be under photo surveillance.

3. The cover for the work carried on by this base is good since the wife, LIMPPY-18, who does most of the work has no trouble in justifying her presence at home all of the time. The son, LIMPPY-27 is a medical student and attends his classes regularly and can justify his hours as study hours. (He continues to be an excellent student and was exempted from examinations at the end of this, his second year in medical school. Actually, he studies most of the night). LIMPPY-1 requires no cover as he has a full-time job as production manager for a large concern and he usually makes his meetings with GERRON on his way to or from work.

The Station also agrees that the Soviets realize that they are under photo surveillance. This was pointed out recently when a Soviet shielded an LNERO walk-in when they passed the front gate of the Embassy and made a sign to the walk-in indicating that they could be seen by someone watching with a telescope from the buildings across the street. Also, as Headquarters is aware, there have been numerous comments by residents of Mexico City to the effect that anyone entering the Soviet Embassy is photographed; however, seldom has it been rumored that the "Americans" are doing it, which might indicate most people believe the Mexican Government is doing any such photographing and thereby reaffirming GERENDS's statement that the Soviets possibly believe the Mexican Government runs the base.

7. Given the assumption that the LILYRIC base is blown, the Station at this point does not plan to terminate or revamp the LILYRIC installation. Any operational chance by the operators would be spotted by the Soviets and if the base were closed the Soviets would start looking for a new installation. The LILYRIC base is performing a useful function and it is believed that it will continue to do so. The Soviets have had opportunities to complain to the Mexican Government about being monitored photographically and have not seen fit to do so and it is believed that they probably will not do so unless there is a radical change in Soviet anti/or Mexican policy. The Station has instructed GERENDS to take every precaution during his meetings with LIBERTY-13 to assure that LIBERTY-13 does not lead the Soviets to him and thereby jeopardizing other operations, especially LICALLA.

#### LIMITED

8. The operator of the LIMITED Base, LIBERTY-6, is, to my knowledge, the oldest hand in the photo surveillance of the Soviet target and possibly the most likely to be "burned". His residence for years at the former base (now the site of the new LILYRIC building) and his move to the present base could not have gone unnoticed by the Soviets. His cover is that of an insurance salesman, but he actually does not work at the cover and is at a disadvantage in trying to explain his source of income. At times, in years past, he had to afford full-time coverage from the base, which allowed him no time to engage in credible cover activities.

9. GERENDS Comments. I do not believe that LIBERTY-6/LIMITED is a security risk; however, his present method of working from an open door leading to his balcony probably can be spotted by the Soviets. LIBERTY-6 is extremely cautious about checking himself for surveillance when making meetings.

His residence for years at the former Base (now the site of the new LIBYRIC building) and his move to the present base could not have gone unnoticed by the Soviets. His cover is that of an insurance salesman, but he actually does not work at the cover and is at a disadvantage in trying to explain his source of income. At times, in years past, he had to afford full-time coverage from the base, which allowed him no time to engage in credible cover activities.

9. GRENDE Comments. I do not believe that LIBERTY-6/LIMITED is a security risk; however, his present position working from an open door leading to his balcony probably can be spotted by the Soviets. LIBERTY-6 is extremely cautious about checking himself for surveillance when making meetings.

the LEMERICK installation and personnel. Specific examples of the LEMPTV Project's progress and contributions to the RMD will be found in Section 3 below (EFFECTIVENESS).

2. CHANGES.

A. Operational - As noted in the previous Request for Project Renewal, the former LIMITED property was sold to LEMOUSINE, who as per formal agreement with the Station, demolished the old structure and constructed a new edifice. While it was initially contemplated to place the LIMITED (LEMPTVs -6 and -7) personnel in the new building and to retain the same, equal division of workload between LILYRIC and LIMITED, it was later decided to move the present LILYRIC basehouse personnel (LEMPTVs-13, -14, -26 and -27) into the new base instead, along with the following ancillary modifications:

An increase in the hours of both the photographic and physical surveillance coverage provided from the new base by the LILYRIC operators (0900-1600 hours) during the weekdays and to have the LIMITED base provide photographic and physical surveillance coverage from 1600-1930 hours on weekdays and from 0900-1300 hours on weekends. These changes were dictated by the following considerations:

1. The new LEMOUSINE building offers a much better vantage point for both photographic and physical surveillance than does the present complex which houses the LILYRIC and LIMITED bases. Therefore, the Station felt that the personnel occupying this new base should be those possessing the highest technical skills and also those able to provide the most thorough and complete coverage. Since the LIMITED base now has only one trained operator while the LILYRIC basehouse has three, the LILYRIC group and a revision of working hours was indicated.

