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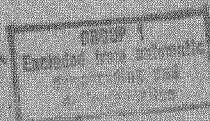
SUBJECT: Plans of American Embassy in London

1. This is a preliminary briefing paper, prepared by your office, on the security situation in the various offices of the United States Embassy in London as well as in the British Consulate in New York. 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1. Groups and Individuals Expected to Attempt a Violent Attack on Kennedy's Visit

A. Brazilian Communist Party (PCC)

While the PCC, with a membership of approximately 4,000 in the country and 1,000 in Washington state, are following a non-violent policy to achieve its goals, it has numerous cells in Washington to support its forces within the system. These are press field, in which demonstrations, mass speeches, and display propaganda materials such as posters, banners, and calligraphies critical of the United States in general and of the President in particular.

B. Communist Party of Brazil (CPB)

The CPB is a clandestine group which has worked with the PCC and associated violence, along the lines of Fidel Castro's "Urban Guerrilla" to achieve its goals. While the CPB has relatively few members and does not have organizational capability that the PCC, certain individuals within the group might conceivably attempt some sort of violent action against the President or his entourage.

C. Peasant Leagues

The Peasant Leagues are Communist-controlled rural groups and consist of rural workers, tenant farmers, and small land owners concentrated mainly in the States of Pernambuco and Parana in Northeast Brazil. A prominent Peasant League leader, Francisco Jullian, while not admitting to Communist Party membership, is definitely a Communist sympathizer and strong advocate of the policies of Fidel Castro and Mao Tse-tung. He is a proponent of the violent overthrow of the government through peasant uprisings. Followers of Francisco Jullian can be expected to attempt to demonstrate in Rio de Janeiro against the President's visit. A report previously furnished your office indicates that these elements are planning to make a red paint bomb to be thrown at Mrs. Kennedy.

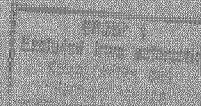
D. Urban and Soviet Bloc Saboteurs

Urban and Soviet Bloc Saboteurs can be expected to attempt concerted efforts to create disturbances and incidents designed to mar the success of the Presidential visit.

E. Local Officials, Governor of Rio Grande do Sul

Local officials, such as Governor Lottus, anti-American members of Rio Grande do Sul, may very possibly take advantage of the President's visit to inspire further anti-American speeches and actions not only in his own state, but also in Rio de Janeiro.

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2. Security Forces Charged with Protecting the President

A. Federal Service for Intelligence and Counter Intelligence (SEINT)

The SEINT is Brazil's national agency responsible for domestic and counter-intelligence operations in the country and has been in existence since 1970. It reports directly to the National Security Council and is headed by Colonel General Roger de Lima, a political ally of President Collor. Colonel Lima reportedly has a heart condition which prevents him from his effectiveness as Director of the SEINT. Politically, Colonel Lima is described as a nationalist and as willing at all times to do the bidding of President Collor. Our representatives are in contact with Colonel Lima as well as with certain of his key subordinates. Our main contact in the SEINT is Major Sebastião Maria de Oliveira Sobrinho who speaks English, Spanish and Portuguese. Through him we shall have access to the SEINT working level responsible for certain aspects of the President's visit.

The SEINT can be expected to provide intelligence coverage of potentially hostile groups and individuals posing a threat to the Presidential party's security and through its access to the highest levels of the Brazilian Government, can insure the availability of necessary armed forces and police personnel to cope with or counter any disturbances.

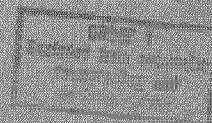
B. Brazilian State Department of Public Safety (DSP)

The DSP, headed by Police Chief Newton Mourao de Almeida, maintains the main police and security forces which will be charged with protecting the President while he is in Rio de Janeiro. Our representatives plan to establish contact with Mourao in the near future. Although judged by American standards, the DSP is not a highly efficient police agency, it is considered capable of providing necessary security measures in connection with the visit. Further information on the DSP will be furnished your office when received from the field.

C. First Army

The First Army is located in Rio de Janeiro and, if the need arises, can be relied upon to disperse any unruly mobs or break up violent demonstrations against the President.

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2. Carlos Lacerda, Governor of Guanabara

Governor Lacerda is pro-American and anti-Communist and can be relied upon to utilize all the forces at his command to insure the President's safety while in Rio.

3. Miscellaneous Positive Actions to be Undertaken by CIA Representatives

Through contacts in police, student, labor, press, and foreign political skills groups, our representatives in Rio are planning to take appropriate unilateral actions not only to supplement official measures to uncover and counter the plans and activities of hostile groups but also to undertake other actions designed to create a favorable atmosphere for the Presidential visit.

