On 2/18/64, MEX-18 and MEX-19 advised that they did not believe that CHARLES SMALL handled imported Japanese items in his store similar to the bracelet portrayed in the picture received from the Bureau. They also advised that they did not recall having seen postcards on sale in his store. They stated, however, that they would check his store again and also check known outlets of Japanese goods in Mexico which, according to them, were four in number.

on 2/19/64, MEX-18 and MEX-19 orally advised the writer that they had carefully reviewed all of the bracelets on stock in CHARLES SMALL's store and none of them was of Japanese origin or appeared similar in any way to the bracelet in the photograph. They also verified their observation that SMALL does not sell postcards

Subsequently informants visited the four outlets known to them as handling Japanese imported goods in Mexico City and after reviewing the jewelry on sale in those stores advised that now of the stores handled the type of jewelry pictured in the photographs received from the Bureau.

Informants pointed out that the postcards were made by Fischgrund, one of the two largest manufacturers of postcards in Mexico whose products are on sale in a great number of stores and therefore no effort to trace the cards believed to have been purchased by OSWALD would be feasible