2. Because it was apparent that the coverage of the LEMERICK installation would be a long-range and continuing requirement, the Station desired to staff the new base with personnel of long-range potential. LEMPTV-6, now almost 60 years old, does not possess this potential; however, the LILYRIC agent complex happily combines experienced personnel with youthful agents.

3. Finally, the social and financial status of the LILYRIC personnel is much more compatible and consistent with the environment of the new building than is that of the LIMITED family.

The above-cited revised work schedule was initiated in July 1966 and the actual movement of the LILYRICs into the new base began in late September 1966.

KAPOR/REUTOP/LC IMPROVE/LICOWL-1 Progress Report

REFERENCE: HXMA - 28421, 3 March 1968

1. March to July 1968: The following items of significance occurred during this period:

a. AEQUALITY-1: LICOWL-1 (Subject) continued to report frequent meetings with AEQUALITY-1. AEQUALITY-1 sporadically would ask Subject to get him a woman, discuss houses of prostitution, ask for pornographic material, etc. But this was done with much less frequency than previously reported; AEQUALITY-1 never once permitted or followed up on a request of this nature and, in fact, nothing happened. AEQUALITY-1 continued to call Subject regularly at the latter's store (3 to 5 times a week) usually to ask for a beer or soft drink to be sent over. These calls ended abruptly on 11 June (LIENVOY) possibly in connection with AEQUALITY-1's taking over the job as Embassy Administrative Officer. During June AEQUALITY-1 told Subject several times that he was in the process of taking over the job as administrative officer at the Embassy. (COMMENT: per LILYRIC AEQUALITY-1 stopped taking gate duty and KALYGIN, the former Administrative Officer, started in). On 24 June AEQUALITY-1 told Subject that he was now "officially" the Administrative officer. On 1 July AEQUALITY-1 and his family moved into quarters inside the Embassy per Subject and LILYRIC. (COMMENT: The Administrative Officer has always lived inside the Embassy).

b. LIRUSTIC-1: In mid-June LIRUSTIC-1 moved into her new apartment near Subject's store and began to go to the store two or three times a day to pick up small items for her apartment. She was on vacation pending a new job starting on 1 July and in

the woman was telling of her new apartment which she explained to Subject. After they were dropped by the store 4 or 5 times a week in the morning or evening. During this period she became good friends with Subject and his wife. Through July LIRUSTIC-1 saw AEQUALITY-1 from a distance twice and on 8 July she literally jumped into him as he was leaving the store but no conversation ensued. LIRUSTIC-1 reported that on 27 June Subject told her that he would like to introduce her to his "friends" whom he described as great fellows. He also indicated that they were interested in meeting brunettes, "more ardent" girls in contrast to their fat, blond wives. LIRUSTIC-1 expressed disinterest. Subject later introduced her to a Soviet but without names. Subject did not report any of the above. In fact, he did not mention LIRUSTIC-1 during this period.

c. SUSVIEL: On 4 May Subject was given an EGSWIRE examination which he played with flying colors.

d. On 13 July Donald J. BARICK completed a review of Subject's case which expanded on the Station's reservations expressed in MEMA-27622, 18 November 1963 and concluded that Subject was under AUS control. BARICK's report and a microfilm of Subject's file were forwarded to Headquarters in MEMA-29914, 1 September 1966.

