Dear Mr. Schwartz:

Reference is made to a memorandum from the Passport Office dated July 29, 1964, requesting that consideration be given to the possible prosecution of Antulio Ortiz Ramirez under the provisions of 8 U.S.C. 1185(b) relative to unauthorized travel to Cuba.

A review of the files reflects that on May 1, 1961, Ramirez, at gunpoint, hijacked a National Airlines plane over Marathon, Florida, and forced the pilot to fly to Cuba. Subsequently, the plane and its passengers were permitted to return to the United States but Ramirez remained in Cuba. As of this date all available evidence indicates that he still is residing within Cuba.

On June 23, 1961, a Federal grand jury at Miami, Florida, returned an indictment charging Ramirez with assault, transporting a kidnapped person, and transportation of a stolen vehicle, in violation of 18 U.S.C. 113, 1201, and 2312. A lookout notice has been placed with the Immigration and Naturalization Service so that he may be apprehended upon his return to the United States.

In light of the offenses charged in the presently outstanding indictment, it is our opinion that no practical purpose would be served by initiating prosecution against him at this time for a violation of 8 U.S.C. 1185(b).
