MIKHAIL P. KUDRYASHOV (?) phoned the Metropolitan Police Dept. (Washington, D.C.) asking that they send some one to the Embassy. He indicated there were four young people, hooligans, who were wanting to enter the Embassy. OK, will send someone there. pwm

MIKHAIL P. KUDRYASHOV, who said he was on duty at the Soviet Embassy, phoned the Metropolitan Police Dept Communications, advising there were four young people, hooligans in front of the Embassy, trying to come in, and that he wanted the Police at the Embassy. OK. pwm

SERGEI N. VISHNEVSKI received L/D call from Pravda, Moscow, and dictated a lengthy article describing the assassination of President JOHN F. KENNEDY, the return of the Presidential party to Washington, D.C., events concerning conferences with various government officials in Washington held by the new President (L. JOHNSON) and then detailed some of the policies of President JOHN F. KENNEDY on desegregation, attempts toward lessening the threat of war, etc. He quoted from several articles in Washington Newspapers. (Russian) pwm

COUSINS commented it was a terrible situation for the entire world and that he hoped the Ambassador would not think him presumptuous for making a suggestion, but he thought it would be of the greatest symbolic significance if the Chairman (NIKITA S. KHRUSHCHEV) could come here himself tomorrow, to the funeral. DOBRYNIN commented it was already late, but COUSINS said it wasn't, that it takes only 10 hours by air. DOBRYNIN mentioned that he had received a telegram indicating that A.I. MIKOYAN was already on his way from Moscow. COUSINS insisted there was still time and that even if he (KHRUSHCHEV) arrived late and paid his respects, right now it would be of the utmost importance. COUSINS also suggested that the Newspaper comments that they had heard coming from Pravda about the assassin are a little premature and under the circumstances it might be better to suspend judgement until the facts come in, because all that can happen now is that the kind of comments that appeared would be misinterpreted, and events may develop in an entirely different direction. COUSINS thought it would be a good idea to suspend judgement until they see just what the situation is. DOBRYNIN said he would send COUSINS comments home (to Moscow).

DREW PEARSON to Amb. ANATOLI E. DOBRYNIN inquiring if the Amb. heard anything from Moscow regarding his trip to Egypt. DOBRYNIN reminded PEARSON that the last time they talked, that he told him ~~x~~ he would just notify them (Moscow) that PEARSON would be there in Cairo and it would be a good idea if he ~~x~~ (KHRUSHCHEV) would receive PEARSON; that he didn't expect an answer on this, because it would depend upon their schedule at the time. He asked PEARSON when he planned on going. PEARSON said that he understand that KHRUSHCHEV would be leaving there on the 25th, but that he, PEARSON, cannot leave for Cairo until the 20th. PEARSON said that his wife plans on leaving ~~xxxx~~ Sunday, as she has a cousin living in Cairo, and she'd like to go up to the Sl Dam for the ceremony. DOBRYNIN told PEARSON that they know about your request, and DOBRYNIN suggested that he contact GROMYKO (ANDREI?) or Chief of Press (Soviet) there and they will give PEARSON a reply on the spot; that it will depend on the conditions there at the time. PEARSON said that he can understand that. DOBRYNIN added that if this were in Moscow, there would be no problem. Yes. PEARSON said that his problem now is that he has accepted so many speaking engagements, and cannot get out of them; that everyone wants to hear about KHRUSHCHEV and that he is now speaking about KHRUSHCHEV and President JOHNSON. PEARSON said that he heard over the radio this morning that Amb. DOBRYNIN furnished to Sec. of kState DEAN RUSK some information on LEE OSWALD. Yes. PEARSON asked if something new. Amb. said neither new or old; that they asked for some material about OSWALD's ~~xxx~~ stay in Sov.