e. On 17 and 19 July 1966 Francis J. COIGNE accompanied Irving A. ORONSKY to meetings with Subject in preparation for taking over the case. Although COIGNE participated as an observer and LIRUSTIC-1 wasn't told until the end of the second meeting that COIGNE would take over, COIGNE was of the definite impression that Subject, although addressing himself to ORONSKY, was interested only in COIGNE and that ORONSKY had literally ceased to exist as a person for Subject. This impression was strengthened at the end of the second meeting (19 July) when ORONSKY told Subject that he would be leaving. Subject didn't react in any manner to this statement but immediately began talking to another subject. Surprised, ORONSKY asked Subject if he had understood. Subject said he had and again went off on another subject. Subject's reaction, or rather lack of reaction, was as cold and impersonal as to be positively weird. In addition, from his detached position as an observer during these two meetings, COIGNE had an instinctive, purely personal feeling that Subject was basically false. Very little has subsequently occurred which would alter that impression. On 27 July ORONSKY met Subject alone since COIGNE was sick.

2. During August and September COIGNE met Subject six times. During this short period Subject reported that AEQUALITY-1 had tried to recruit him, he invited the Soviets to his home twice (LIRUSTIC-1 was invited both times), the Station staked out these Soviet visits, the Station had Subject write special reports on AEQUALITY-1's visits to his store and instituted expanded LILVAIC/LIVITTO coverage to include Saturday mornings, and Subject volunteered certain information about Soviet contacts. From the above Subject emerged as a consistent exaggerator and conscious liar to the point that some of the information that he has previously reported on his Soviet contacts can be considered reliable. In addition, his relations with LIRUSTIC-1 as reported by her and his failure to mention her to the Station was extremely suspicious.

3. Since events moved so rapidly in August and September and were at times almost hopelessly intertwined, we will develop them here point-by-point in order to maintain logical order. In order to provide full detail the contact reports are being transmitted under separate cover.

4. Recruitment Attempt by AQUALITY-1: At the 18 August meeting Subject, after talking about some trivial subjects, said that AQUALITY-1 had attempted to recruit him on 12 August. With great difficulty in keeping him to a logical and chronological order, the following story emerged: AQUALITY-1 came to the store and said he wanted to have a serious talk with Subject. He said he wants Subject to inform on his neighbors, those whose windows faced on the Embassy. AQUALITY-1 specifically mentioned by name LIKITY-6 (who runs LIMITED) and the new tenants who would move into the new LILYRIC building which, according to AQUALITY-1, is being built by a person whose description fits LIMOUSINE. (COMMENT: LIMOUSINE owns and is building the new LILYRIC facility. Although other families in the neighborhood who are of no immediate concern were mentioned, the occupants of the old LILYRIC were not mentioned. AQUALITY-1 said he would like to come to Subject's home with an unnamed friend on Sunday, 14 August in order to discuss this further. Subject not wanting to accept this assignment without checking with the Station, agreed in principle to provide this information but put AQUALITY-1 off on the dinner until Sunday, 21 August in order to check with his Station case officer. He told AQUALITY-1 that he couldn't possibly collect any information in two days. AQUALITY-1 agreed to the 21 August date and said that he and his friend would pick Subject up at the store at 1400 (closing time) on this date and drive him to his home for dinner. Subject repeated these meeting arrangements twice. (There is no mention of LIKITY-6, LIMOUSINE or LILYRIC in Subject's notes for 13 August.) Although Subject did not say at what time AQUALITY-1 came to his shop or how long he stayed, both LIMITED and LILYRIC reported that AQUALITY-1 went out alone on foot in the direction of Subject's shop for about an hour on 12 August from ca 1325 to 1425, an unusually long period in their reporting.

5. On 16 August 1966 LILYRIC-1 reported that on 13 August (i.e. one day later) Subject and his wife invited her to attend a fiesta at their home on the afternoon of Sunday, 21 August, which was to celebrate the birth of their latest granddaughter on 2 August. (LILYRIC-1 had been through all the details of this birth with Subject's wife). They told LILYRIC-1 that some of their good Soviet friends would be present as well as some Mexican friends and family members.

