1. [AD] [DIPNER-20] said Subj's face was familiar to him; when given the name source said there was a Lt. Col. GULB in the MVD (now KGB). Source did not know which directorate he was in - might be technical section - but knew that he was a "fairly high boss." Source could not recall whether he had ever seen Subj so does not know if this is the same person.

2. Early Aug 57, Subj called on [V.A.] [CPA] and asked that [V.A.] warn him in adv. of any Sov officials who might be going down Finland & he would necessarily see to it that the Sov left quietly & immediately. [V.A.] replied in a very guarded manner, "Since when does a little diplex with a mark of [V.A.] let us know that he is so powerful as to remove officials from our country from Finland if you are really that powerful, who are you? & what are your real duties here in Finland?" [V.A.] started - did not answer the question. [CPA] continued: Subj's question interesting in view of [V.A.]'s oper. Trying to determine date of chat.)

CONTACTS

1. Source invited to give lectures on math in USSR. Soon after receiving the invitation, he and wife were in bay of Helsinki restaurant when subj and fru RASK, a Finn Comrade, came up to his table and introduced themselves. Subj mentioned source's imminent trip to USSR. Subj told source to come to Sov Emb next day to meet the Cultural Attache, who could arrange to get source to USSR and back without cost. Source invited subj and RASK to his home for dinner following evening. Subj accepted. SUBJ paid entire bill. When source went Sov Emb next day met Yuriy VORONIN and subj, also SERGEYEV. V. invited himself to dinner with subj at source's home. Subj, VORONIN and wives went to source's for dinner, bearing many presents. RASK did not come. Subj told source "this RASK is a swine." Felt that it necessary to see these Finn Comrades politically but that they cannot be trusted.

[PH] 2080 In mid-December, VAINIKAINEN told VARAINEN the following which  
Jan 58 passed to station. OGLUB had recently complained to Johannes VIROLAINEN  
that the Fin security police were not paying any attn to cases of British  
& American espionage in Finl, adding that the Soviets had info regarding  
Western espionage in Finl and would be glad to furnish it to the security  
police. OGLUB said some of the western cases were old & some new. Did not  
elaborate. Source did not say what VIROLAINEN's reply was to OGLUB.

[V] then said it would behoove SIS officers in Helsinki to be as careful as  
possible cause it quite possible security police would receive orders to keep  
their eyes sharply peeled for any security police would receive orders to keep  
briefed all senior COMINT people. COMINT man said he had read a warning  
few days earlier from a friendly Finnish officer that another COMINT officer  
had been seen too frequently driving a Volkswagen w/dipl plates around  
freight yards of Helsinki. (This was COMINT's energetic factory & freight car  
marking program.) The COMINT man said his family had noticed Finnish policemen  
on the beat outside his house had recently begun to go to phone booth & make  
a call every time the senior COMINT man left his house and drove towards town.  
Everyone took warning seriously. [V] to tell us any further developments.

Subject, Soviet Consul who later was replaced by [REDACTED] at the Legation Consular Corps, which had previously had no Sino-Soviet bloc representatives, in the fall of 1957. Since the Consular Corps is not considered by a "Western" body, the Corps had no valid reason to refuse his entry. As far as is known, no other Sino-Soviet bloc representatives had followed GOLUB into the Corps.

Castille, KUBARK, attended a Consular Corps luncheon on 10 Dec 58—during luncheon C. was introduced as new Vice-Consul from U.S.—after lunch GOLUB came directly up to Castille, introduced himself and asked C. to join him at his table for coffee and cognac. Subj was extremely friendly and proceeded to ask the usual FRO-1 type questions, such as Castille's home in States, how long he'd been in Finland, did he have a dipl title, etc. Subj mentioned that his wife was in the Sov Union and that he was living alone in his apt. Subj speaks no English so Finnish was used.

Source & Subj discussed current events and Subj's views Sov interest Finland. [REDACTED] stated Subj friendly, helpful during baggage check and did not appear suspicious her trip. Subj has phoned [REDACTED] twice for lunch since return. She not able go but intends accept next offer.

[REDACTED] said Subj went Leningrad to meet Sov Internal Security Police Repr re security measures KHRUSHCHEV Scandinavia trip.

On 4 May Subj phoned Castille (KUBARK) for lunch that day. Most of the time was spent on polite conversation and no political topics were discussed. Subj asked C. about his home and family in the States and his vacation plans. Subj mentioned that he was not going to be able to take a vacation this summer as he had hoped when C. asked him why, he gave the reason that the Amb, whom Subj described as still being new and not quite sure of himself yet, had told him he wanted him to remain in Helsinki as he was the only person of officer rank in the Consular Section. (Comment: Maybe it's cause KHRUSHCHEV is coming to Helsinki this summer. Not once during the lunch did the subject mentioned in refs (C's trip to USSR and treatment accorded him) come up. (For any further comments see Finland chrono)

Recently Subj has been making efforts to invite younger members of the Western embassies to lunch or to view Soviet movies playing at local movie houses. Subj invited Howard B. Singleton (Canadian), Aydin Yagva (Turk), another Soviet - Makayev - at these two luncheons acting as interpreter, Castille was just interrupted by a phone call from Subj inviting him to lunch.

[REDACTED] asked for info on GOLUB & Y. MAKAYEV, saying that both Soviet officials have been in social contact w/mbrs of the [REDACTED] Legation in Helsinki. This contact instigated by GOLUB was allegedly to inquire about [REDACTED] immigration procedure. MAKAYEV acted as C's interpreter throughout the mtg. [REDACTED] has a trace in the files referring to GOLUB as Soviet Intell Officer acting as liaison man w/the Finnish Security Police.

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On the evening of 10 Sept [redacted] wife were at [redacted] dinner and could not resist the urge to bring in the [redacted] Torreyson case. He had read the interview transcript which had been prepared by one of his men and had subsequently talked to [redacted] on [redacted]'s initiative. [redacted] had called him & invited him to lunch and had described the incident at the airport quite factually, but [redacted] placed very little credence in the accuracy of the account. [redacted] said that in view of the fact that the six American athletes were left behind to await visas, he could well understand that Torreyson had needed [redacted] on the point of exaggeration. He does not believe that anything further will come of the case. Certainly the Ministry of Interior plans to forget about it unless a new protest comes from the Soviet Ambassador. [redacted] said that [redacted] had behaved stupidly in the whole affair and has been recalled to the Soviet Union. [redacted] says he has already departed. [redacted] also stated that [redacted] is a worried and upset man. Apparently the Soviets, or at least [redacted], do not believe [redacted]'s full story, and to [redacted] the reason for this doubtfulness is that when the signing incident occurred [redacted] had been speaking Finnish to Torreyson. [redacted] thought it strange that [redacted] who speaks Finnish well, should not use that language in speaking to Torreyson, who also has a fair command of Finnish.

On 21 May VALDIN was informed by GOLDB that he (G.) had been summoned to Leningrad for a mtg w/a repn of the Soviet Internal Security Police (presumably MVD). While there, GOLDB had been instructed to determine what security precaution the Police of Sweden, Norway and Denmark plan to take to insure the safety of KHRUSHCHEV during his August visit to the Scan countries. During the conversation, G. was very critical of his Soviet colleagues in Stoc, Oslo and Cops, for their failure to develop close relations w/repns of the Security Police of those countries. G. was worried not only about his own inability to develop the info requested, but also for the safety of K. during this trip. G. did not know for sure whether K. would visit Finland on this trip, but believed that if he did, it would occur after the visit to the other 3 countries, and that any visit to Finl would be purely unofficial.