4. General Estimate of Situation

At this time, the general security situation prevailing in the Rio de Janeiro area is satisfactory. It is believed that the local forces - civilian and military - are capable of coping with any hostile demonstrations or attempts at rioting or violence. At the time of the visit of former President Eisenhower to Brazil in 1959, the local forces proved capable of providing the security needed for the protection of the Presidential party while in Rio. At the time of the resignation of President Getulio in August 1961, the local forces again showed their ability to cope with hostile crowds and street demonstrations. The good will generated by the friendly reception of President DeLoach on his recent trip to the United States will be a factor in insuring a similar reception for President Kennedy. It is expected that the Brazilian official attitude towards the visit will be highly favorable and that this in turn will contribute towards a similar attitude on the part of the press and the public.

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## 3. Forces Expected to Assume a Hostile Attitude Towards the Visit

### A. Brazilian Communist Party (PCB)

As previously reported to you, the PCB (7,500 members in Sao Paulo State) has already initiated discussions to consider plans for demonstrating against the Presidential visit. In spite of the fact that the present PCB line advocates peaceful means to achieve its aims, it can be expected to throw its full resources behind an attempt to protest publicly against the visit. The PCB will most assuredly bitterly oppose the trip in the local Communist press, notably in *Avangarda*, the official Sao Paulo PCB weekly newspaper, and in *Boia Brava*, the rural monthly PCB publication. The Party will undoubtedly attempt to influence key leftist politicians to protest the visit. Party appeals will probably be made to selected nationalist military leaders. The Party will also undoubtedly make full use of its fronts such as pro-Guern groups, student groups, labor organizations, the Brazilian Peace Partisans Movement and the Sao Paulo State Federation of Women. Perhaps the strongest arm of the PCB in this regard will be the local labor unions under PCB control such as the bank workers union, metallurgical workers union, textile workers union, civil construction workers union, food workers union, and the chemical workers union. Communist elements within the Frente Nacional de Libertacao (National Liberation Front) can also be expected to undertake some sort of hostile action.

### B. Communist Party of Brazil (CPB) and Trotskyist Movement

As previously explained, the CPB is a clandestine Communist Party with a revolutionary program and would be eager to organize and support any demonstration. It would have little to lose by resort to violence which would dramatize Brazilian opposition to the trip. By the same token the Trotskyist Movement can be relied upon to support any and all measures, including resort to violence, to protest against the trip. As the most anti-American groups in the Sao Paulo area, the CPB and Trotskyists would willingly support violent demonstrations of the type undertaken against former Vice President Nixon during his visit to Venezuela a few years ago. Although both of these groups are small and relatively weak, they might, in connection with certain extreme student elements, try to stage violent, but isolated, demonstrations.

### C. Political Parties

It is possible that demonstrations against the trip will have the support of the Partido Socialista Brasileiro and

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extreme leftist elements of such left-of-center parties as the Partido Trabalhista Brasileiro and the Partido Democrata Cristao.

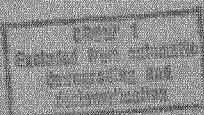
A. Security Forces Merged with Protecting the President

A. Sao Paulo State Department of Public Safety (DPS)

1.) The DPS will have primary responsibility for protecting the Presidential party, including the Vice President. The two main elements, the Sao Paulo Police and the Public Police (Public Force). The Sao Paulo Police is perhaps the best equipped and best trained force in Brazil, not, judged by American standards. It is an inferior organization. The Sao Paulo Police and Public Force have sufficient equipment and manpower available to contain any serious riot demonstration, and in the event of a large or serious demonstration, groups of the Armed Army stationed in Sao Paulo could be brought into action. In case of a serious outbreak of riots or fighting between an extensive military action, it is essential that the Sao Paulo Police or Public Force could contain their action without calling in extensive armed reinforcements. A good example of the capability of the Sao Paulo Police and Public Force to handle a potentially dangerous situation was the Sao Paulo general strike of 13 December 1964. Within a matter of hours the police and Public Force acted decisively and crushed the strike. The Secret Service people of the DSR and the Second Section (Intelligence) of the Armed Army are generally aware of Communist and other subversive organizations. Consequently, if any serious demonstration attempt were being plotted against President Kennedy or any member of his party, these services warning would not have been late. If, however, they were tipped off in advance they would attempt for the arrest and detention of the planners. The local security services will offer the most complete cooperation possible and, within the limits of their capability as outlined above, will attempt to make the President's visit to Sao Paulo as safe and secure as possible.