6. During the 16 August meeting Subject said that the Soviets are crazy to think that anyone in the neighborhood was spying on them. He said that he knew all of the occupants of the building and was sure that they were all okay. Towards the end of the meeting he repeated the above statement but qualified it by stating that LIKITY-6 would be the only person he would not trust. Asked why, he said that LIKITY-6 didn't go out to work but stayed at home all the time. He seems to be some sort of writer since he is always typing. He added that LIKITY-6 lives very comfortably and owns a car. He finally said that he had heard a rumor about 3 months ago which he had reported to the station that LIKITY-6 works for the Americans. He could not remember how, when, where or from whom he heard this rumor. (The Station has no record of this report.)

7. Subject did not appear to be the least concerned about the prospect of serving as AQUALITY-1's informant. In fact, he appears to hope that the case officer would approve it. He had to be told in strong terms to reject the offer, express indignation etc. In discussing how to achieve this Subject said that he could invite some girls "to the fiesta . . . I mean the dinner" so that AQUALITY-1 would have no opportunity to discuss the matter.

8. LIRUSTIC-1 was instructed to attend the fiesta/dinner. We also put a staff stake-out on Subject's home which showed that Subject, his wife and two Soviets arrived at Subject's home at 1507 on 21 August in AEQUALITY-1's car and the two Soviets left at 1800. LIRUSTIC-1 was not seen.

9. On 23 August 1966 Subject reported that on 19 August AEQUALITY-1 told him that he couldn't come to the dinner on 21 August because the Soviet Ambassador was due back from leave that weekend (true) and everybody had to stand by. (COMMENT: Strange conduct for someone trying to confirm a recruitment). Also, LIRUSTIC-1 reported that on 20 August Subject had told her the same, that the Soviets couldn't come, but insisted that LIRUSTIC-1 come to the "fiesta." LIRUSTIC-1 said she would. (LIRUSTIC-1 subsequently reported that she had gone to the fiesta, hadn't seen any Soviets, and described the "fiesta" in detail. Of course, the staff stake-out had established that the Soviets had come and she hadn't. Later, confronted with her lie, she said that since Subject had told her that the Soviets couldn't come, she didn't go herself because she ran into some perfectly valid personal problems. She had lied about going because the case officer had instructed her to go.)

10. Back to Subject who reported that on 21 August as he was closing up at 1400 AEQUALITY-1 came in for a beer. Subject's wife remarked that she was sorry that he couldn't come for dinner that day. AEQUALITY-1 promptly accepted and ran back to the Embassy to get his friend who turned out to be Viktor P. STREIZHOV (201-779361), the Ambassador's chauffeur whom Subject had been recently touting as a great friend. They all then went to Subject's home in AEQUALITY-1's car. AEQUALITY-1 did not bring up the subject of Subject's recruitment during the visit. Quite to the contrary he remarked to Subject over a tequila that he had obtained permission to visit Subject's home. According to Subject AEQUALITY-1 has only made three attempts to "drive home" this recruitment:

a. On 18 August he asked if Subject had any information yet. Subject answered that he hadn't had time.

b. On 19 August while telling Subject that he couldn't come to dinner on 21 August, AEQUALITY-1 asked Subject if he had any information yet. Subject answered that he doesn't have time to collect this type of information. AEQUALITY-1 suggested that Subject could get it from the maids of families. Subject said he doesn't have time. AEQUALITY-1 did not insist and the matter was dropped.

c. On 3 September while AEQUALITY-1 was in the shop, LIRUSTY-6 came in to order something. When LIRUSTY-6 left AEQUALITY-1 asked Subject to provide information on him. Subject refused.

(COMMENT: LIRUSTY-6 was not on duty at that time.) As far as Subject is concerned the matter is now closed.

11. Subject's account of this recruitment attempt is so improbable as to suggest that it never occurred. In addition to the above Subject continues to describe AEQUALITY-1 as the typical Soviet underling. For example, AEQUALITY-1 hides in the toilet for 25 minutes when two "diplomats" come in, takes elaborate precautions to drink tequila out of cake bottles to escape detection, can't "get out" for various reasons, etc., hardly the description of a Soviet trying to recruit someone for information on LIRUSTY and LILYRIC. However, as noted below, Subject's stories of LIRUSTY-6, LILYRIC and LIRUSTY-1 are very significant and the manner in which he mentioned them highly provocative.

