	PCI, a former CI of the Richmond Office, is President of the Reliable Home Equipment Co., 118 South 6th Street, Richmond, Va. PCI and his brother, JACK BERNSTEIN, are reputed to be wealthy businessmen in Richmond, Va., who deal in various business enterprises including construction, real estate, and so forth.	K
	In the early part of 1963, PCI obtained option for operation of a gambling casino at Normandy Hotel, San Juan, Puerto Rico, where he and his brother have other business interests. PCI is anxious to obtain financial backing on a partnership basis in this venture. In July, 1963, he read an article in the magazine section of a Miami, Fla., newspaper indicating that SAM GIANCANA, the well-known Chicago hoodlum, was seeking partnership arrangements with American businessmen who could obtain gambling concessions in the Caribbean area and South America, which article indicated GIANCANA interested in investment in such ventures. 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Subsequently, PCI contacted an acquaintance,
DAVID SAX, of Chicago, owner or former owner of Saxony Hotel,
Miami, Fla., and now a banker in Chicago, formerly a manufacturer
of punch boards. He told him of the article and asked
how GIANCANA could be approached. SAX told the PCI he
knew one of GIANCANA's close business associates and could
arrange a contact.

Some time later, PCI received telephone call from one DAVE (LNU) and TEDDY (LNU), who claimed to be GIANCANA's business associates and desired a meeting to discuss the matter.  $\nu$ 

PCI met DAVE and TEDDY in Miami, Fla., and they seemed to know considerable about his financial standing, the fact that his resources were committed and that the brother of PCI was principal controller of their business interests.

At first, DAVE and TEDDY wanted to know something of PCI's connections to assure themselves he could get gambling concessions in Puerto Rico and/or another Caribbean area.

In the presence of DAVE and TEDDY, PCI called L. O. PENDLING, a Negro attorney and member of Parliament, Nassau, Bahamas, with whom PCI had had prior business associations and made appointment to meet PENDLING in Washington, D.C., in late August, 1963. PENDLING was unable to keep the appointment since the March on Washington made it impossible to get hotel reservations.

On or about 10-19-63 PCI met TEDDY and DAVE at The Americana Hotel, New York City. At this meeting, DAVE and TEDDY began talking about "protection" and ability of GIANCANA Syndicate to furnish slot machines for gambling operation. With this turn in the negotiations, based on PCI's original understanding that GIANCANA desired to invest money, he insisted on seeing GIANCANA. DAVE and TEDDY gave him no encouragement along this line and told PCI it was not necessary to contact them, but they would contact him always from a pay phone from wherever they were calling.