2.) The DSR is headed by the Secretary of Public Security for the State of Sao Paulo, who is directly subordinate to Governor Carlos Alberto Cascaes Filho. The present Secretary, Flaminio Lygia da Silva, who took office in January 1974, although not initially pro-American, is anti-Communist and can be counted on to render all the support that he can during the President's visit. 3.) In the DFP are the following police divisions which may be involved during the President's visit.

a. The 1st Division (about 2,000 men) carry on daily routine police work.

b. The 2nd Division is responsible for traffic control, general services, registration records and support units.

c. The 4th Division has a Personal Security Squad with ten officers, four clerks, and 25 investigators. It provides security for persons who have been threatened with attack.

d. The 7th Division is called the Department of Political and Social Order (DPSO). This division has about 200 persons and is charged with the prevention of political, social, and economic crimes. The chief of DPSO, Dr. Carlos Jose de Miranda, told that problems during former President Alencastro's visit in 1962 and should be well served in the safety measures to be taken. The Secret Service Section of DPSO handles undercover and identification operations. It has access to information on the FBI from a few penetrations of the party. Dr. Miranda, Dr. Elio Miranda Calmon, assistant chief of DPSO, Dr. Sidney Demari, chief of the Secret Service Section and Dr. Paulo Ferrigno, chief of the Political Order Section of DPSO are all known to our San Paulo representative and undoubtedly will work closely with him. They speak only Portuguese.

e. The 8th Division conducts radio, light, and sound patrols. This division generally has about 30 men in operating condition.

4.) In addition to the above police divisions the following other DFP units which are directed by the Secretariat of Public Security may be of use during President Kennedy's visit.

a. Civil Guard (Guarda Civil), with 3,000 uniformed officers in the city of San Paulo and larger cities of the interior; actually about 5,000 are in the area of the state capital. This organization does general patrol and policing.

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D. Public Force (Fuerza Publica) is a military unit composed of about 12,000 officers and men in the state. It is established to preserve order and maintain security, and its duties include patrol, traffic, and special guard duty. It has placed a uniformed unit at the disposal of the state for offensive and defensive action in case of riots, etc. The latter unit can call for aid from the Public Force when needed.

E. Maritime and Aerial Police Division (Division de Policia Maritima y Aerea and Puerto de Estados) has about 250 police officers and sailors on duty at seaports and airports in the state.

### B. Second Army

The commander of the Second Army, which is headquartered in the city of San Paulo, is Lt. General Paulo de Mello. He is anti-Communist and friendly to the United States. The Second Army has about 27,000 men.

### C. Gervasio Pinto, Governor of Sao Paulo

Gervasio Pinto is pro-American and is easily accessible to American officials. Without question he will take a personal interest in insuring that proper security measures are adopted during the President's visit.

### 3. Miscellaneous Positive Actions to be Undertaken by CIA Representatives

Apart from the official actions to be undertaken by the security services described above, CIA representatives in Sao Paulo will implement through their own agents programs to monitor, deter and disrupt the plans and activities of hostile individuals and groups. At the same time, they plan to carry out a variety of actions designed to insure a favorable reception of the Presidential visit.

### 4. General Estimate of Situation

It is not believed that any large-scale demonstrations, resulting in planned or accidental violence, could be organized without the support of the PCB. Beyond question the strongest and best organized subversive organization in the Sao Paulo area. It is not believed at this time that the PCB would encourage violence in any demonstration of this sort, but, from the Party standpoint, counterproductive to their immediate goals of legitimacy and participation in the former 1964 election, and to their long-range objective of securing a broad

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nationalist movement composed of all anti-imperialist (i.e., anti-United States) elements. Present indications are that the PCB and other subversive elements would support fully all activities harmful to the visit, short of those activities which, by their very violence, would provide local police forces with repressive countermeasures, would be condemned by the majority of Brazilians, or would be self-defeating in terms of PCB objectives. By and large, it is expected that President Kennedy will receive a spontaneous, favorable reception on the part of the Brazilian public in Sao Paulo.

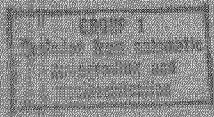

Information as follows. The GSA is responsible for the control, protection, and preservation of all matters and activities pertaining to the President in the political and social sphere of Brazil. The activities, however, are largely confined to the Federal District. The following sections of the GSA will probably be involved in the security measures affecting the President's visit:

- a. The Militarized Police, consisting of approximately 1,000 men.
- b. The Special Police of the GSA, consisting of approximately 700 selected officers and men. This is a specially trained unit equal for emergency duty and for guarding important persons. It is unusually efficient in handling unruly crowds.
- c. The Civil Guard of the GSA, consisting of approximately 2,700 uniformed police officers. It is used chiefly for patrol, guard, and traffic duty.
- d. The Municipal Police, consisting of approximately 2,500 officers and men.

It is expected that our representatives in Brazil will have established contact with appropriate key officers of the GSA prior to the arrival of President Kennedy in Brasilia and, hence, should be able to provide the necessary introduction as desired.

Intelligence Function Before to be Undertaken by GSA Representatives

General Estimate of the Situation

While we have not yet received the field's assessment of the security situation prevailing in Brazil, we do believe that hostile elements are well organized and numerous enough to represent a serious threat to the President at this time.

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