17. At the end of the meeting on 27 August, Subject mentioned that the Soviets would probably be coming to his home on Sunday, 11 September. The car, which had just finished repairs, was parked outside his store. Subject said that on the morning of 27 August Vladimir F. GORONITS (701-78384) came into the store. Since he is a new friend and Subject doesn't know his wife yet, Subject's wife, attempting to advance the tell a little, invited GORONITS to a fiesta on 11 September, Subject's saint's day. GORONITS almost as how he would try to come. Subject was asked if any other Soviets were invited. Not yet but he would probably invite STRILNOV. Anyone else, he was asked tearfully? Well, yes he thought that he would also invite ANQUALITY-1. Aside from the fact that LIRUSTIC had GORONITS firmly ensconced in the Embassy all morning, the manner of Subject's presentation of the above was obviously fabrication as he went along. Significantly, LIRUSTIC-1 reported that on the same day, 27 August, and at the same time that GORONITS was supposed to be there, Subject invited her to a fiesta at his home on 11 September to celebrate his saint's day and mentioned that Soviet friends could be there. Here one cannot avoid the impression that he invited LIRUSTIC-1 first and the Soviets afterwards.

18. On 9 September Subject reported that GORONITS, STRILNOV and ANQUALITY-1 had definitely accepted for 11 September with two more probabilities. Since Subject had not mentioned other guests (in the past he has always said that he provided Mexican girls), at the end of the meeting he was asked if he weren't inviting Mexicans in accordance with his custom. He answered that except for the immediate family they were only inviting one girl, a friend of his wife's, LIRUSTIC-1. Here followed a description of LIRUSTIC-1: a nice girl living somewhere in the neighborhood, works in an office somewhere, he and his wife have known her about a month, etc., all perfectly casual and innocent. He also mentioned that he had invited her to his last fiesta (21 August) which he has always stoutly maintained was a dinner only for ANQUALITY-1 and STRILNOV, but that she did not come due to heavy rains. This was the first time that he had mentioned LIRUSTIC-1 who had been visiting his shop since mid-June, whom he had invited on 21 August and whom, according to her, he had attempted to interest in his Soviet friends, urged to wait till in the store and had, in fact, introduced to one or two informally in the store.

19. At the next meeting on 21 September Subject started off with an account of a current triviality. He had to be brought around to an account of the 11 September fiesta. However, once prompted, he gave a vivid account of how ANQUALITY-1, STRILNOV and GORONITS had picked him up at his shop at closing time bearing gifts of vodka and wine, then drove to his home where ANQUALITY-1's car which was parked outside, eating, much drinking, ANQUALITY-1 so drunk he couldn't drive home, etc. He accepted 75 pesos for the food and drink he had served the Soviets.

20. LIRUSTIC-1 reported that she arrived at Subject's store on 11 September at 1435 to find Subject with a bottle of vodka, a bottle of wine but no Soviets. Subject told her that the Soviets had given last minute apologies since something unexpected had come up. Since dinner was already prepared, Subject invited his next door neighbor (at the shop) and his wife who drove them all to Subject's home in their car. A mere limited staff take-over of Subject's home during the time of the fiesta demonstrated that there were no Soviet cars anywhere in the neighborhood but that the car catch LIRUSTIC-1

described (as usual) the subject was located in front of Subject's house. This story is so questionable that LITVICH-1 told the truth and was arrested.

16. Since the Station had been doubting Subject's reporting on the frequency of AQUALITY-1's visits to his shop, Subject in August was instructed to maintain a secret and exact log of AQUALITY-1's visits. The reason given was to study AQUALITY-1's movement patterns. Subject started this log on 1 September. Concurrently the Station extended LIMITED/LITVICH coverage to include Alexander Bernays since Subject has been consistently reporting that AQUALITY-1 comes in regularly about 1100 on Saturdays to eat chicharron. (LITVICH-1 has been reporting that he has gone to the store at this time on Saturdays and has been giving negative reports for the same times that Subject has been reporting AQUALITY-1 spending considerable time eating chicharron and drinking tequila or beer.) Therein Subject continued to report that AQUALITY-1 came in every Saturday morning, but LIMITED and LITVICH agreed that he had been leaving the Embassy between 1000 and 1030 in his car and hadn't returned by 1400 when surveillance had been secured. During the week Subject reported AQUALITY visited him on an average of three times a day from ten minutes to an hour each time. LIMITED/LITVICH reported an average of three visits a week, usually from three to five minutes each. Time and time again LIMITED/LITVICH has and AQUALITY-1 to the Embassy or out in a car when Subject has had him in the store. This led to checks of other reports, especially when he has reported two or three Soviets in the store for an extended period. These checks were made during periods when LITVICH and LIMITED were on duty. In every case LIMITED/LITVICH had two or three Soviets in positions that it would make it impossible for them to be together or in Subject's store anywhere near the time reported by Subject. The inescapable, documented conclusion is that Subject has been regularly fabricating visits by AQUALITY-1 (and others) to the store and extending the length of time for visits which have been verified, and therefore the degree of friendship and the amount of information he is able to collect on AQUALITY-1. What then of his information obtained during these visits?

17. On 9 September Subject volunteered the information that the Soviets are now selling watches in Mexico and that he had been offered all he wants at 35 pesos (\$1.40). Surprised, the case officer asked who had made this offer. Subject answered that AQUALITY was in about a week ago, had shown Subject one, described others and had made the offer. Subject's presentation of the above was obviously fabrication. Therefore Subject was given 10 pesos to buy two watches. (COMMENT: Subject's notes for 2 September showed that LITVICH, the departing administrator had come in and shown Subject his new Soviet watch, stating that they were being sold for 35 pesos.) At the 21 September meeting Subject didn't have a word to say about the watches so he was asked about them. He said that the very next day after the last meeting (this was Saturday, 10 September) he had gone to AQUALITY's office to try them. AQUALITY told him they were fresh out of watches but that they expected more in about 15 days at which time Subject should come back and he could have all he wanted. (COMMENT: Subject's notes for 12 September stated that AQUALITY had come in (not confirmed by LITVICH) to state that his Soviet friend had intended to give him a Soviet watch for his birthday (11 September) but that they were all out. However, they expect more in 15 days at which time Subject will be presented with one.) Here is a clear case of an obvious deception supported by confidant's line.

18. On 22 August the case officer asked Subject to comment on AQUALITY-1's erratic behavior about wanting women, pornography material, etc. in that he refused and drove the subject without any sense of continuity. Subject answered by assuring the case officer that AQUALITY-1 was a carnal beast and that, if a woman were available, he would jump at her. Subject then suggested that the case officer select a proper girl, introduce her to him, and let him arrange to get them together either at his store or home. The case officer admitted that this was a good idea worth further consideration but advanced several practical reasons why this would be difficult to accomplish convincingly.

19. All of the above clearly demonstrates that Subject is a regular con man and consistent exaggerator, liar and fabricator. It is extremely difficult to believe that AQUALITY-1 attempted to recruit him in the manner described. On the other hand, Subject as clever as he is now revealed to be, could hardly be so artful as to insert on his own initiative the highly provocative and well timed statements about LIBERTY-0, the new LIBERTY and LIBERTY. The logical motive for his exaggerations and fabrications would be to please his patron (WUFACT). However, he went months without mentioning LIBERTY-1, the obvious fulfillment of his outstanding requirement to provide a woman for AQUALITY-1, and something he could really work with. There may be significance in AQUALITY-1 returning to the Embassy to leave shortly after LIBERTY-1 entered the picture, although it is standard for administrators to live inside. Certainly nothing has been heard of AQUALITY-1's much touted carnal appetites since LIBERTY-1's arrival. There seems to be more than coincidence in Subject inviting LIBERTY-1 to fiestas on the same or the next day after inviting the Soviets. Note also that these two fiestas were within three weeks of each other after an absence of one year. Also at these fiestas the Soviet guests said they couldn't come to the first and accepted at the last minute. For the second they accepted and then declined at the last minute. Subject's obvious and immediate interest in LIBERTY-1 in the Soviet context, his feeling her out regarding possible interest in Soviets, attempting to introduce her to Soviets and inviting her to the first "fiesta" - all without mentioning a word to the Station - is inescapable for an agent who is trying to produce. All of the above is indicative of the classical KGB hand, devious and overcomplicated.

20. Concerning the timing of the Soviets coming or not coming to the fiestas noted above, in both of which AQUALITY-1 figured, LIBERTY-1 reported that she met and had her first brief conversation with AQUALITY-1 in Subject's store on the evening of 13 September, the day after AQUALITY-1 et al cancelled out at the last minute.

21. From all of the above and from RABICH's assessment we can only conclude that Subject is under some form of KGB control. Other than breaking contact with Subject the Station has the options of trying to break him or to use him in an aggressive manner against the KGB. The Station has no interest in continuing this case in its present form. As a first step the Station suggests a new DEBRIEF examination. We now have a number of purposeful questions to put to Subject which could provide a valuable base for interrogation without revealing other assets. Therefore, on 22 SEPTEMBER 1960, 27 September we have requested a Spanish-speaking DEBRIEF specialist on a YDY basis to handle both Subject and LIBERTY-1. Since neither speaks any English and the interrogations will undoubtedly become

complicated the Station would appreciate Headquarters support in this matter. Headquarters opinions and suggestions on any part of the above, but particularly on the future handling of this case are welcome.

22. LIHUSTIC-1 who is presenting certain problems of her own is very much involved with this case. We are preparing a separate dispatch on her.

23. Transmitted under separate cover are contact reports for 31 August, 9 September and 21 September 1966. Previous contact reports were forwarded in SENIA-29914, 1 September 1966.

Re paragraph 4 above:

1. Attached herewith is a sterilized copy of the Memorandum of Agreement executed with LINDUSINE on 3 February 1965. Three signed and dated copies are retained in Station files. Both LINDUSINE and his wife appeared and signed the agreement, with Robert L. EASBY acting for CRYKOR. It will be noted that the final terms were somewhat more favorable than Headquarters had authorized.

2. Station had ample opportunity to study the plans and they were so ideal from both the operational and living standpoint that no changes were required. Building can therefore begin almost at once, and the forecast for completion is still about 1 July.

3. Consideration had been given in the Station to installing time-feed switchable transmitters in the two lower apartments in view of their probable attractiveness to FUSTEAL personnel. However, it is Station's view that given LINDUSINE's close involvement with CRYKOR on a number of matters it would be well neither to have too much FUSTEAL interest aroused in the building nor to give them the opportunity to observe the pattern of LIFE0975 at such close range.

4. With reference to paragraph 5 of the memorandum, Station will probably decide to have LIFE0975 draw up a normal contract with LINDUSINE and pay him his rent, which will be passed by LINDUSINE to Station at regular intervals. The question of how to route an apparently normal transaction around LINDUSINE's bookkeeper has not yet been resolved.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

1. I, \_\_\_\_\_ hereby agree to pay the U. S. Government the sum of \$150,000 pesos for the property located at \_\_\_\_\_  
Of this amount, I will pay 60% (90,000 pesos) in cash in two equal installments. The first installment of 45,000 pesos will be paid on the beginning of construction of the building. The second equal installment will be paid on completion of the construction.
2. Construction of the new building to be erected on the site in question will begin immediately on completion of the demolition of the present structure and clearing of the site.
3. The balance of 60,000 pesos will be repaid within two (2) years of completion of the building. As part of this payment, the apartment which is to occupy the entire top dwelling floor will be let rent-free to Jorge \_\_\_\_\_ or such other person as the U. S. Government may designate for two (2) years at a calculated rent of 2,500 pesos monthly, including city water. The understanding covering this two year free rental will be negotiated by me with the representative of the U. S. Government and will be considered part of this Memorandum of Agreement.
4. The 4,800 pesos remaining will be paid in a lump sum at the end of the second full year of \_\_\_\_\_ occupancy of the apartment.
5. I further agree that I will, on completion of the building, execute a rental contract with \_\_\_\_\_ in accordance with the pertinent part of paragraph 3 above. This contract will be accompanied by an unwritten option for \_\_\_\_\_ or other person approved by the representative of the U. S. Government to renew the rental contract for such periods of time as the U. S. Government may see fit. The contract shall stipulate that any increase in rental will not exceed the proportionate rate at which rentals have been increased for the other apartments in the same building.
6. Any rental payments made to me or my representatives by \_\_\_\_\_ during the two year free rental period, will be returned to the representative of the U. S. Government, minus any such appropriately pro-rated charges for building repairs and maintenance as would normally fall to the responsibility of the tenant.

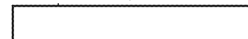
1. On 24 January 1956, the LICOOL run reported that LIPSTICK/LILYRIC was available. LINCHPIN was immediately contacted with instructions to investigate this possibility. Preliminary investigation through the janitor revealed that there was a front apartment available which was ideally suited for our purposes. LINCHPIN contacted the owner who stated that the apartment was not for rent since his daughter was going to move into it. The owner did offer LINCHPIN his daughter's old apartment which was in the back of the building. LINCHPIN contacted the daughter and found that her apartment was not suited for our purposes, and mentioned to her casually that should she not take the front apartment, he would be interested. She told LINCHPIN that she didn't really want it and would tell her father to rent it to LINCHPIN. Subsequently LINCHPIN again contacted the owner and was told that he could have the front apartment.
2. LINCHPIN has executed the contract for one year for LILYRIC at \$56.00 US per month. He plans to move from the present RAPPER base by 5 February 1956 and place his furniture in storage for approximately one week. The furniture will be moved to the storage warehouse by one moving company and taken out of the storage warehouse by another moving company. Although it is realized that this series of moves would not cover the trail of the furniture to an experienced investigator, it will prevent questions by neighbors who see the furniture being moved just one-half block and also prevent comments from the moving men themselves who would move the furniture this one-half block.
3. Since the RAPPER base consisted of one bedroom and the LILYRIC base contains three bedrooms, and is generally larger in all respects, it will be necessary to purchase additional furniture to make LINCHPIN's occupancy normal in all appearances. It is estimated that the requisite amount of furniture needed for this purpose will not aggregate in excess of \$500 US. Further, since this apartment is rather large for one single man, LINCHPIN's brother is being cleared,

and, after clearance, will move in the apartment with LINCHPIN to serve as relief operator and lend cover to the base.

4. It is planned that LILYPIC will be kept completely compartmented from LIMITED and other LIPSTICK operations. LIPSTICK 20 will act as cut-out between the Station and LINCHPIN, and has been instructed that he is not to mention this duty to anyone. Since LIPSTICK 20 does not know of the existence of LIMITED, the LILYPIC operation is completely compartmented.
5. The LILYPIC base will be principally used for photographic surveillance of the LINCHPIN target, working alternately but without any pattern, with the LIMITED base. This working schedule will be worked out by the Case Officer in advance and given to both bases. Since complete compartmentation is desired, the films will be processed in the Station instead of being sent to James O. AYCALL who does the processing for LIMITED. Later, the processing may be done by LINCHPIN in his chemical laboratory in order to take this load off the Station personnel involved. LINCHPIN has a fairly well equipped chemical laboratory that, with a few modifications, could be used for the processing of the films and prints. At present LINCHPIN has a partner in this laboratory and it is planned that the partner will be cleared.
6. This Station sincerely feels that by the alternative use of this base with LIMITED that many of the outward signs of photographic surveillance (possibly only apparent to the Case Officer knowing they were there and looking for them) will be reduced. The acquisition of this base, in a sense, provides the best possible cover for the LIMITED base by decreasing the use of that base.


